Facts About Income Tax

Ellis Cambell, Jr. of the Dallas Internal R venue office explained today that exemptions on Fed ral tax returns are never prorated because of the birth or death or a dependent during the taxable year.

If a child was born alive at any time during the year, you can claim the full \$600 exemption if all other dependency tests are met. This is true even though the child may have lived only momentarily. It is also true for a child born on the last day of the year. An exemption may not be claimed for a stillborn

If a dependent dies during the year and all other dependency test have been met the full \$600 exemption is allowable. For example: -Your mother died on January 15 -. She had no income and you furnished all of her support until the date of her death. You may claim the full \$600 exemption.
