The newest item of interest came from the Atomic Research laboratory in California. It consisted in a package of assorted radioactive substances. Each vial contains an element such as: Cobalt-60, Iron-55, Zinc-65, Sodium-22, and Phosphorus-32. Although potentially dangerous, the amounts are in small quantities of ten microcuries, and are sealed for pro-

Of all the demostrations made during the past school year, the most interesting were probably those which resulted in a useful product. Such is true in the preparation of soap, cold cream, fingernail polish, and nail polish remover. Also of interest in the laboratory was an ultraviolet light demonstration. This light supplies radiation for energizing fluorescent materials, and produced in drablooking rocks the most beautiful hues of pink and green.

Many experiments which are useful to industry included the distillation of water, the bleaching process, and tests for textile fibers. These and many more symbolize the important role chemistry plays in our daily life. Through research, chemistry will become even more valuable in the world of tomorrow.


