You remind yourself that good still triumphs over evil; that those who live by the laws of



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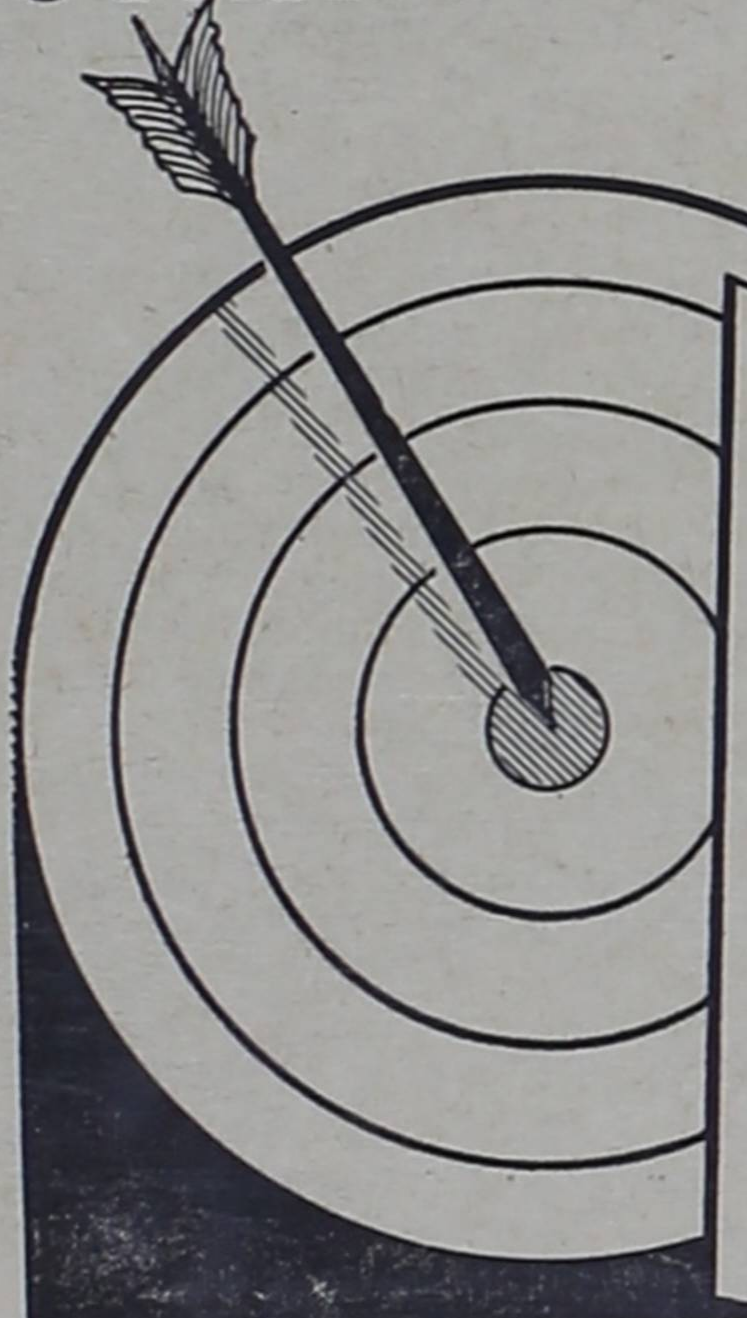

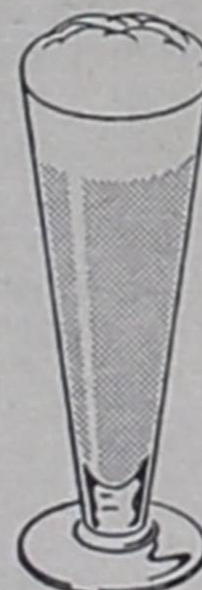

God are in the heavy majority. But you also know that only the foolish can be indifferent to the corruption and back-alley ethics that occur with sickening frequency. If it's not slanted oil drilling in Texas, it's stolen votes in Chicago, embezzlement in Brooklyn, Billie Sol and B Girls.

Lest we forget, the rotten in our human barrels can despoil the pure. One weak nerve weakens the entire spine, and when the spine is weak the body wails.

LET'S FACE IT, we have lived high, wide and recklessly handsome since those sacrificial days 20 years ago when we fought in our higher hours against Hitler.

In the generation since, our incomes have more than doubled. So has our crime.

Giving to charities has tripled. So has the breeding of illegitimate children.

We boast that factory workers make upwards of \$3 an hour, but in that 60 minutes the nation commits 300 serious felonies.

We spend \$50,000,000 a year on pep pills to be alert by day — and an equal amount on sleeping pills to be numb at night.

More young people go to church than ever before, says a dispatch — but 10- to 17-year-olds commit 62 per cent of all auto thefts, 55 per cent of the burglaries and 30 per cent of the rapes.

Why such conduct, which stuns the sensibilities of the conscientious?

Basically, we think, it is the lure of abundance and the passion for ease. Material opulence is no sin; to acquire it by a corrupt cunning is.

To want, and to work, for the material blessings of this life is admirable; but, once acquired, to give them priority over the spirit and soul is to poison the fibers of morality.

IN READING and deploring these scandalous improprieties, one realizes, too, the sad examples of a government which penalizes sacrifice, discourages thrift, rewards indolence and operates increasingly on the Freudian theory that the individual has no real responsibility — he is just the helpless victim of a society whom the government must protect, excuse and support.

That government taxes the most successful 90 cents out of each dollar earned, then recommends that loafers be given up to \$40 a week six months of the year for not working.

When the successful die, nearly half of what they have accumulated after a life of hard work — and which legitimately belongs to their loved ones — is taken by a government which has no moral right to it. Is this economic justice — or is it theft?

By law, this government permits unions to conspire in a strike that can drive an industry's back to the wall — but, by law, if that industry conspires against the union it is prosecuted in court. Such injustice by law breeds immorality outside the law.

Boys drafted into the Army are put on bread and water if they disobey orders; union carpenters making \$6 an hour at a strategic missile base sit down and strike and are rewarded with \$6.35.

AN OCCASIONAL ray of human light encourages. Bill Thompson and Bryon Ford, West Texas fertilizer dealers, will sell everything they have so that 50 farmers will get back \$60,000 lost in the Estes deals. And at this writing nobody has jumped out of a window in a market plunge that has dropped the value of securities \$100,000,000,000 since January.

But it's time for us all to pull a Book down from its dusty shelf. As a nation we have become like the man in Christ's parable whose barn was full and who ate, drank and made merry.

We should re-read some basics: "Thou shalt not steal... thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's goods... go to the ant, thou sluggard, consider her ways and be wise."

That is the Holy Bible, not Freud. That must be America, if it climbs to the heights and leaves on the parchments of history a story of noble aspirations.

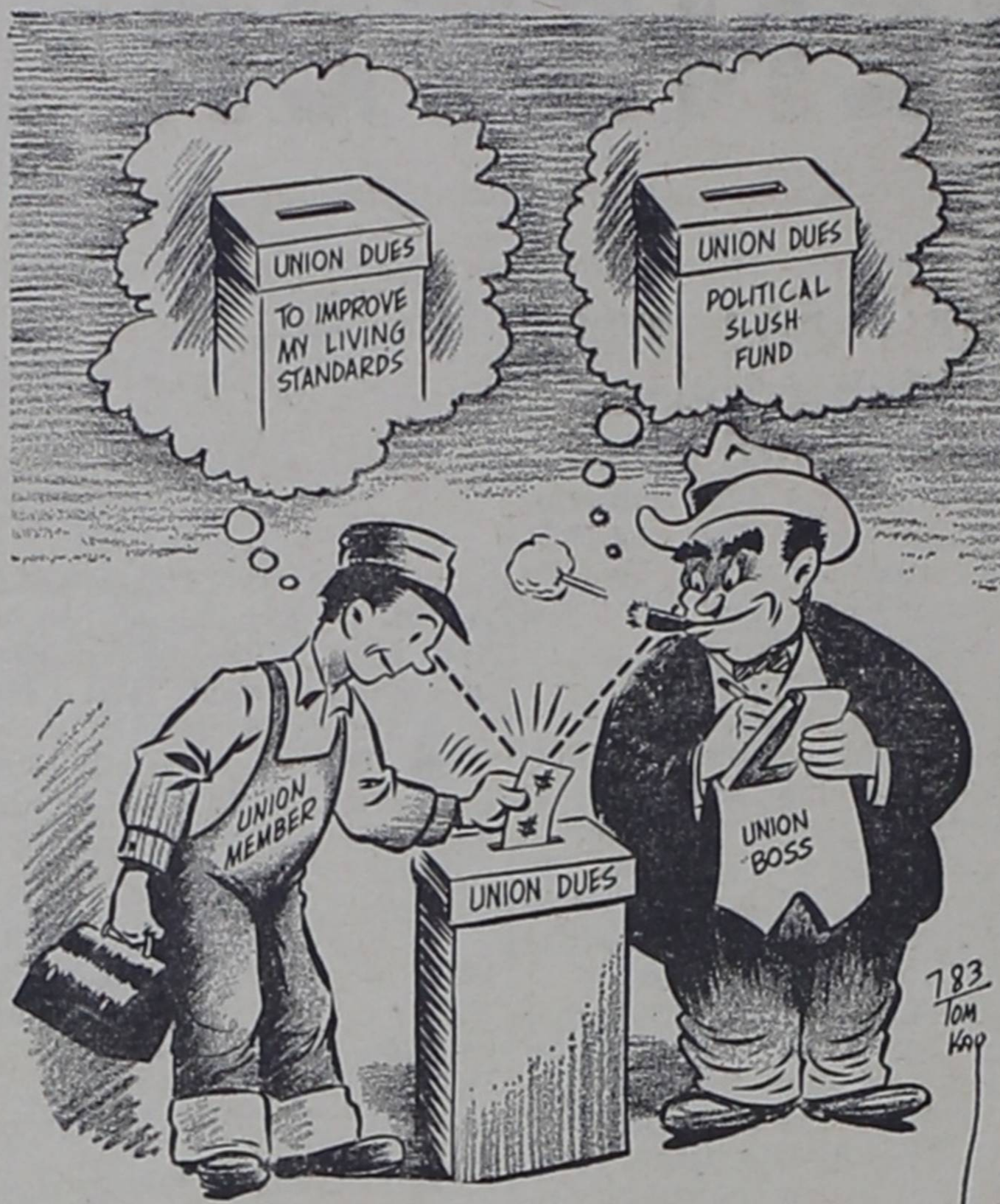

A JUNGLE OF CHAOS

During two federal administrations — one Democratic and the other Republican — a commission was appointed and headed by former President Herbert Hoover to bring back some semblance of sanity to the business of Government.

In the past 30 years, government has exploded, to use a term often employed in the industrial world to illustrate enormous and undisciplined growth. The Commission found its work a nightmare. They found themselves operating in a jungle of regimented chaos.

There are thousands of examples of their findings which make fantastic reading. There was one department of government which went into the commercial market of Washington, D.C., to buy just 40 office chairs. Somehow, through duplication of effort and duplication of paper work, they wound up with not only the 40 chairs they needed, but with 1,055 other chairs for which they had no possible use.

There was another department which had about \$20 million worth of spare parts for machinery on the market as surplus. The parts were being offered at a mere fraction of their value. The Hoover Commission found the same department had orders in at that very moment for \$20 million more of exactly the same kind of machinery parts they were selling as surplus.

The Post Office Department

was buying concrete pillars to hold up mail boxes. They bought from the lowest bidder, a firm on the East coast, at a price of about \$3 per pillar. Then they were shipping the pillars out to the West coast at a transportation cost of about \$14 per pillar. They could have bought concrete pillars on the West coast for West coast use at about \$4 each.

The Hoover Commission goes on and on with such facts as seem almost unbelievable but which are true and which are costing the American taxpayer right through the pocketbook.

A hundred years ago, the French philosopher Alexis de Tocqueville, one of the most brilliant analysts of the American scene ever to visit our shores, had this to say about the United States: "Their democracy will last until those in power learn that they can perpetuate themselves through taxation."

Now think back to most of the political campaigns which you have witnessed in your lifetime. What has been the predominate theme? Promises of what the candidate would do for you if you elected him. And whose money does any political office holder have to do all these things for you? Why your money, of course — through taxes!

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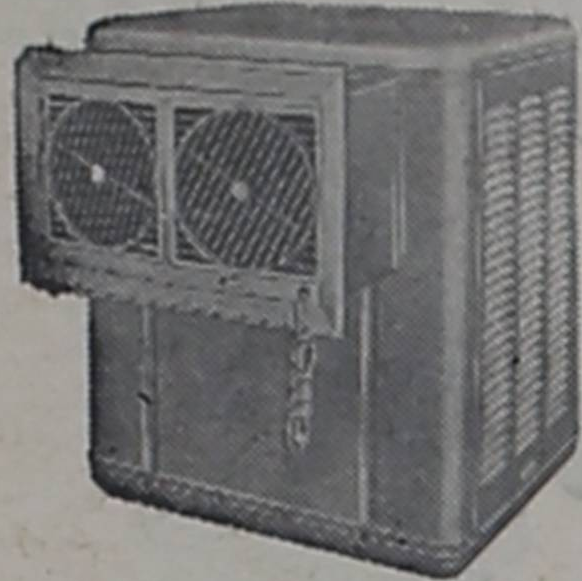
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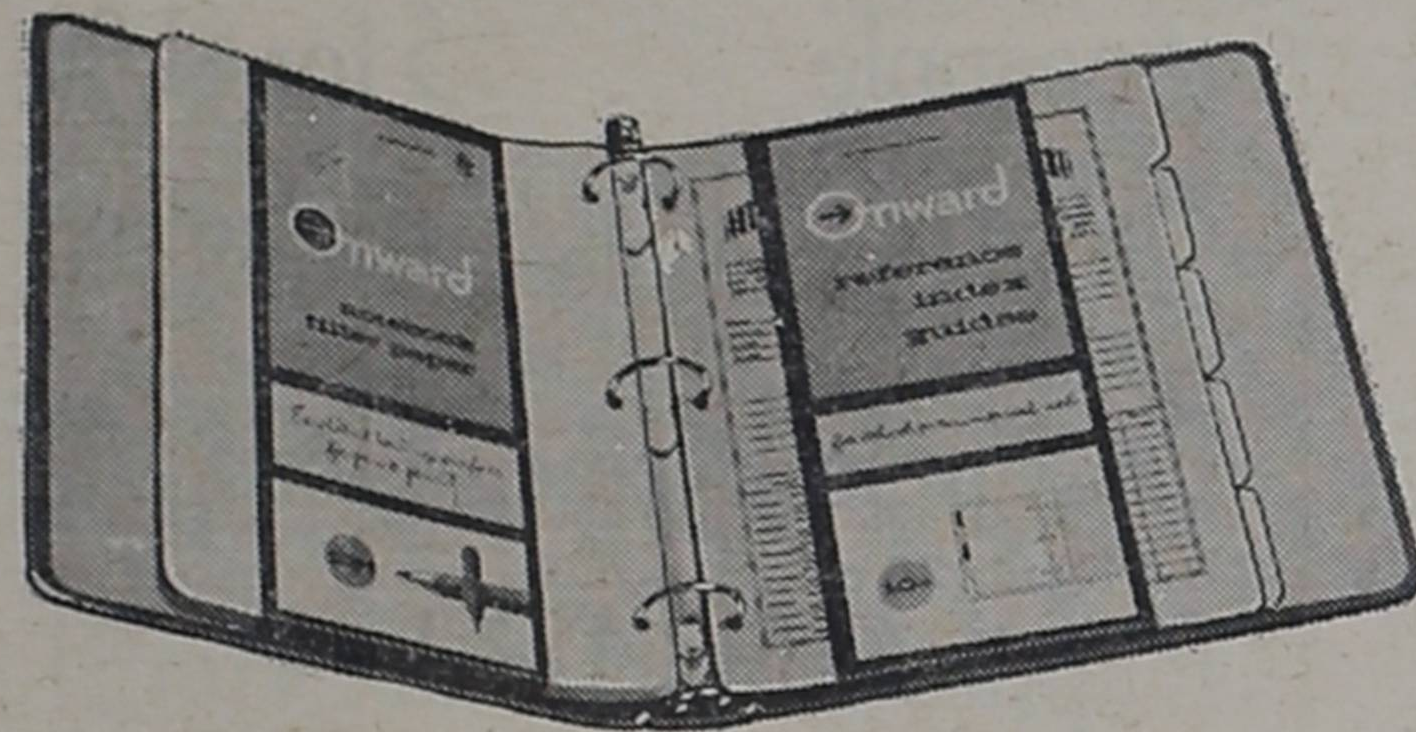
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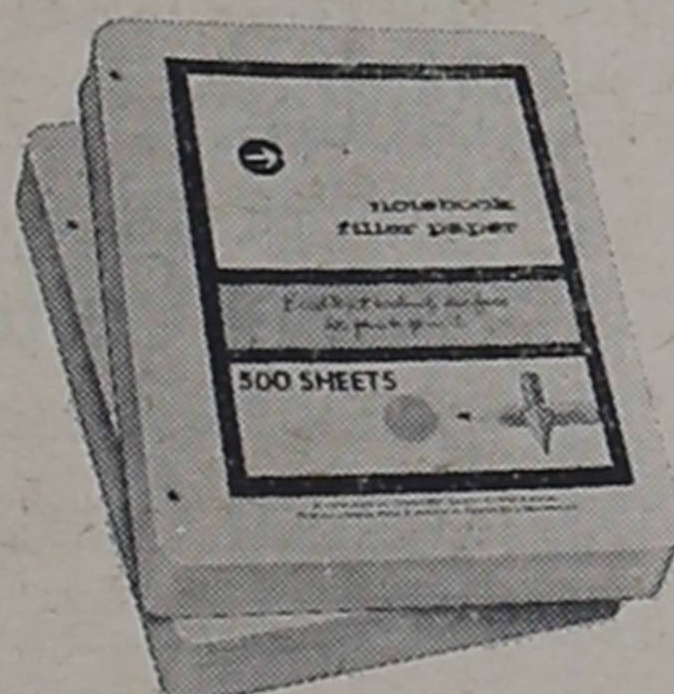
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**Nuptial Unites

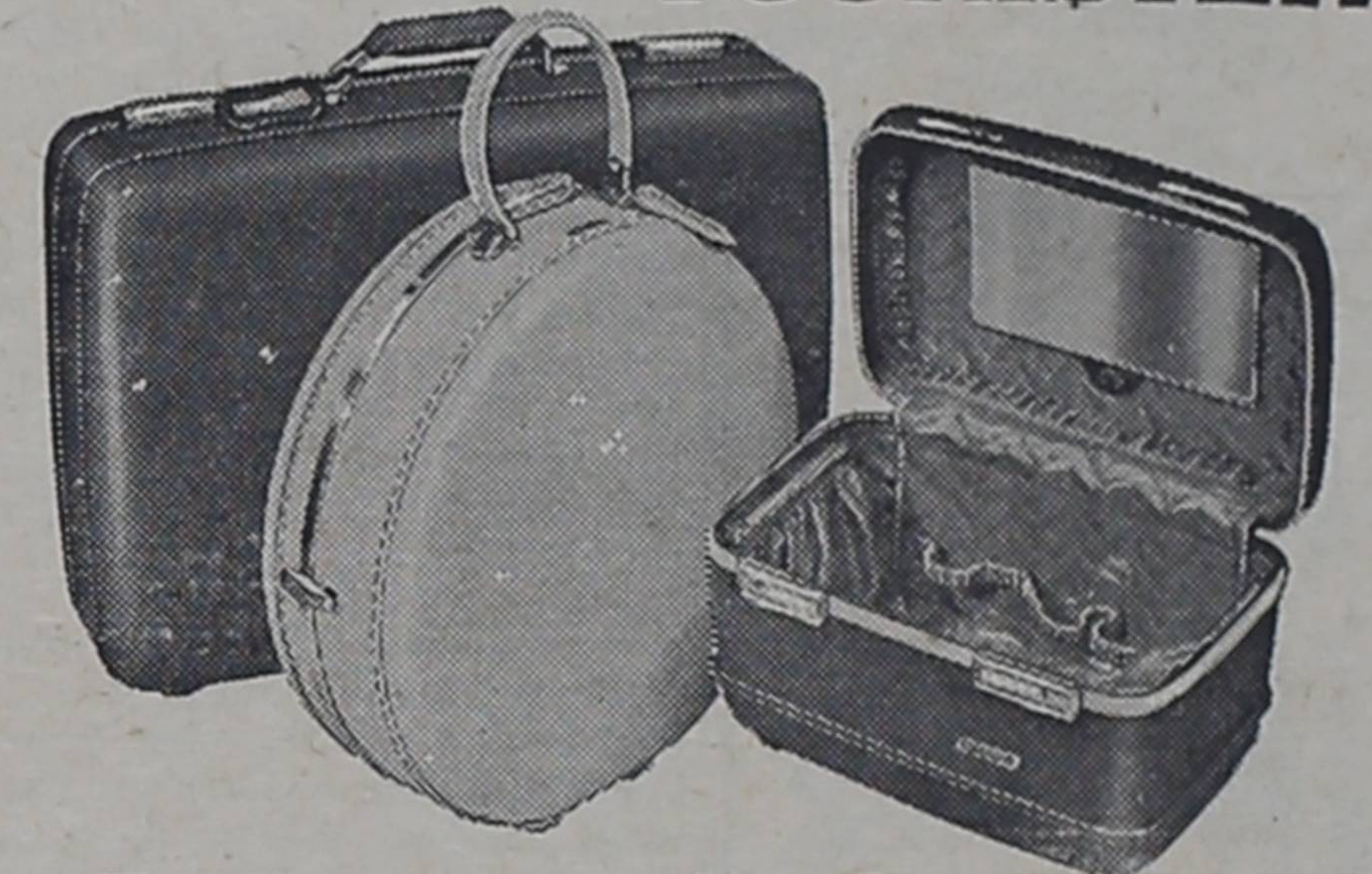
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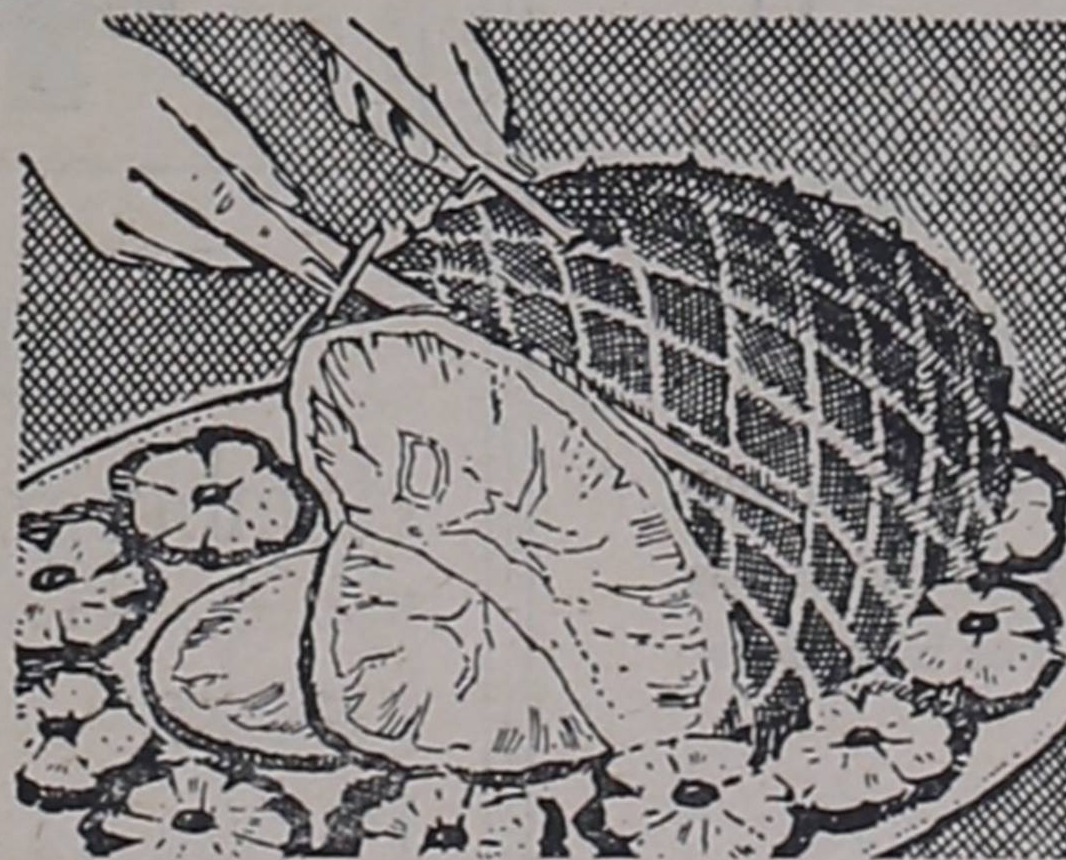
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Parish Youth Club Sends Delegates to Diocesan Seminar

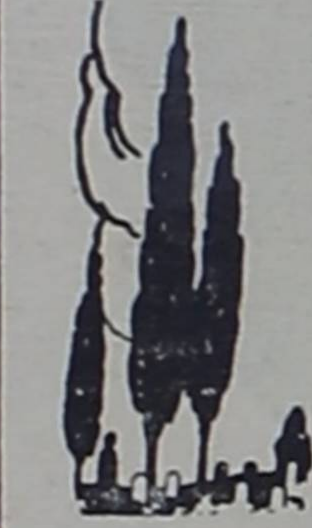

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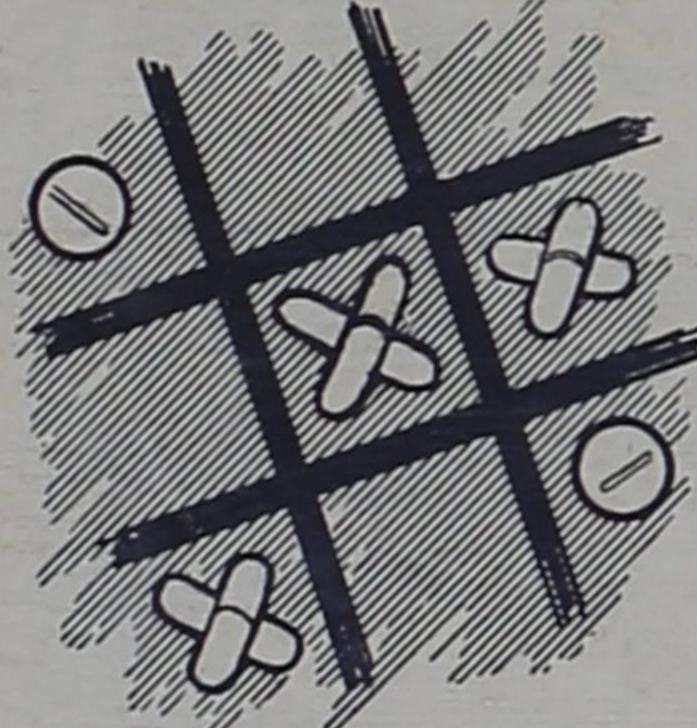
