In Hollywood a few days ago a dozen traitors, who call themselves movie writers and actors, announced that they are suing major studios for \$7.5 million and demanding abolition of a blacklist which they claim has denied them employment for several years.

Four of the group were convicted for contempt of Congress and sent to jail in 1947 after refusing to say whether they had ever been members of the Communist party. All the others likewise have identified themselves as members of the red conspiracy by invoking the fifth amendment before a congressional committee.


There is no doubt about the subversive attitude of any of them. All have clearly established themselves as enemies of the country, but all are calling on a court of this country to uphold their civil right to continue their subversive activity.

To us this appears to be the height of absurdity. But don't brush it off lightly. The mere fact that the suit has been filed is alarming. 
