Paving and re-surfacing on about 20 blocks of Muenster streets will begin some time between August 1 and 15. That is the word from Street Commissioner Ray Otto.

At its meeting Monday night the city council awarded the paving contract to J. C. Mc-Cauley and Associates of Hillsboro. In a phone call Tuesday Otto learned the approximate date for starting.

Otto also stated that property owners this year will get a better deal on paving than before. The contractor's bid was lower and the saving has been passed on to citizens. The city's charge to property owners will be 67.5 cents per square yard. The charge on the previous project was 72

It was also pointed out that property owners will be charged for new pavement only. If none exists now they pay from curb to center of street the length of their front footage. If narrow pavement exists they pay from curb to the edge of old pavement. Owners do not pay for re-surfacing, however, so they do not pay for another coat on old pavement.

This year's project will consist of a complete job on all the designated streets, that is full width new pavement, widening narrow pavement to full width, and resurfacing old pavement.

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





Now you go to bed and your supper is converted into fat rather than energy as would have been the case had you eaten properly during hours of greatest activity.



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Know Your Soils CDA Begins Plans

"My neighbor really has his problems. Last year he planted 30 acres of alfalfa on a nearly level field of gray colored heavy clay soils. The alfalfa came up all right, but as soon as the spring rains came the entire field died out. He knows now this was because of the poorly drained heavy clayey soils. He, too, could have found out about his soils before planting alfalfa. Not only did he lose the use of that 30 acres for the summer, but also was out the cost of seed, fertilizer, and all of his hard labor."

"My son planted a peach orchard four years ago on his sandy land farm. The first year the trees did very well, but in the second and third year, over one-third of the trees died. We later found out that some 18-24 inches under the sandy surfaced orchard site lies a heavy stiff yellow and gray colored clay subsoil. When the heavy spring rains came, his sandy land readily took up moisture, but where the heavy subsoil occurred most of the moisture was prevented from going on down and the feeder roots stood in water until they turned sour and the trees died. Now this was a costly lesson for my son to learn, but it will not happen again for he now knows his soils."

You, too, can learn about your soil from the Soil Conservation Service people working in the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District. Ask them for a free copy of the new USDA publication, "Know Your Soil." This well written, illustrated bulletin contains vital soil information for the farmer, suburban dweller with a problem in his garden or engineer looking for a building site, highway right-of-way or lake site. It explains how soil scientists of the Department of Agriculture are gradually mapping the soils of this country and what these maps mean to every citizen. 
