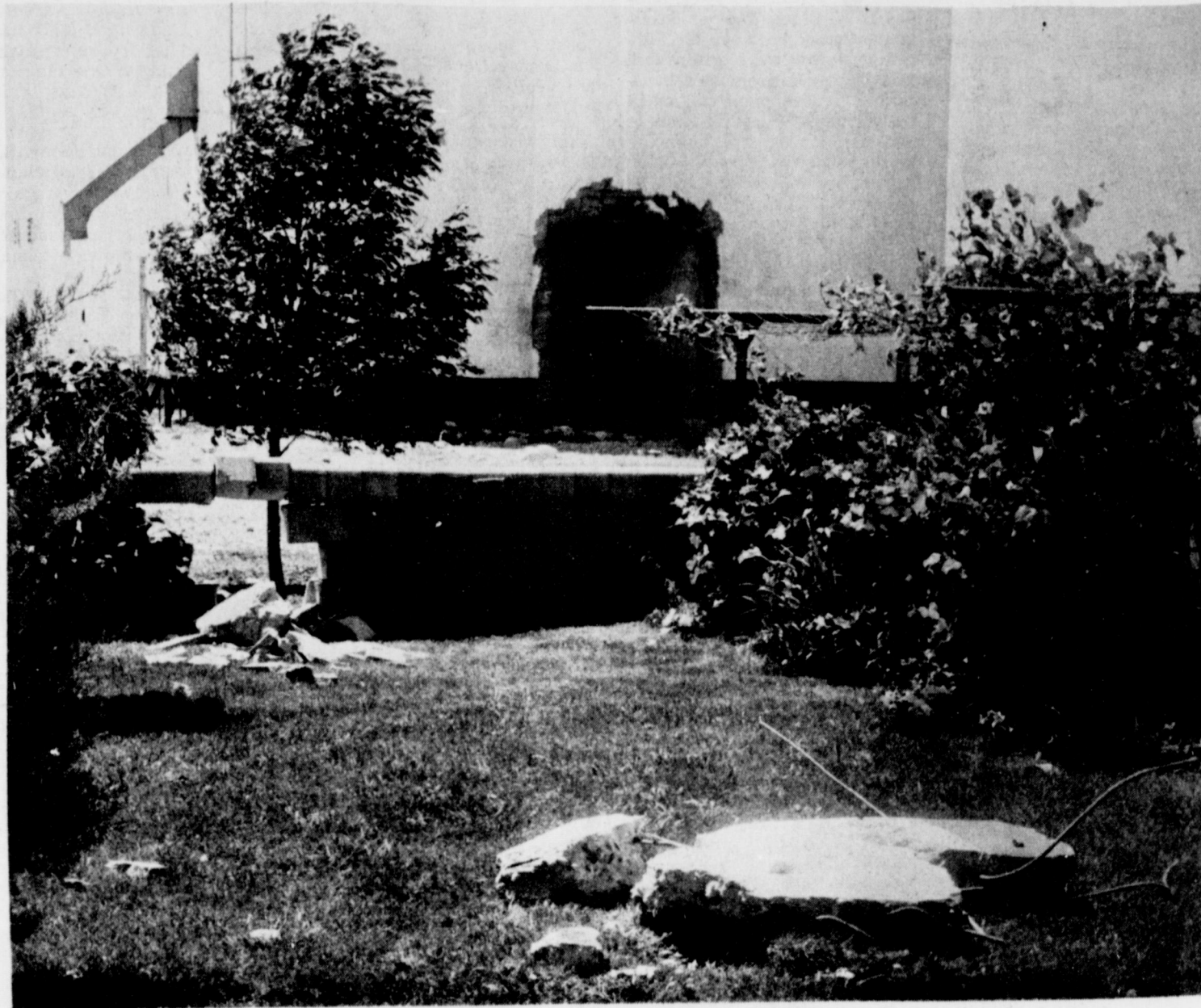

Elevator Explosion Kills Employee

Children's Reading Club Check-outs Set Record, Registration Still Open

What happens when area boys and girls are released from the elementary and junior high schools of the area and find themselves with leisure for reading?

At the end of the first week of the fifth Summer Reading Club program at the Muleshoe have joined and have checked out more than 1,514 books. This is 125 more books than checked out at the same time last year, Librarian Anne Camp said.

The full swing of students streaming in and out of the library continues with Mrs. Camp reminding others that they may continue to register to complete the requirements for 'Honor Reader'.

The Library is open six days a week, with hours from 2 p.m. until 6 p.m. weekdays, and 9 a.m. until 12 noon Saturdays. Registration for the reading program started May 28, and the closing date has been set for August 20. The program is free, as long as the rules of the library are observed, Mrs. Camp added.

Parents of slow-readers should encourage them to take advantage of this fun-way to improve their reading skill. In addition to the reading club, boys and girls may work on a poster-making project. Several new designs are available for them to work on.

Already eight have completed the minimum requirements of reading 12 or more books. Just in the first week 'Honor Roll' readers include Debra Mills, Linda Nowlin, Robbie Clark, Brent Burrows, Joronda Rhodes, Renae Ruthardt, Mary Jo Jones and Danny Jones.

The hands of the clock stopped at exactly 1:55 p.m. Friday at the Sherley-Anderson Elevator in Lazbuddie when a violent explosion ripped through the elevator.

At that time approximately 20 feet of grain fell on Cloys Wane Stanberry, 31, and his body was not recovered until some five hours later, at 6:55 p.m.

Injured were Jess Martinez, 41, with first and second burns and Ascension Borzas 50 who suffered burns and a fractured leg. Borzas was later transferred to a Lubbock hospital.

The two men were cleaning out a grain tank when the explosion occurred that sent Stanberry to his death.

Stanberry, the elevator superintendent, was inside on the workroom floor at the time of the explosion.

Jarrell Pruitt and Frank McCamish, employees of Bailey

County Electric, were both on the premises at the time of the explosion, having replaced a meter.

Pruitt was seven or eight feet from the workroom floor when the explosion occurred. He was knocked down by the blast and the hair around his face was singed by the fire.

Both men were given a physical; then they returned to assist in recovering the body of Stanberry.

It became apparent that smoke was coming out of the top of the elevator and a helicopter was summoned from Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis. The helicopter landed twice on top of the elevator after taking up fire fighting equipment and the fire was extinguished.

Officers investigating the explosion said apparently it was

Teachers Attent Lubbock Media Workshop

Seven school teachers from Muleshoe are in Lubbock this week (June 9-13) attending media workshops sponsored by the Region XVII Education Service Center (ESC). Participants from Mary DeShazo Elementary School are Katherine Griffin, Mrs. Jane Rudd, Mrs. Letha Patterson, Mrs. Eloise Wilson, and Owetha Finley, representing Muleshoe Junior High School are Leona Patterson and Mrs. Jean Moore.

Owetha Finley is participating in the Basic Educational Graphics Workshop and the others are involved in the Overhead Projection Workshop.

Both workshops are being conducted from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday in the Media Division of the ESC, located in the lower level of Citizens Mother Bank, 1401 Ave. K.

The Overland Projection Workshop is being taught by C.W. Edwards, audio-visual coordinator at Monterey High School, Lubbock. The twelve participants from throughout the 20-county Region XVII are taught the fundamentals of hand-made, thermal (heat transfer), colorfilm, and diazo transparencies, in addition to techniques of using the overhead projector. Some time is also spent using polarized light to obtain motion effects on overhead transparencies.

The Basic Educational Graphics Workshop is being taught by David Cobb, audio-visual coordinator at Estacado High School, Lubbock. The

twelve teachers involved in this workshop are developing skills in dry mounting, lettering techniques, layout and composition. Gerald Rogers, director of media and technology for the

Region XVII ESC, said that no stipend or college credit is being offered and that no tuition is charged. Participants made application for the workshops during the spring semester.

The instructors, facilities, and all materials are furnished by the ESC. Materials created in the workshop become the property of the participants.

Gerald McCathern, President of Deaf Smith County, addressed the assembly stressing the problems facing Texas, particularly in the area of organization. Because of the size of Texas, coordination between the different areas is difficult. As an example, Glendon Eling, President of Hansford County NFO, traveled over 600 miles to be at the convention.

In the afternoon, Committee meetings were held with Grain, Beef, and the Press being the major areas of concern at the present time.

Counties represented were: Austin, Bell, Briscoe, Castro, Deaf Smith, Falls, Fayette, Frio, Grimes, Hale, Hansford, Jackson, Lavaca, McLennan, Moore, Nueces, Parmer, Swisher, Lamb, De Witt, and Robertson.

Monday evening's program was an address by Mr. Erhard Pfingsten, National Vice-President.

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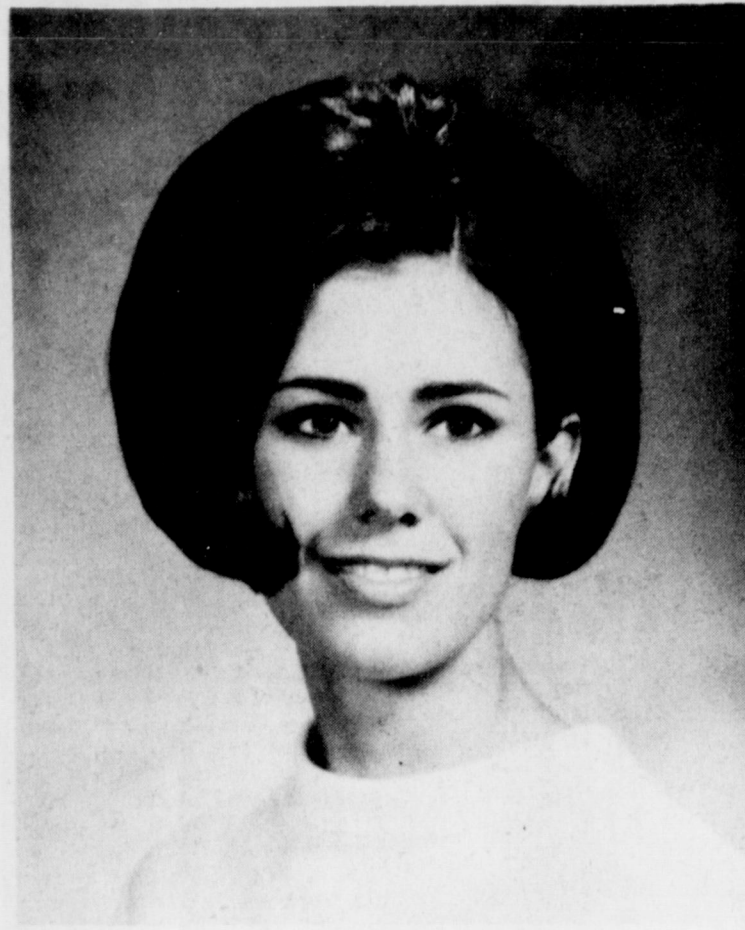
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Ellen English Nurses Training Graduate

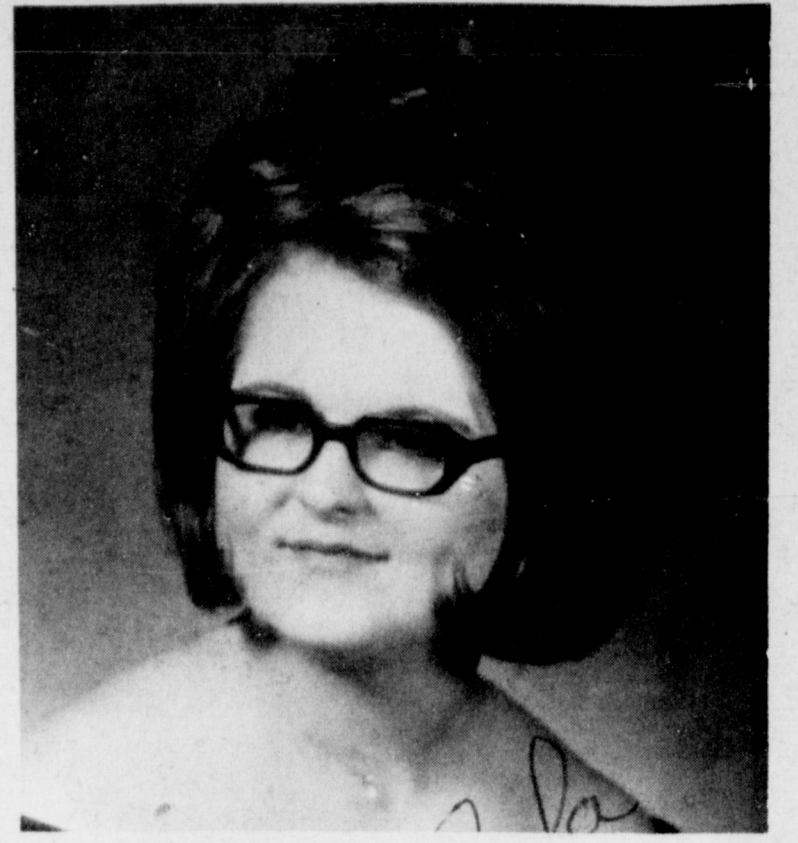

About 600 outstanding youths attend each year.

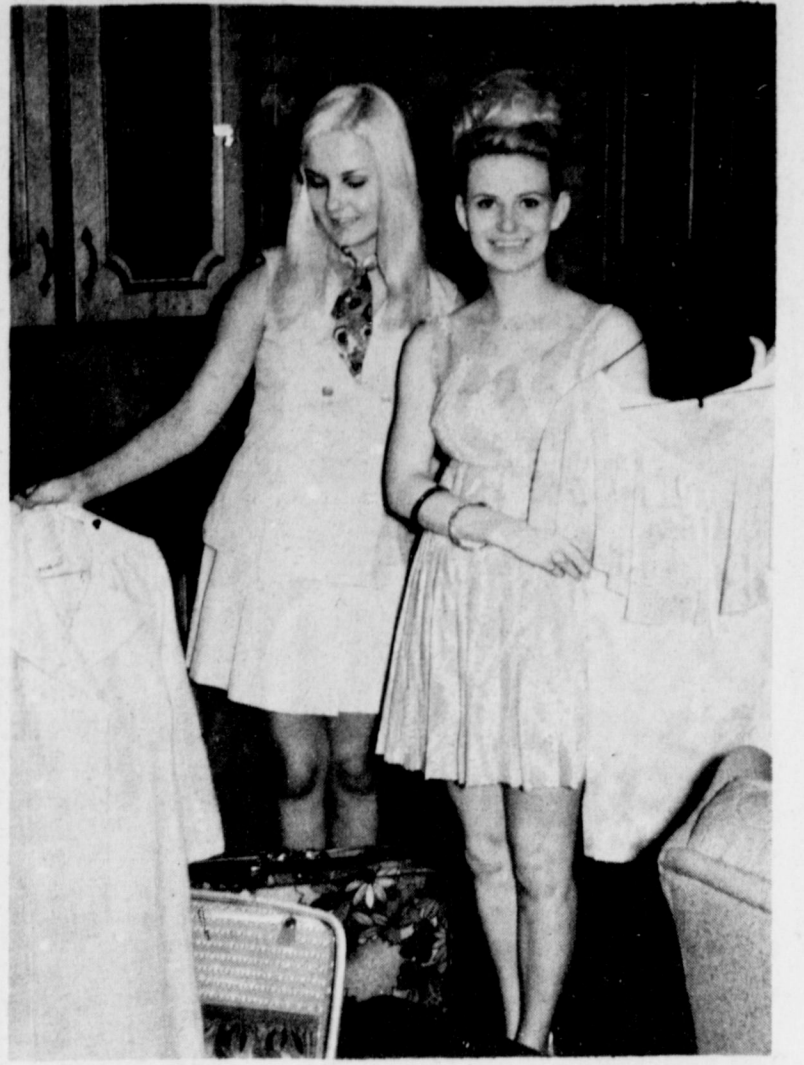

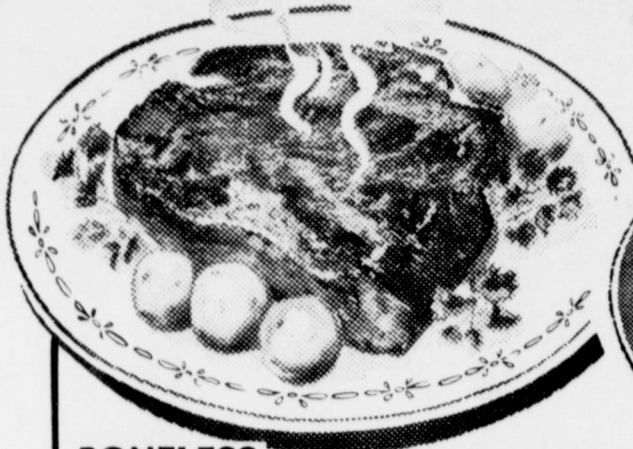

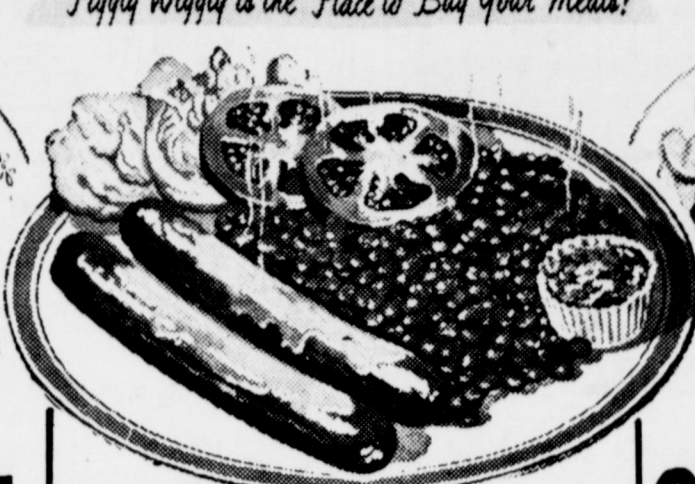
