Rumors coming out of Washington seem to indicate that Adlai the appeaser has finally maneuvered himself behind the 8-ball. Apparently his policy of softness to the reds is too soft even for the administration, which itself has been disturbingly partial to the co-existence line too many times.

After sifting out the customary denials and conflicting statements that usually accompany stories of top-level political friction, it's apparent that Stevenson has slipped. He and his supporters insist that he's backing the president on foreign policy, but nothing is said to credit him with any of the firmness in that policy. In fact, the magazine article which brought the matter to a head accuses him of advising a much softer policy than the president adopted. And it is significant that the president has not rushed to his defense.

So far there's nothing definite about replacing Adlai as our ambassador to the U. N. Nevertheless it can be expected when sufficient time passes to soften the bluntness of the change. That's the political way. A person isn't fired outright for goofing. He gets another job with a seemingly important title but his importance is permitted to quietly fade away.

The nation will be grateful for that change. It will be glad to have UN representation which is less responsive to Soviet schemes and snarls and more dedicated to the interests of free peoples. An improvement in attitude may even precede his removal. Instructions to that effect are likely to follow this week's developments. Even more encouraging is the fact that the incident points to greater firmness in the administration's policy. Repudiation of a weak stand implies emphasis on a firmer stand. It substantiates our hope that President Kennedy henceforth will be less inclined to allow Khrushchev the initiative in international dealings.

As signs are reading around the world nowadays, he has plenty of reason for such a change in policy. Khrushchev's backdown in Cuba showed that he was bluffing. And conditions in general throughout his empire show that he's having lots of trouble with unhappy people and economic setbacks. As the global analysts see it, he's in no position to crowd his luck. If that's the case, this seems like a better time than ever for our leaders to start calling the plays in the game of global politics.

US News and World Report this week presents a similar analysis of the situation in Red China, especially as it applies to the undeclared war against India. Mao Tse-tung is haunted by fear, the article says, and launched the campaign because he feared India would help the Tibetans revolt. But after a few weeks of success, and a rich area seemingly his for the taking, he suddenly called off the campaign.

Seeing India's determination and the flow of aid from Western countries, he decided not to risk the all out war. Conditions in his own country would not be able to stand the strain. Starvation, misery and discontent resulting from crop failure, economic slump and tyranny, convinced him that he was flirting with danger.

If that appraisal is correct, it seems that the time has come for the free world to start applying pressure. Mao's troubles can be vastly increased if the West will refuse to brace up his sagging economy by imports, if revolts will be encouraged and supported, if people who were pushed back are helped to liberate their former homelands. Red China can be given the same treatment it dished out these many years. It can be made weak in the same manner that it made itself strong — by being forced to retreat as steadily as it formerly advanced.

We can imagine how Mao must sweat any time he thinks of his many enemies ganging up on him. The Nationalist Chinese, the Tibetans, the Indians, the several countries of Southeast Asia. Could he stand such a war with his economy on the verge of collapse and his people on the verge of revolt?

Unless our country's top foreign observers are all wet, the time is ripe to start hitting the weak spots in the red empire. And unless signs in Washington are misleading, our administration could be readjusting itself for such a policy. After these many years of retreating, it's gratifying to think that we can start hoping for advances in the struggle against the red menace.

200,000 Gallon Reservoir Okayed By City Council

Preliminary approval was given by the city council Monday night on the plan for a new 200,000 gallon reservoir for Muenster.

Next on schedule is completion of the set of detail plans after which bids will be invited about February 1.

Estimated cost of the reservoir and its adjoining pump house and necessary changes in the water main is \$25,000.

This is one of the principal jobs in the city's program to insure an adequate water supply over its entire area. The reservoir, to be built near No. 2 Well, west of the bank, will replace the old 50,000 gallon reservoir west of the NTPA plant. It will increase the city's reservoir capacity by 150,000 gallons, actually double the capacity. The reservoir on North Main holds 100,000 gallons, and the new one will boost the total capacity to 300,000. Figuring in the water tower the city's actual storage volume will be 350,000 gallons.

That capacity will be adequate for many years to come, even in seasons of heavy consumption. The highest consumption to date is 369,000 gallons in a 24 hour period. At such times, with present reservoirs, the city's water supply gets dangerously low before night when the supply builds up again. The large reservoir will assure an adequate supply at all times.

Parochial Teams Win 3, Lose 1 in Week's Basketball

Sacred Heart basketball teams won three out of four in a pair of double headers during the past week. Playing two hot ones with ex-students of Muenster High last Friday night the Tigers won 40-39 and the Tigerettes lost 17-15. Christmas Lights Going Up, Will Be Burning Thursday

Christmas lights across Muenster streets will be burning Thursday night or very soon thereafter.

That's the estimate of city employees Wednesday as they and T&E service men continue with the job of stretching 22 strings of lights across the streets and making connections.

Despite an earlier decision to eliminate the lights this year the project is larger than ever before. After a group of people offered to share the cost city officials agreed not only to continue it but also to make it bigger. Additional wire, sockets and bulbs were ordered early last week and were assembled Monday. Installation started Tuesday.

Lights are being put up on an average of two strings to the block on five blocks of Main and six blocks of the highway. They reach from Fourth to the railroad on Main, from Main to the east city limit.

There are 38 lights to the string, a total of 836 25 watt colored bulbs.

25 Dams Finished On Clear Creeks Control Program

Twenty-five floodwater retarding structures are completed on the Clear Creek Watershed while ten sediment control structures and about two miles of diversion terraces near completion.

This report was presented at the Thursday night meeting of the watershed authority and soil conservation personnel. It is the summary of progress since the first contract was awarded in March 1961.

The report also revealed that construction on the four contracts is progressing according to specifications and that completion is expected to be on schedule.

The sediment control structures and diversion terraces are being built on severely eroded land and are designed to keep sediment out of the creeks and reservoirs below.

It was also noted that easements have been secured on three more floodwater retarding structures and three sediment control structures. And it was pointed out that only one easement each is needed to clear an additional 11 sites.

Directors present were J. M. Weinzapfel of Muenster, J. C. Donnell and H. D. Field of Saint Jo, Tom L. Muir and H. K. Armstrong of Sanger, George Berry of Rosston and J. A. Stovell of Era. Speaking for the Soil Conservation personnel were John Arnn, area conservationist, Dale Allen, land rights specialist, both of Gainesville, and J. W. Tippie of the Muenster office. The meeting was held in Muenster State Bank.

72nd Anniversary

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WRONG APPROACH

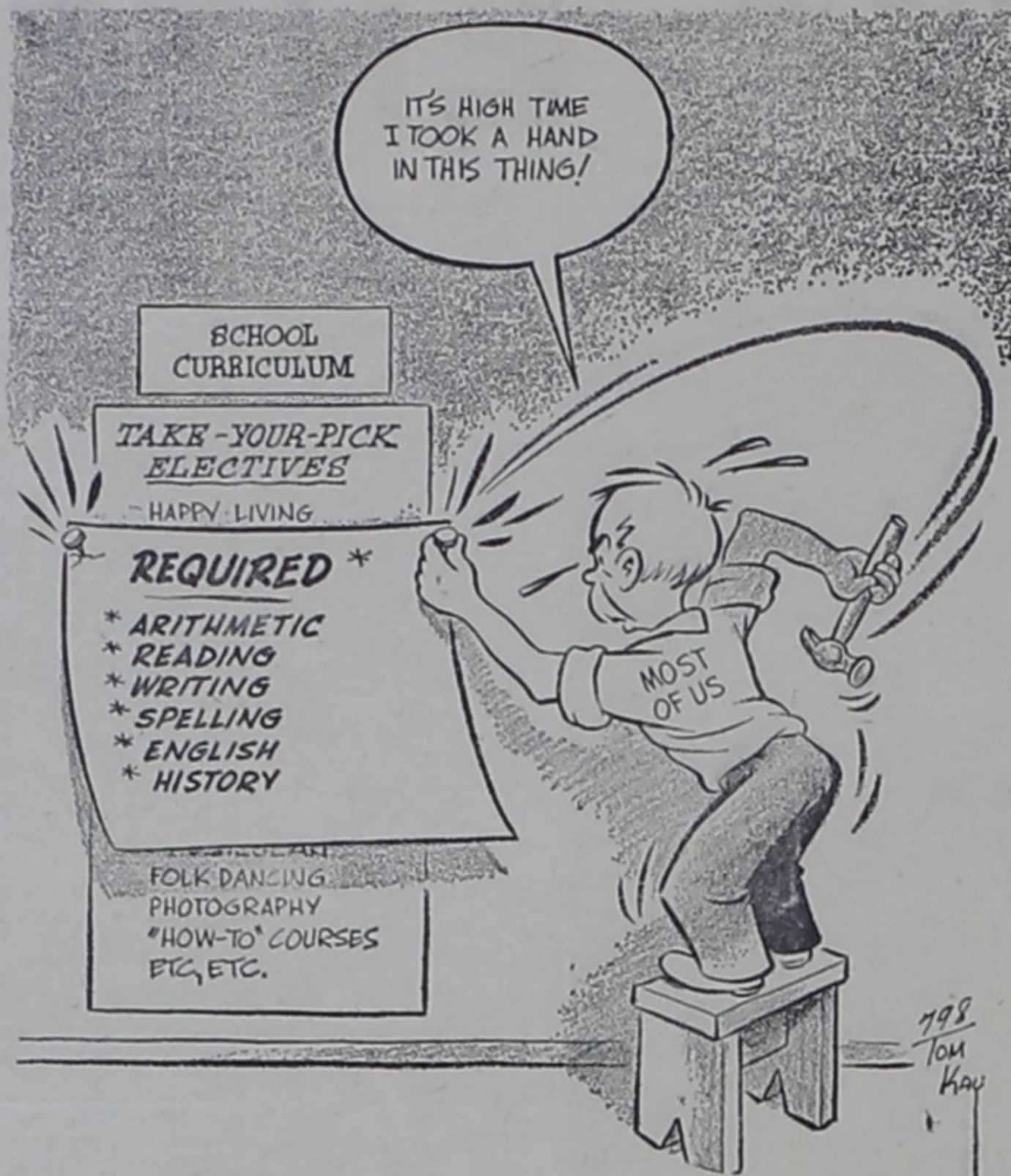
Mao Tse-tung's fighters, it seems obvious, caught the Indian defenders and their then Minister of War Krishna Menon off balance and ill-equipped to meet the Chinese Communist thrust across the Himalayas. Even so, their swift advance suggests the Reds may be able to press on at will, irrespective of all the aid in arms and munitions that India may be able to muster.

Thus, while Nehru is hesitat-

ing to accept the cease-fire offer, suspicious that it is merely a trick to give Mao's service of supply time to catch up with the swift-moving troops, the US and Britain are reported considering sending air combat units to protect Indian cities against Red bombing attacks.

While such plans are said to be highly tentative, any thought of involving flyers or other fighting men from the West would seem to be putting the cart miles ahead of the horse. In the case of the US, certainly, arms support to India is as much as we should offer. The problem is not to protect India, but to rid China of its Communist enslavers. And to get at the root of the infection that threatens all Asia as well as the Indian subcontinent, we need only to release Chiang Kai-shek and his trained, dedicated and restive forces from their Formosan exile — and to give logistic support to the mainland invasion he has planned and dreamed of and lived for.

We owe it to Chiang for the years in which we have dangled this hope before him, yet kept him virtually our prisoner, as well as to our security and that of the steadily shrinking free world. Nor would we become more dangerously involved through bold action in China than by the contemplated stop-gap A-1 Force assistance to India. Neither, for that matter,

could there be a more practical or swifter method of getting the Red Chinese off of Nehru's neck.

No worth-while decision is to be reached in the Himalayas or on the plains of Assam or in all of teeming India. Destiny — for India and the East, if not for the world — will come, in the phrase of Kipling, "out of China, crost the bay".

JOINS BIRCH SOCIETY

Probably the greatest boost given to this date to the John Birch Society came recently when Reed A. Benson became its Utah co-ordinator with his father's approval. His father is the former Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson.

The elder Benson gave firm endorsement to his son's decision. He said he had read the Blue Book and other basic materials of the society, had met the leaders and several prominent members of the organization. In respect to reading the Blue Book, he is ahead of many of the critics of the John Birch Society. We have questioned many people who condemned the Society and not one of those we happened to question had ever read the Blue Book.

On the other hand we have talked with people who had read the Blue Book and many of them were of the opinion that the author was too extreme in many of his views. In this we agree. Welch is an extremist and we do not particularly admire him for it, but we do realize that often extreme statements must be made to jolt people out of their lethargy. It is on that basis that we admire the extremism of the late Joseph McCarty.

"I believe the society is devoted to the preservation and promotion of American constitutional freedoms, and the exposure and defeat of the Socialist Communist enemy within," said Reed Benson on announcing his new role in the

John Birch Society.

Believing as he does about the threat to American constitutional freedoms, Reed Benson has taken the step which will bring much abuse upon him but he must also believe that the course he is taking is the best course to preserve American constitutional freedom. Surely the preservation of those freedoms is a laudable undertaking.

Dealing with Reds

We raise the question, Upon what grounds could the communist leaders be called civilized? How can we as a civilized nation deal with a wholly evil group of leaders and dictators? . . . Would you as the people of this community, deal with a thug? murderer and thief at a common council table on community affairs? You would not, as there could be no meeting of minds between a criminal and decent people. For a like reason there cannot be negotiation with the men of evil seeking to dominate the world.

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NEATEST TRICK SINCE HOUDINI

Top officials of the government are now planning to perform the neatest trick since Houdini developed his amazing illusions — to tax less and at the same time spend more.

This scheme, let it be noted, comes at a time when we are running a fiscal year deficit of close to \$8 billion, and when the federal government's increases in tax revenues are substantially below its increases in expenditures.

The pending jumps in spending will, if Congress should be so foolish as to authorize them, be largely and perhaps wholly in welfare state projects. Then, in all probability, the weary old cycle would start again. There would be a wave of inflation, a further cheapening of the dollar which is now worth less than half of what it was before World War II, new wage

demands supported by strikes in the major industries, and increased living costs of every kind. The Soviets, who hope this country will collapse from internal economic disturbance, could hardly ask for more.

In theory, the Soviet Union has been subjected to the "views and discipline" of the United Nations. Did this prevent the Soviet Union from organizing and aiding the ag-

gression in Korea? Did it prevent the butchery of Budapest? Did it have any influence on the betrayal of Czechoslovakia and Poland? Did it bring about the liberation of Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania? Did it deter the establishment of Soviet missile bases in Cuba?

Electric Industry Builds for Future Needs of Nation

A \$350 million coordinated high voltage transmission line and power plant construction program announced by 18 investor-owned electric utilities in the eastern United States is another example of the electric industry's ability to meet tomorrow's power needs.

W. W. Lynch, president of Texas Power & Light Company and the Edison Electric Institute, said the continuing investment in new and expanded plant and equipment is one reason why Americans have and use more electric energy than any other people in the world.

The 18 electric companies serve 30 million persons in eight eastern states and the District of Columbia. Two large power plants and more than 600 miles of new 500,000-volt transmission lines will be constructed and will tie together major electric systems in the eastern mid-Atlantic area.

Lynch likened the construction program to one now under way in Texas on a small scale. Texas Power & Light Company and three other investor-owned electric utilities are building 800 miles of super transmission lines extending from the Red River to Houston and west to the Permian Basin oilfields of West Texas. The lines will link 6,500,000 kilowatts of electric generating capability.

"These new developments are in keeping with the objectives of the nation's electric industry," Lynch stated. "The programs seek to take maximum advantage of recent technological developments in the art of generating and transmitting electric energy. Also, the transmission facilities involved will serve as integral links in expanded interconnections and increased coordination of installations by the electric systems over a broad area," he reported.

The use of larger transmission and generating facilities are among other measures which have kept electric companies in the forefront of the fight to hold down the cost of electric service, Lynch stated. He concluded that this also will help assure availability of power supply in the event a disaster should cripple any local power system.

"Coastal Bermudagrass sprigs should be planted on a well prepared seedbed. It should be prepared well in advance of planting so that it will be free of weeds and other perennial grasses, and also to provide time needed to replenish the topsoil and subsoil moisture." This is a quotation from the Texas Research Foundation, Renner, Texas, and points out what Soil Conservation personnel in the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District have been telling farmers and ranchers for several years.

The need for a well prepared seedbed cannot be over emphasized. SCS personnel believe that over 50 percent of the known failures on grass planting can be traced to this one cause. One of the best recommendations to follow in preparing a seedbed for bermuda is to plow it deep in early winter and leave it rough. This is especially important on soil that is high in clay and on old fields where there is no topsoil.

Sprigs should be planted in early spring when moisture conditions are more favorable. They should be planted as soon as possible after being dug and only in a moist seedbed. The soil around these sprigs should be compacted immediately after planting. Proper fertilization is also important.

Applying both Nitrogen and Phosphorus directly in the row with the sprig is highly recommended. By this method most of the fertilizer is used by the sprig and not by other grass and weeds between the rows. Cultivating Coastal Bermuda the first year after planting is becoming more popular. Land owners report better and thicker stands the first year. Rotary hoes and spike toothed harrows have also been used.

For a grazing program after the bermuda is well established Renner Experiment Station recommends an application of 40-40-0 per acre to be applied in April when Coastal begins to make active growth. This is to be followed in June and again in September with an application of Nitrogen. This gives high quality production through the growing season including the dry summer months.

The figures from Renner also show a return of \$2.88 up to \$4.51 for each dollar spent for fertilizer. With these odds who can afford not to fertilize?

Coastal Bermudagrass in the Muenster-Saint Jo area can and will pay off with big dividends. For further information contact your local SCS office.

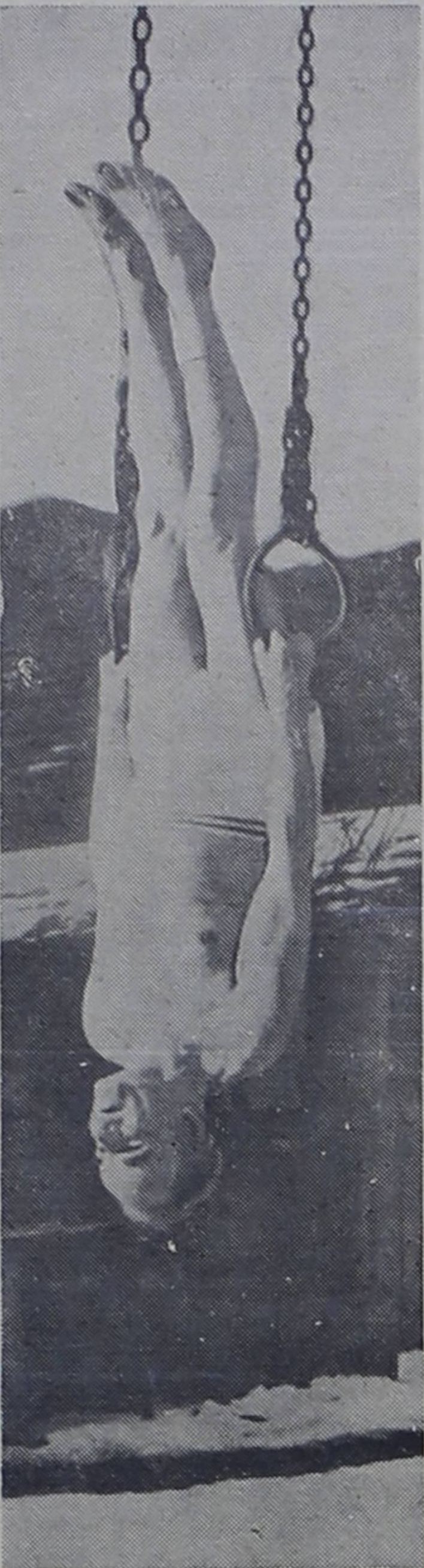

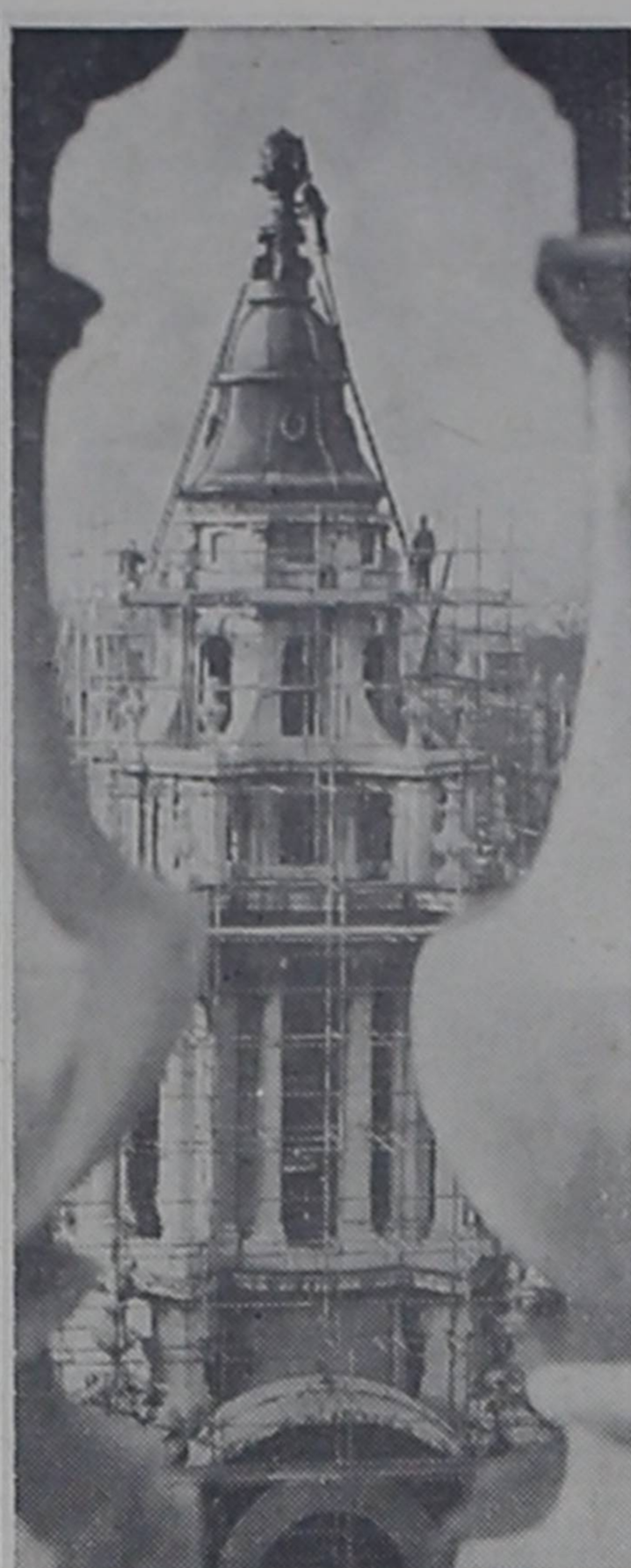
