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Pathetic stories come from Hong Kong nowadays about thousands of refugees from Red China being sent back by the British authorities because the food supply is not adequate to take care of them. We can imagine the depth of those poor people's despair and frustration on finding after their flight to freedom that they must go back to the hunger and desolation they risked their lives to escape.

Some reports tell that the communists are deliberately permitting the escapes. Their propagandists find this a convenient opportunity to tell the people first, that they are not wanted and second, that food shortage exists in other places as well as China. We can suspect also that they derive a certain sadistic pleasure from driving those heartbroken people back to their former misery.

This is another incident the free nations fumbled in a big way. Besides giving the reds an abundance of propaganda material they blasted the hopes of millions who have been yearning for freedom. Imagine the bitter disappointment of those who must go back, the shattered dream of those who planned to leave.

All this is tragically similar to the situation in Europe after the war. Thousands of refugees were rounded up by the allies and sent back to Russia. None wanted to go. Many killed themselves to avoid returning. And most of them are known to have been sent directly to slave camps. History has told us this much of red methods but we still go on playing into their hands.

Finally, people are waking up and trying to do something about it. Nationalist Chinese, with plenty of their own problems, said they will find a way to provide for all refugees who come to them. And American senators are talking about sending surplus foods for feeding the refugees. But you can bet that nothing will be done. We'll talk until it's too late. And Britain, quaking for fear of losing Hong Kong, will be reluctant to antagonize China. In the end Red China will profit from this incident, whereas it should have been a big loser.

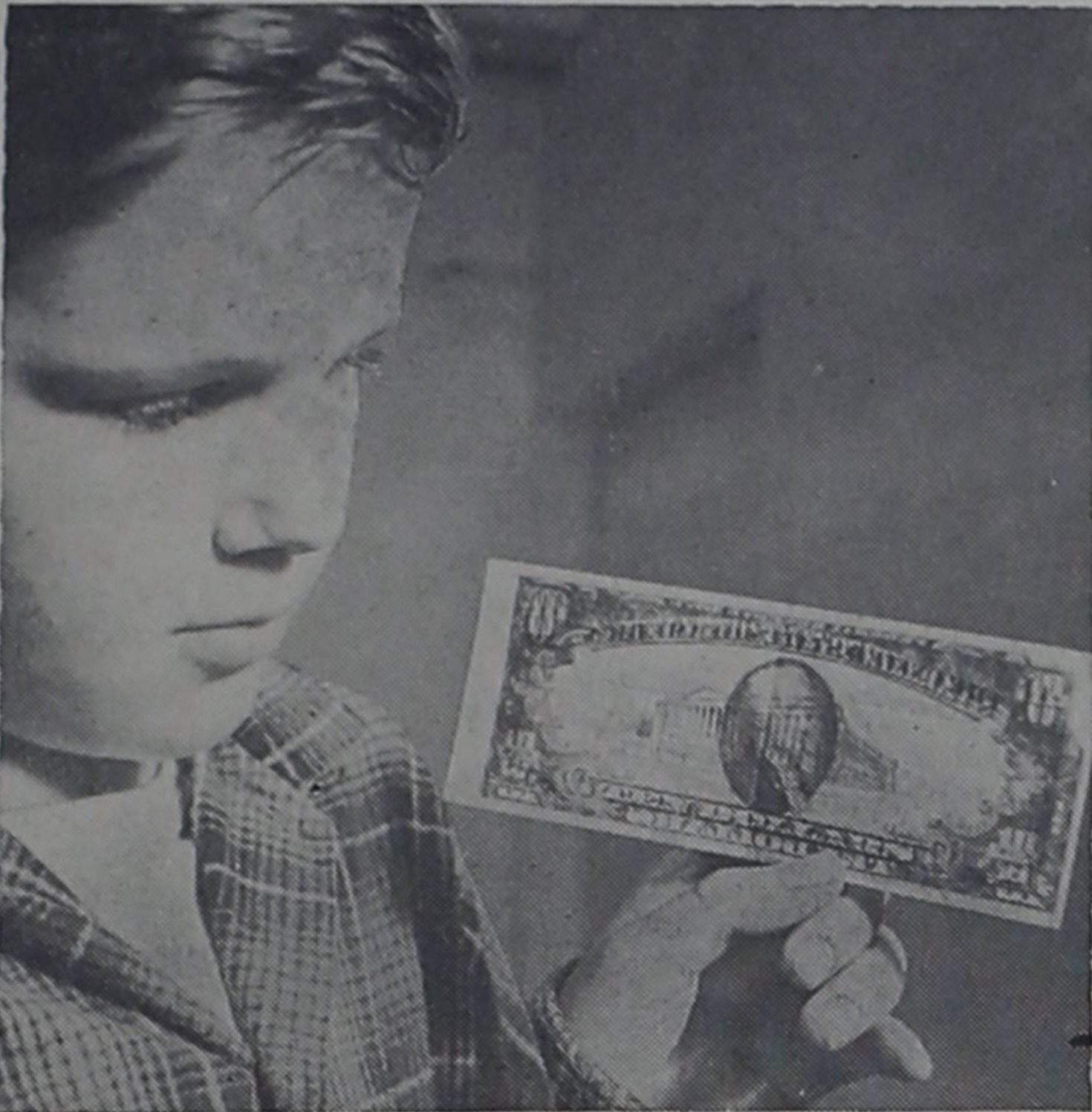
This situation is all the more discouraging when considered in relation to other events of Southeast Asia. Commies are again pressing their aggression in Thailand, Laos and New Guinea. They are providing more than enough provocation to justify retaliation by free peoples. Meanwhile Australia, New Zealand and the Philippines have expressed willingness to help US and the defending nations to stop the red conquest. And Nationalist Chinese can be automatically counted in. They have been ready since the day they left the mainland, always confident that the masses of downtrodden Chinese would eagerly join them in a war of liberation . . . and recent mass escapes indicate a favorable attitude in China right now.

Counting all factors, this seems like a good time to accept the communist challenge of conquest. For years they have been inching forward, consolidating gains with each cease fire agreement, relentlessly advancing toward their goal of world domination. Here, it seems, is both the provocation and the opportunity to retaliate. But you can bet that nothing will be done about it. We still choose to ignore the ultimate red objective. We still prefer to be taken in by the treacherous talk of co-existence.

How about the report that Castro has a belly full of Soviet influence and is trying now to become another Tito? Apparently he has managed to plant information in South American diplomatic circles for leaking to this country that he no longer regards Moscow help as helpful to him and his people. He likes the Tito set-up much better. That way he hopes to be the real big shot of Cuba, not pushed around by Khrushchev's pressure boys, and in the bargain could get a lot of easy money from us.

What could be nicer? An arrogant dictator financed by the country he despises. Such an ambition is understandable, but there's good reason to doubt that the scheme is on the level. Surrounded by Russian cut throats as he is, does anyone, even himself, believe that he could shake loose from Khrushchev? It's more likely that he and K are in cahoots, scheming to get some money out of this country.

## Snake was Cause Of Power Failure Saturday Evening

A snake was the cause of that power failure in Muenster, Myra and Lindsay last Saturday afternoon at 5:30. Kenneth Selby TP&L lineman, found the trouble maker a short time later, but it was not making trouble any more.

The five foot bull snake on a cross-arm had shorted out two high voltage wires, and automatic service restorers kicked in the power twice. The third time power remained out.

Going to the sub-station east of town Selby tried the manual service restorers. The power stayed on, indicating that the cause of trouble was probably removed, so he looked for what had been the cause. He found it shortly later. The dead snake was draped across a cross arm clear of the hot fires.

His explanation is that the three surges of high voltage current had dealt the snake a fatal blow but it still moved by reflex action and got away from the lines. Minutes later when current was restored it was in the clear. The reflex action was still apparent when the snake was removed from the cross arm.

Selby says such trouble is commonly caused by birds and squirrels, but this is the first time in his experience that the outage was caused by a snake.

## Swimming Pool To Open Saturday

Practically everything is ready at the city swimming pool for arrival of the 1962 swim season at 2 o'clock Saturday. Manager Glenn Richardson has water in the pool and is spending most of the time brightening the place with a new coat of paint. About the only job left is installation of dispensers for candies and soft drinks.

Operation of the place will be practically the same as it was last year, Richardson said. The two coin operated dispensers will handle all candy and soft drinks sales. And the pool will be open every day except Monday from 2 to 9. A slight change applies with regard to hours. In previous years the pool was closed early if no swimmers were there. This year it will remain open until 9 regardless. Admission, as before, is 40 cents for adults, 20 cents for children.

Lots of new paint has been added. The main pool has light blue bottom and walls with dark blue above the water line. The same colors are used in the kiddies' pool and the checking room. And most of the building has been painted. A special safety precaution is application of a non skid paint two feet wide around the edge of the pool. It's intended to prevent slipping.

Other work at the park includes installation of three floodlights for the picnic and playground area, repairing playground equipment and painting picnic tables.

## Poorer Yields of Grain Evident as Harvest Begins

Haying time is well advanced and grain harvest is just around the corner. For more than a week farmers of the community have been running overtime with their haying equipment and they're anxious to start the same schedule with grain harvesting equipment.

Up to Wednesday both local grain buyers have their first taste of the season's business. Stockmen's Feed Store has some barley. Muenster Milling Co. has some oats. Both report a poor quality of grain and a low yield.

The first of the wheat is expected late this week but the season's rush is still more than a week away. Yield of wheat, though probably not as good as the past three years, promises to be much better than other grain. It pulled through hard freezes. The rest was badly hurt.

Added storage space by Muenster Milling Company will eliminate rush period bottlenecks this year. Two big bins plus addition to the elevator brings the total capacity to about 20,000 bushels. A few years ago it was less than 5000 bushels. Another improvement is a new scale house for Muenster Mill.

## Need of Complete Education Urged In Bishop's Talk

The two fold purpose of a complete education as a preparation for this life and the next was emphasized by Bishop Thomas K. Gorman here Sunday night in his commencement address to high school and elementary graduates of Sacred Heart School.

He pointed out that the complexities of modern life are tremendously challenging and demand much greater knowledge and technical training of those who keep pace with progress and enjoy more of life's temporal blessings. To that end he urged all graduates to continue their studies and be more able to use the opportunities that come their way.

Even more important, he said, is the need of complete education which integrates moral and religious values with worldly values. It is essential as a guiding principle for spending a life in order and integrity, and, most of all it is a help for attaining eternal salvation.

The graduation exercises in Sacred Heart Church opened before the 7 p.m. mass with procession of 47 eighth grade graduates and 24 high school graduates, along with clergy. (Continued on page 8)

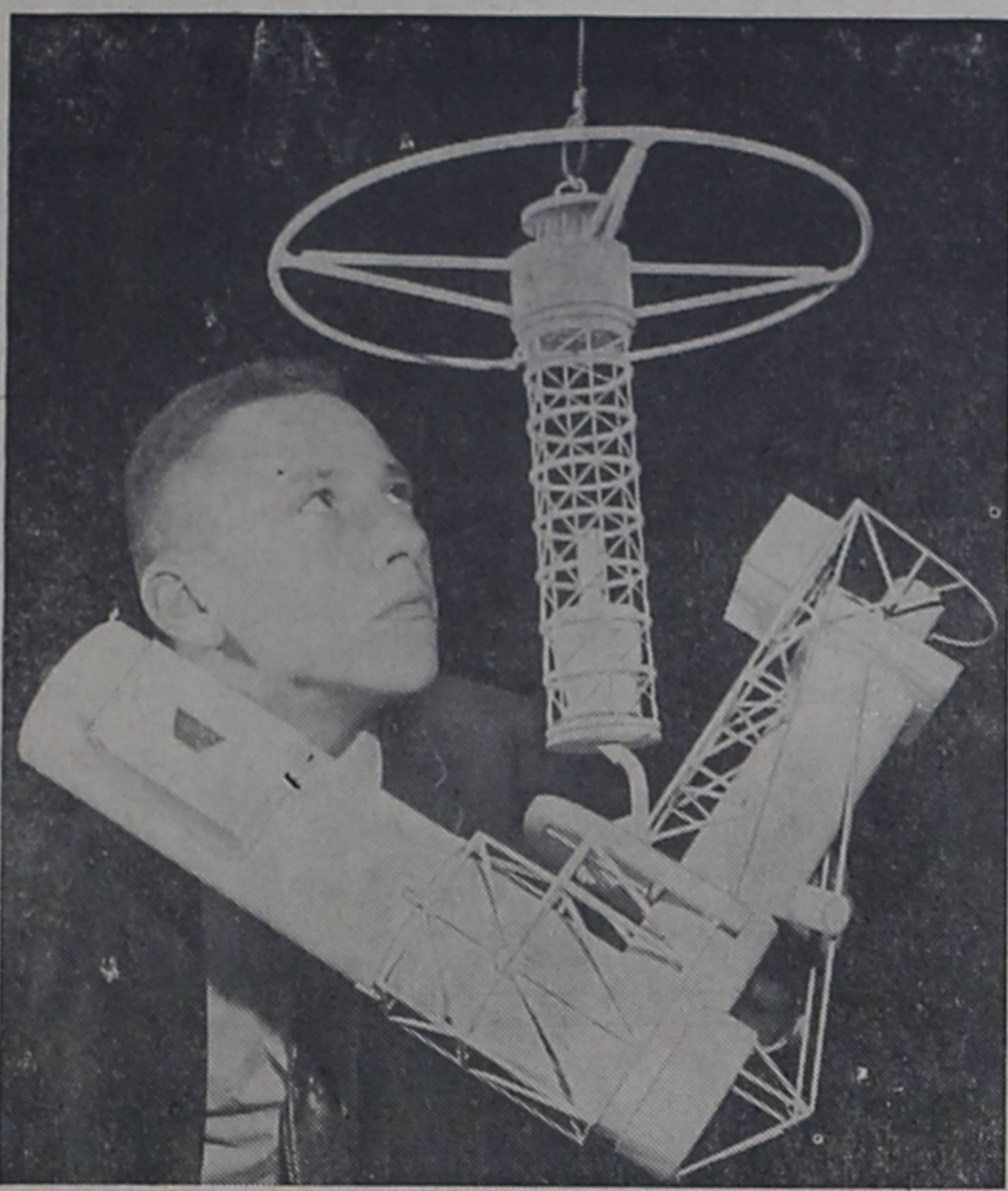

Civic League and Garden Club Marks 25th Anniversary

May meeting of the Muenster Civic League and Garden Club observed the silver anniversary of the organization. It was also guest day.

Program headliners included recognition of charter members and gifting them with corsages of violets, the club flower; a brief 25-year history of the club's activity; entertainment and refreshments.

Meeting was held in the auditorium at Muenster Public School with Mrs. T. S. Myrick and Mrs. Steve Moser as co-hostesses.

Twenty-one members and their guests attended. Business, conducted by Mrs. L. B. Bruns, president, was brief to permit more time for the program.

In reviewing club history, Mrs. Moser related that the Civic League had its origin in July 1937 in response to a request made by the late John E. Surratt of Dallas who was introducing the Kessler Plan to Muenster. He asked women of the community to organize to help insure Muenster's five year plan.

Thirty-five attended the first meeting and elected Mrs. John Furbach president. Other officers were Mrs. M. J. Endres, vice president, Mrs. John Mosman, secretary, and Miss Mary Becker, treasurer.

J. M. Weinzapfel who helped the women organize was at the anniversary program among guests.

Cemetery beautification and maintenance was then and still continues, as the club's major project. Success of the undertaking was made possible through cooperation of Father Frowin, pastor, and M. J. Endres, mayor who agreed the expense of watering should be shared by the parish and the city. The agreement still is in effect.

The club's flower show in 1938 was the first of its kind ever presented in Muenster.

In 1939 the League joined the Garden Club Federation and is since known as the Civic League and Garden Club.

When Mrs. Moser finished she asked for comments from the floor and Mr. Weinzapfel remarked "You women have persevered these 25 years through good organization and hard labor." Mrs. John Mosman responded with thanks and credit to Mr. Weinzapfel for the help and encouragement he gave at the start and has continued to give through the quarter century.

Charter members, those still holding membership and those attending as guests, were introduced.

The films were color movies on roses and chrysanthemums. Miss Bettye Dodds sang "In My Garden" and played her own piano accompaniment.

The hostesses served refreshments from a beautifully appointed table that held the crystal punch service and assorted party cookies. The floral complement consisted of white lilies and red amaryllis.

The June meeting, with Mrs. Jacob Pagel and Mrs. Arnold Rohmer as hostesses, will feature "Suggestions for Next Year's Yearbook" and Mrs. Joe Luke will show slides for the program.

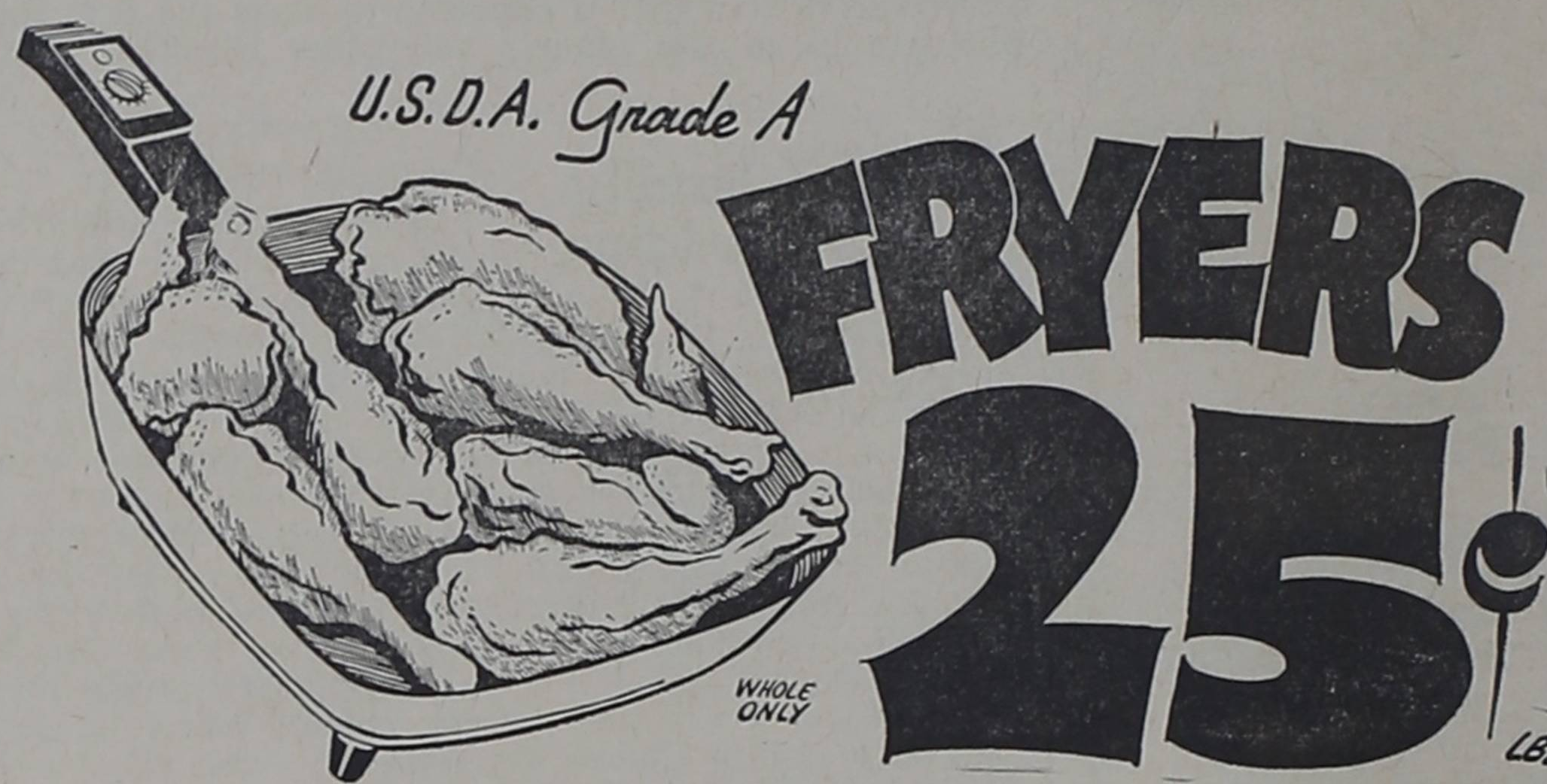

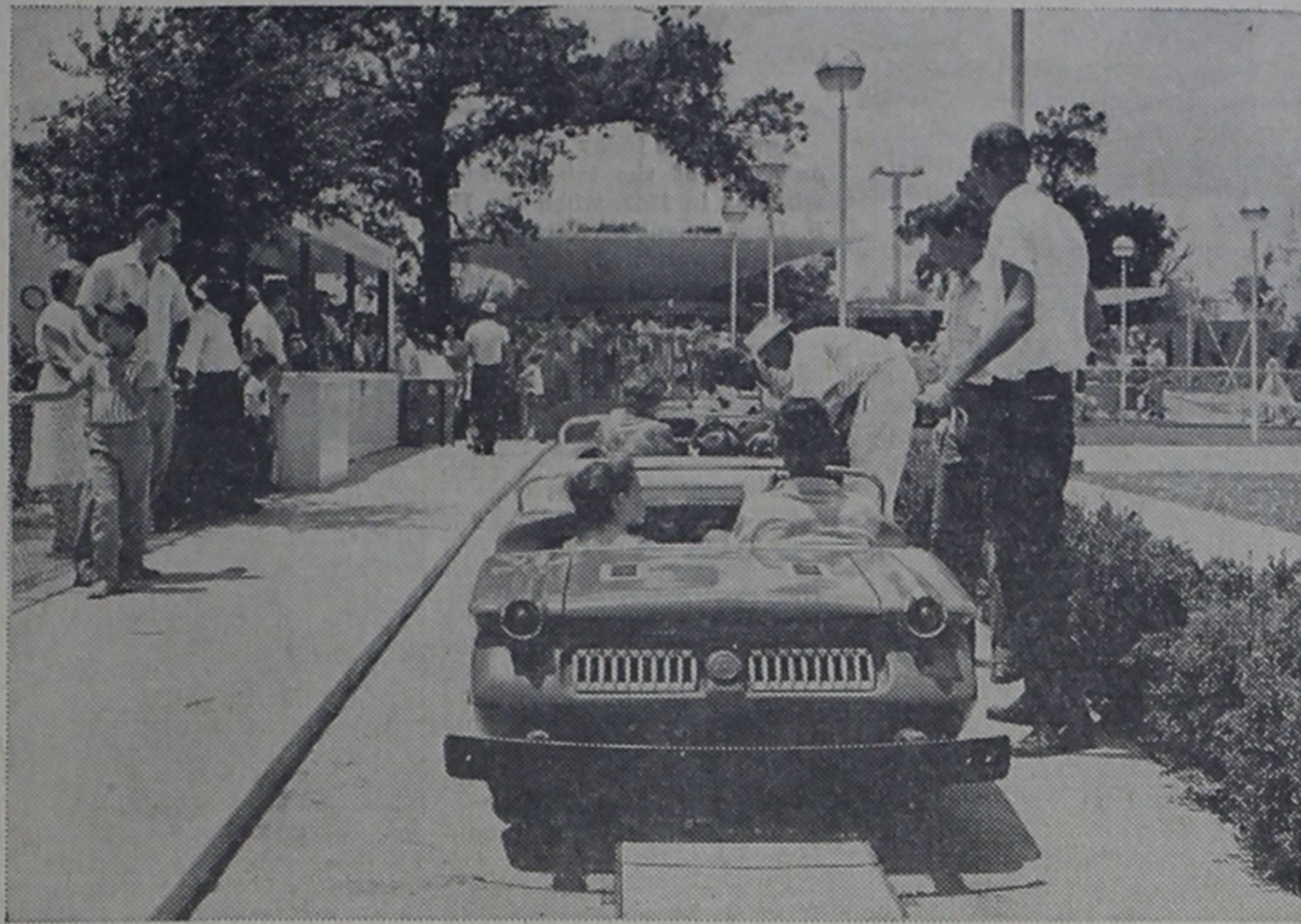

### WANTED BY THE FBI



Eugene Francis Newman

Newman is the alleged machine gun-carrying leader of a gang that attempted the robbery of an armored car carrying \$498,500 in American and Canadian currency in Buffalo, New York, on August 3, 1955. He and his associates, wearing silk stocking masks, engaged in a running gun battle with the truck's guards and Buffalo Police, and a machine gun bullet, allegedly fired by Newman, seriously wounded a guard. Two bandits were quickly apprehended but Newman remains at large.

A complaint, filed before a U.S. Commissioner at Buffalo, New York, on August 5, 1955, charges Newman with fleeing the State of New York to avoid prosecution for robbery.

Heavily armed, with a violent temper, Newman has previously been convicted for theft of Government property, interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle, petty larceny, and burglary.

He is a white American, reportedly born on October 3, 1928, at Brooklyn, New York, who is 5'8" tall, weighs 170 to 180 pounds, has blond hair, blue eyes, a medium build, and medium complexion.

He has scars near his right eye, on the back of his right hand and on the center of his left cheek. A birthmark appears on his upper left arm and a mole on his left index finger. Tattoos include the name "Danny" and a heart on the outside of his right forearm, and the number "13" within a dotted circle on the back of his left hand. He has worked as a bricklayer, clerk, construction worker, counterman, and laborer.

Besides all that it sets up a system of federal snooperism in medicine, the tragic effect of which is apparent in England now. Really, it's hard to believe that such a brainstorm can have so much support. What's the answer? Is the public that gullible or is someone rigging the reports?

## Farm Facts

Agriculture today makes up only 7% of the labor force, whereas in 1862, when the U. S. Department of Agriculture was established, farmers comprised well over half the labor force.

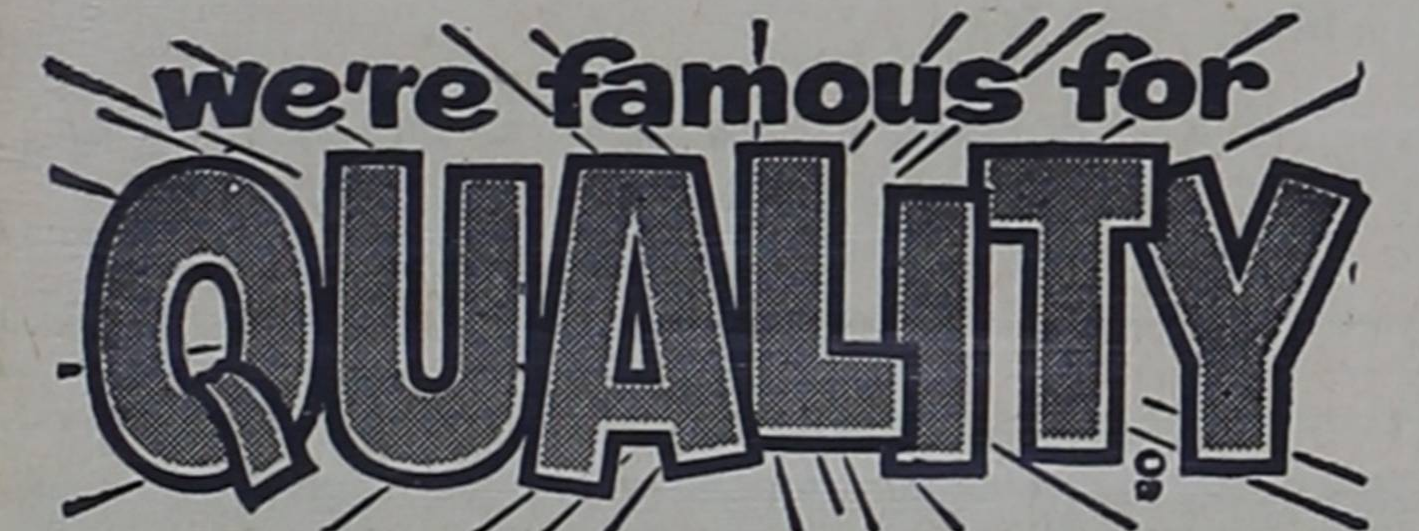
