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Addition to City Will Be Discussed At Hearing Dec. 2

A public hearing to consider the proposed annexation of an area of about six blocks will be held in the city hall Monday, December 2, starting at 7:30.

The purpose, as explained by Mayor Earl Fisher, is to arrive at an understanding of responsibilities of the city and of property owners if the annexation is made.

An application requesting admission to the city has been signed and submitted by Albert Henschel, Henry Pels Jr., Al Hess, Ervin Henschel, Dick Trachta, Rufus Henschel and Frank Schilling.

Subjects to be discussed at the hearing include an anticipated schedule of improvements and tax rates that will apply before and after the improvements. After that the annexation deal is subject to approval of both the city and the applicants.

Then came three gains of 15, 7 and 33 putting Bishop Dunne on the scoreboard. Riedel made the TD and Sinclair (Continued on page 4)

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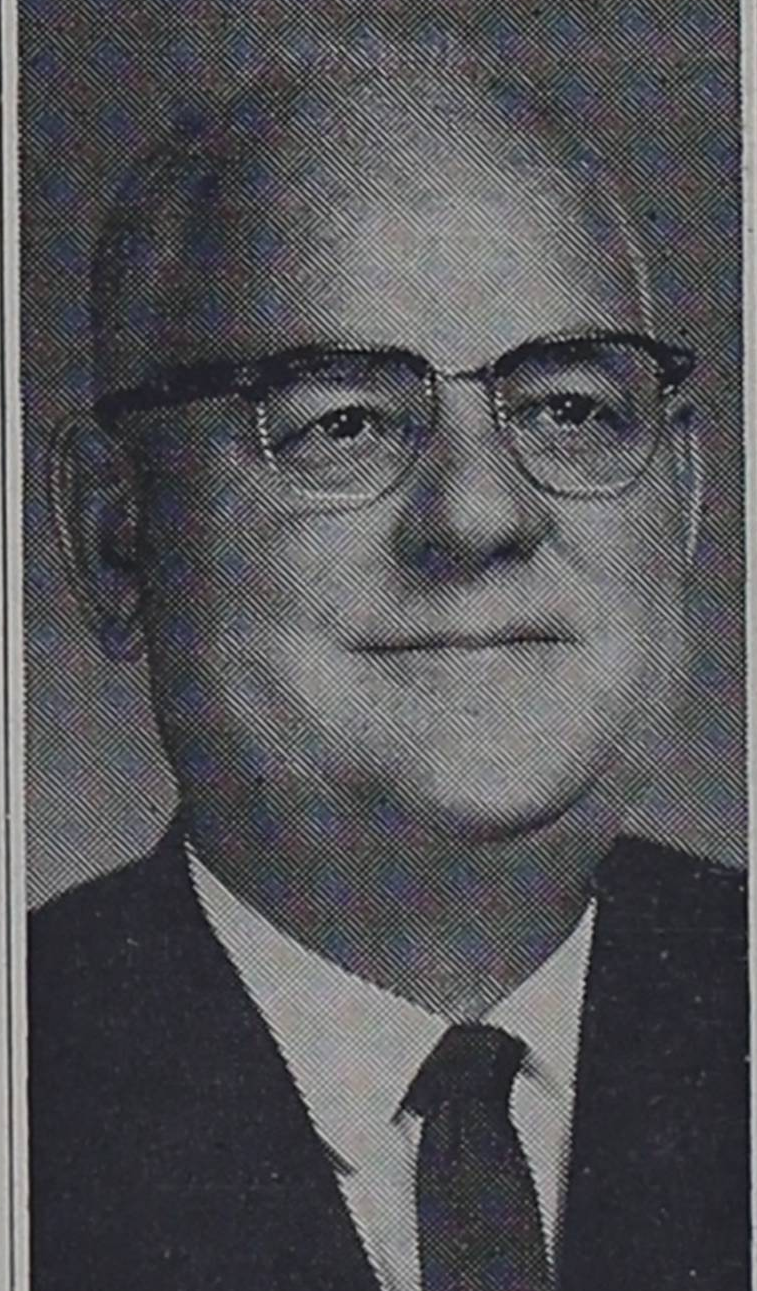
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had sufficient bookkeeping in the operation of my grocery business to qualify me to efficiently handle the Tax Assessor and Collector's office.

WHAT WILL BE 'GREAT CRISIS' BEFORE ELECTION

The Burlington Free Press is offering \$50 to the reader who first names the "Great Crisis" that may be expected just before the election of 1964.

The Free Press reminds its

readers that President John F. Kennedy announced on Oct. 22, 1962 — just two weeks before the congressional elections of November 6 — that he had "discovered" that Soviet Russia had started building an aggressive missile base in Cuba (Human Events would like to add that Sen. Kenneth Keating and others had made the discovery several months before October 22.)

The Free Press then says: "Next year President Kennedy himself will be running for re-election so Vermonters may properly wonder if a crisis will occur in September or October of 1964 . . . the party in power may be helped great-

ly when the nation is caught up in crises at election time." The contest goes like this: Vermont readers are invited to send a sealed letter to the "Crisis Editor." All letters will be time-stamped upon arrival and placed in a bank vault unopened until Nov. 1, 1964 — only two days before the election.

On that date, the Crisis Editor will open the letters beginning with the earliest date-time stamp. The first letter writer who has correctly predicted the crisis will be named the winner.

In its announcement, the Burlington Free Press does not mention one angle that is frequently discussed in Washington: Khrushchev is a strong Kennedy supporter and will do what he can to insure Kennedy's election.

Khrushchev told Drew Pearson when the columnist interviewed him in Russia that before the 1960 election he told Averell Harriman he wanted Kennedy to be elected. Khrushchev added that he (Khrushchev) thought Kennedy would be most helped if he said and did nothing (See Pearson column Aug. 29, 1961).

However, in 1962 came Khrushchev's chance for a positive act that would help Kennedy. Two weeks before the congressional elections Kennedy delivered his ultimatum to the Soviet Union to withdraw its troops and missiles from Cuba. Khrushchev agreed.

The Kennedy ultimatum and Khrushchev's "meek surrender" reversed the election trend. In mid-October, political experts believed that the Democrats would lose from 3 to 8 seats in the Senate and from 25 to 45 in the House. If the Democrats had lost 44 House seats, the GOP would have had the majority and been able to organize and control the House.

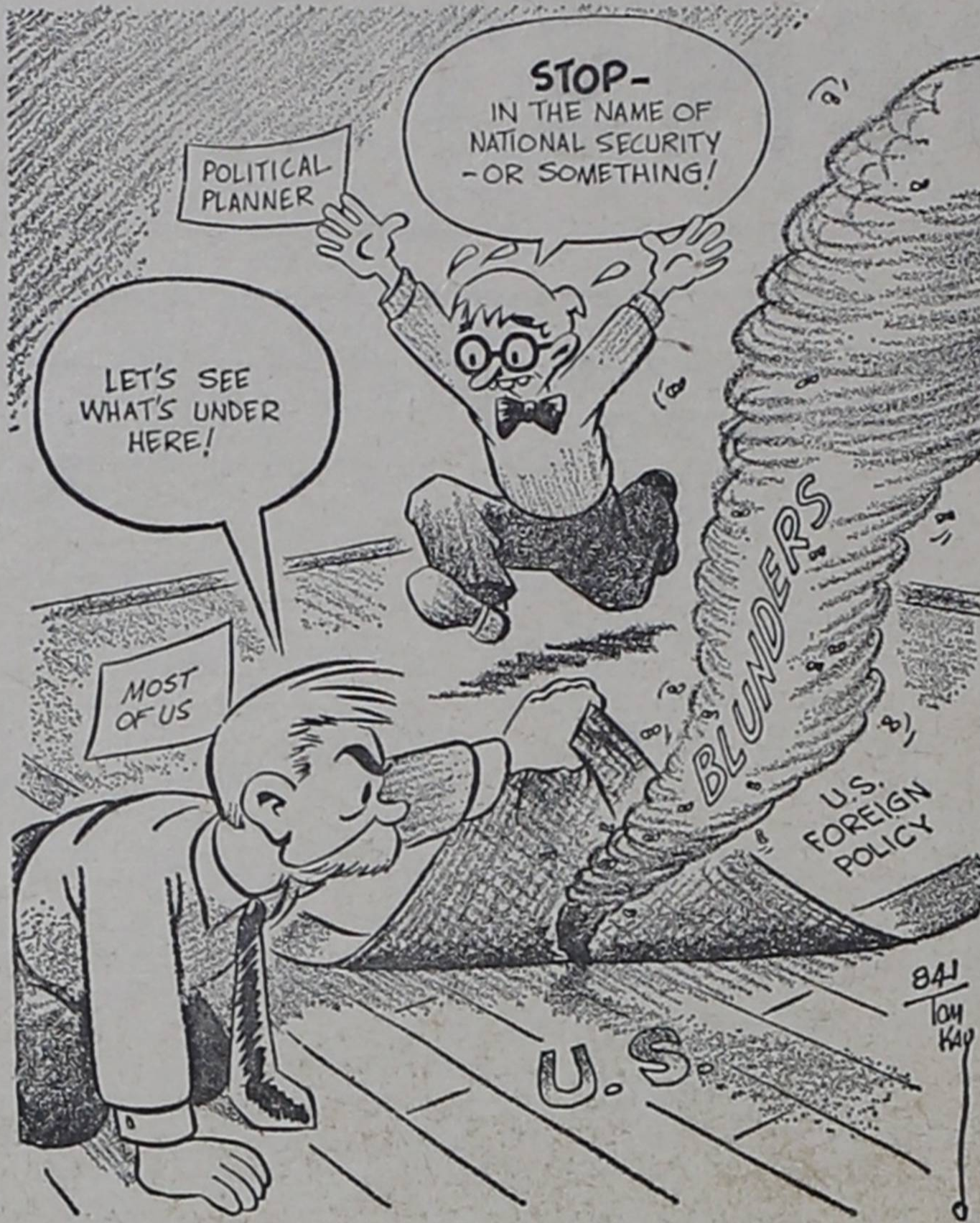
Instead, as a result of Kennedy's Cuban 'coup', the Democrats suffered a net loss of only two seats in the House and surprisingly made a net gain of four seats in the Senate.

Russian troops and missiles are still in Cuba. Cynics think they may again be used to help re-elect JFK in 1964.

TOO MANY VITAMINS SPOIL THE FORMULA

Warning to vitamin-happy Americans: You may be doing yourself more harm than good. Too many vitamins are dangerous, say dieticians at the University of Michigan Medical Center. Overnutrition can be as serious as malnutrition, causing irritability, skin disorders, and kidney and stomach ailments. Youngsters in particular are victimized by overfortified formulas; actually the healthy baby or adolescent needs no vitamins to supplement balanced meals. Vitamins, the researchers say, are best taken in nature's "packages" — vegetables, fruits, milk, meats and whole grain or enriched bread and cereal.
