Three times to date the current request for foreign aid has been whittled down. Now, if only it can be trimmed once or twice more by the Senate before its final approval perhaps it will get down to a size that we the people will find

more to our liking.

When the House vote came last week slashing the appropriation to \$3.5 billion, Administration folks were definitely unhappy. President Kennedy denounced the action and laid the blame on Republicans, conveniently forgetting that Democrats have a whopping majority in the House, hence that there must be substantial opposition in his own party as well as in the other. Incidentally, the president also seems to forget that he himself had a record of consistently voting against foreign aid while he was in the Sen-

As it looks from here Congressmen were not just being cantankerous when they decided to reduce this year's foreign aid give-away. More likely they were heeding the many reports of outright waste and of direct and indirect help to our enemies. Doubtless they were also influenced by the flood of unfavorable opinion from folks back home.

Still another factor that might have influenced them is our dwindling gold reserve. Credits already built up in other countries, largely as a result of foreign aid gifts, already far exceed our available supply of gold. If confronted by a demand for payment we'd have to default and our monetary system would be in a mess. We're like a bank with insufficient funds to pay off its depositors. Certainly we're not in a financial condition to keep on giving.



On the average, at least 50 different food items are used in family meals in a week. This is reported by Janet Murray and Ennis Blake in the Yearbook for Agriculture,

The U.S. Department of Agriculture researchers based their facts on information obtained from more than 6,000 householders.

Meals of the average family for a week included about 10 pounds of vegetables and fruit, 4.5 quarts of milk or corresponding amounts of cheese and ice cream, 4 pounds of meat, 7 eggs, 1 pound of fat, 1.5 pounds of sugar, and 3 pounds of cereal products for each person.



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
