



The American Way CHARITY HOUSING

By George Peck

Accompanied by pictures a communique from a disgruntled Detroit taxpayer has reached me. Sorry 1 can't pass the pictures along to my readers but I can quote parts of the letter, which read as follows:

Dear Friend Peck: Will you please take a look at the enclosed pictures and bear with me through this long letter? The big picture is Parkside, Detroit-Public Housing Project. There a small portion of Detroit's half million families enjoy the security of comfortable, modern, subsidized housing. It was built in 1938 and 1941 by taxpayers at a cost of six million dollars. It nestles within the shadows of beautiful Chandler Park and these fortunate families enjoy the use of an eighteen hole golf course, tennis courts, wading pools and acres of picnic grounds. Truly this is gracious living at its best.

Each of the families living there has been carefully selected by the Detroit Housing Commission from thousands of applicants. Each is provided with space to fit his needs and some have as many as six rooms. Each family has a private bath, electric refrigerator, and range, and steam heat is supplied from a central heating plant, thus eliminating the drudgery of handling coal and ashes. Lawnmowers, garden tools, grass seed and fertilizer are furnished free to those families who care to improve their

Without the generous subsidies and tax exemptions made possible by me and my fellow citizen of Detroit, these homes would be beyond the reach of most Detroit families. But there, at least in Parkside, a FEW families may enjoy fine subsidized living. Eligible families contribute as little as \$17.00 per month toward the cost of this housing regardless of the number of rooms occupied! However, nearly half of the families living in these ivy-covered walls

of them have seen their incomes soar as high as \$8,000 or \$9,000, but few deserted Parkside. Instead, they have preferred to stay on, to enjoy subsidized housing and to use their rent savings to buy the better things in life.

Unfortunately, only a few select families can enjoy subidized housing, because subidies by their very nature must be paid for by MANY but enjoyed by FEW. But Parkside stands as a monument to the generosity and unselfishness of the half million Detroit families-rich and poor-who are shouldering the burden of increased taxes so that a FEW may enjoy a better life. Of this my city may well be proud because rare indeed is the citizen who is willing to contribute his efforts so that others may live better than he. . .

Now please take a look at the other picture. In the Quonset Huts across the way from Parkside is where Veterans of World War II are living. Many of these Vets are ooking forward to the day when they can afford a home of their own. Perhaps not as desirable as Parkside but at least a home of payments will go for real estate taxes. In the meantime they are content to pay \$21.00 a month, for the privilege of living in these steellined foxholes while their more fortunate heighbors across the street enjoy the luxury of taxfree subsidized homes. .

Undoubtedly in your city you have counterparts of Parkside and many more under construction, and you, too, can point with pride to the fine home your taxes are providing for some happy couple or family. Homes perhaps much better than you can afford.

For this you may thank your Congressmen because they have unselfishly pledged a large portion of your income so that a FEW may enjoy these high quality homes at your expense.



"If the veteran is deceased and his insurance was not in force, the beneficiaries should address a letter to Death Claims Service, Veterans Administration, Washing. ton 25, D.C., attaching a death certificate showing date of veteran's death, veteran's full name, date of birth, serial number(s) and applicant's address. Proof of right to claim will be determined by the Veterans Administration after all facts of case have been investigated. A simple letter should be written including the following wording: 'Claim is hereby made for any of the benefits that may be due me under Special Dividends payable to World War II veterans. Sign your name and give relationship and permanent add-

This information should not be confused by beneficiaries currently receiving insurance payments or those beneficiaries who have been paid in full with regard to the death of a veteran as they will receive dividends automatically without making application.

Anyone desiring assistance with their dividend application may secure same by contacting the local Red Cross Chapter, located at 104 East Elm, Gainesville.



Automotive Industry Moves Ahead



Automotive production at record levels; more automotive jobs than ever before; motor vehicle travel sets new record! This is the story of progress just revealed in the automotive industry by the Automobile Manufacturers Association

DETROIT—In the first six months of 1949, the automotive industry produced nearly 3,000,000 new cars, trucks and buses—almost as many units as were turned out in the full year of 1946. A steady increase has been registered since the industry surmounted its war reconversion problems. A 55% gain in production was made in 1947 over 1946, and a 10% gain was registered in 1948 over the preceding year. The half year of 1949 is up 20% from the first six months of 1948.

Industry jobs jumped from 6,700,000 in 1941 to 9,020,000 in 1948. This means one out of every seven job holders in the nation earns his wages in the highway transportation industry. These jobs cover manufacturing, road building, sales and service, trucking and miscellaneous work.

Main street is dotted with more businesses keyed to highway transportation, and over 90% of them are small main street is dotted with more businesses keyed to highway transportation, and over 90% of them are small enterprises, employing less than 20 employes each. Business accounts for 56% of all car trips; social and recreational driving is 16% of the total; shopping 12% and other purposes 16%. Rural travel climbed from 169 billion miles in 1941 to 197 billion in 1948. Urban travel increased from 163 billion miles in 1941 to 203 billion in 1948.

Governmental agencies are collecting an all-time high in automotive dollars. Special taxes alone now exceed \$3 billion annually, with motor trucks accounting for more than a third of the total. One of the largest tax items is the federal excise levy on new motor vehicles. First invoked as a "temporary emergency measure" in 1932,

Buddy Reiter has sown 11 acres bordering each side of his grass waterway to alfalfa to give added protection to his land.

H.O. Atterberry of the Hardy Conservation Group has planted 10 acres to hairy vetch. He applied phosphate to the land and planted the vetch as soon as peanuts were plowed up. The vetch is to be used for soil improvement and to provide winter grazing.

Al Weisman has overseeded his bermuda grass waterway to hairy vetch and the vetch is already up. By overseeding the grass with a legume Al will get more winter grazing and the grass sod will benefit from soil improving effects of the legume.

Paul Fetsch has planted 10 acres to vetch and has overseeded his bermuda grass waterway with this egume. The waterway was sodded

Native grass meadows have good growth since the recent rains and many seed heads are showing up. The grases will benefit greatly if they will produce seed and build up root reserves for a more vigorous growth next spring.


