Paul Fetsch Has Two Leaders in **April DHIA Report** A cow owned by Paul Fetsch produced almost 3,000 pounds of milk during the month of April to lead all others in the Cooke County Dairy Herd Improvement Association. The report was made public by County Agent Neil Tibbets. The cow produced 2,870 pounds of milk. Another of Fetsch's cows produced 5.3 per cent butterfat milk to lead all others in that category. A cow owned by Richard Frasher produced the most butterfat - 90 pounds. Fourteen cows in the Association produced more than a ton of milk for the month. They are in herds owned by Tommy Knabe, Fetsch, Felderhoff and Sicking, Paul Fisher, Frasher and Hi-Lo Farms. D&F Dairy had 85 cows in milk and 12 dry during the month to lead other dairies in the area. Frasher's herd averaged 1,240 pounds of milk to lead other herds in production, and tied with H. C. and Leroy Hay in average pounds of butterfat — 45. A total of 141 cows produced more than 50 pounds of butterfat for the month, and average pounds of butterfat per cow was 37. Average pounds of milk per cow was 1,050.


