

Like Oklahoma we have the stuff in spite of the law. We have it because a large number of people sincerely believe they have a moral and legal right to take a drink . . . and also because quite a lot of people drink even though they don't openly claim it's morally all right.

The important point is that Cooke County people are drinking beer, thousands of bottles of it every day. They have it at home, they get it in back-door beer joints or they drive to taverns across the river. They're putting up with inconvenience. shabby surroundings and high way hazards, while parents worry about dangers and poor environment and the county misses good business.

It's a bad arrangement in every way except according to the standard of those drys who still labor under the mistaken, idea that drinks of any kind can be eliminated by voting them out.

And even if they were correct on that point, even if drinks could be completely el iminated, there still remains the question of human rights. No fair person will dispute a dry's right to his own opinion If he believes that drink in any quantity is evil he has a right not to have it imposed upon him. However, if another per son believes he has a legal and moral right to take a drink ho has a corresponding right not to be deprived of it.

The fallacy of the present law rests on that one point. Prohibition violates the right of one person to exercise his freedom, whereas legalized beer posed of Wilfred Klement. would not violate anyone's right. The wet is free to take it,

One of the "wrongest" ideas about America, and one promoted hard by the commles, is that America's strength and wealth all stem from our "lion's share" of the world's natural rescources. They claim that by squandering these we make up for our "decadence" as a people under our capitalistic culture.

All it takes to set this nonsense straight are a few everyday almanac statistics. In the first place, we have about 6 percent of the world's people and we have 7 percent of its land. On that basic score we are about "even-Stephen.

When you make a list of all our natural resources, from iron and bone heads so that we don't ore (where we're lucky) to rubber (where nature passed us by), we are by no means overlyendowed. Several countries like Brazil, China, from the feeling that we are just India and Russia stack up as good



as we or better in the natural resource assets they have to work with. Yet, instead of being "rich," the last three countries mentioned are so backward in their use of their natural assets that they have a corner on the world's poverty and hardship.

It is a little surprising, in view of what America has been able to do in 150 years with what we do have as our share of things, that it hasn't gone to our heads on this monkey business about "racial superiorty." Maybe it's because there are so many nationalities among us, and we're still so much like our forty-leven kinds of grandparents, that no one group can figure out how to claim credit for our total success.

The fact is that the kids of any kind of emigrants grow bigger and taller in this country (average-1 inch taller and 20 lbs. heavier). But we still produce enough dopes have any illusions about how "superior" we are. Actually, we seem to derive our greatest pride ordinary folks who can do extraordinary things. And we take a pretty dim view of anybody, American or otherwise, who starts taking on airs about himself or







How Long You Live May Be Affected by How Much you Eat

As we grow older we begin to dream of living longer. But a long and happy life depends to some extent on what and how much you eat, according to Louise Mason, extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A&M College.

The says it isn't easy to cut down on certain foods that you have become accustomed to, but sometimes it's necessary in order to prevent some diseases and ail. ments that come on with old age.

Over-eating seems to be our greatest common dietary fault. That is, eating too many fat, rich, and sweet foods. Miss Mason rec. ommends eating more green leafy vegetables, milk, citrus fruits, tomatoes and animal protein foods such as cheese, eggs, lean meat: beef, pork and poultry to ward off such ailments as high blood pressure, diabetes, hardening of the arteries and even cancer.

Some folks are allergic to certain foods; some don't like them; some can't digest certain foods. You can develop these habits to extend your life expectancy. Eat the foods you like, says Miss Mason, but eat more of the good mineral and protein rich foods and less of the sweet and rich foods for longer healthier living.

Simmons, extension forester of Texas A&M College, gave to 4.H club members when they spent a day in the woods learning about trees, shrubs and grasses as part of their work at the recent State 4-H Conservation Camp at Lake Trinidad: The leaves of poison ivy and wood vine are very similar, but poison ivy has three leaves, so it isn't good to shake hands with because it doesn't have enough fingers. It's alright to shake hands with

wood vine, because it has five leaves or fingers.
