Stories of chaos, dishonesty, foul crimes, Communist intrigue are pouring forth from what our planners have wrought. The State Department people responsible for this outrage should long since have been removed from power.

The most spectacular achievement of this potpourri has been the U.N. invasions of Katanga. Here the force that was supposed to "preserve succeeding generations from the scourge of war," perpetrated war, atrocities, and destruction of hospitals, school and churches. They waged this war against men who wanted to be free from rule by a Communist coalition

government. One would have thought that these failures would have sparked such indignation in the capitols of the world that these policies would be reversed.

As I read the press of July 19, it is apparent that no such en feed, about all one can say there would be no bureaucrats, reversal is forthcoming. In fact is: Some chickens! a new campaign is being generated in Washington, not against the Communists, the thieves or the perpetrators of foul crimes, but against Moise Tshombe!



During the heat of August for a visit overnight and Monyou may prefer to work in the day. morning and evening and enjoy the shade during the heat of the day. So, while you relax, let's think of conservation, or more specifically, renovating your pasture.
