

Pruitt was seven or eight feet from the workroom floor when the explosion occured. He was knocked down by the blast and the hair around his face was singed by the fire.

Both men were given a physical; then they returned to assist in recovering the body of Stanberry.

It became apparent that smoke was coming out of the top of the elevator and a helicopter was summoned from Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis. The helicopter landed twice on top of the elevator after taking up fire fighting equipment and the fire was extinguished.



touched off when Stanberry flipped what was believed to be a faulty electrical switch in the boot pit of the elevator. The air had been filled with highly combustible grain dust and a spark from the switch was believed to have triggered the explosion.

The force of the explosion blasted one side out of the 300-foot elevator. Debris pierced the side of a house 50 yards distant and demolished a cinder block fence at the side of the home.

Persons in the house were not injured by the explosion. The

house is owned by Joe C. Moore, manager of the ele-

damage estimate was available Friday. Moore was on vacation in Oklahoma and had not been notified by late Fri-

Fire departments from Muleshoe and Friona were called to fight the blaze caused by the explosion. The fire was quickly brought under control and firemen then joined in the search for Stanberry.

No injuries were reported among firemen and other rescue workers at the scene.

Stanberry, a native of Banville, Ark., had lived in Lazbuddie seven years at the time of his death. He had previously lived in Bovina.

He had been employed at the Sherley Anderson Elevator for

two years. Survivors include his wife, Carolyn; two daughters, Deborah and Kay, both of the home; two sons, Terry and Robbie, both of the home his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thogal Stanberry of Bovina; four brothers, Buford, Harold, Dean and Danny, all of Bovina; a sister, Mrs. Brenda Stanberry of Bovina, and his grandfather, W.A.
