Nowhere that we've been able to discover in the "conditions" is there anything to encourage free enterprise, to remove obstructive controls, to reduce government waste and extravagance, to protect property rights, to halt inflation and to balance budgets - the things that would really help our South American friends to lift their economies out of the ruck.

So, we'll throw away an-other \$20 billion or so in "Foreign Aid," and our Latin American friends will find their economies worsened because of our ill-conceived


