

#### Scholastic Census Is 585; Gain of 37 **Over Former Count**

The official count of the 1950 scholastic census of the Muenster school district is 585, Superintendent Weldon Cowan announced this week.

That figure represents an increase of 64 over last year's official census and an increase of 37 over the figure which became official after the annexation of Valley Creek to Muenster last Summer.

Copies of last year's census showed 521 on the Muenster list and 27 on the Valley Creek list. Of the 548 on those two lists 53 were lost since the last report, 32 passed the scholastic age and 21 moved out of the district.

At the same time, however the district has a gain of 90, including 55 children who reached the scholastic age this year and 35 who moved into the district.

A further breakdown of figures shows that the largest age group of the district is the 7year-olds with 73 and the smallest group is the 13-year-olds with 28. #### Safety Experts Tell How To Save Lives In Auto Accidents

The skillful motorist doesn't trust only to luck. He stays out of hazardous situations and knows what to do in an emergency, according to Donald E. Keyhoe. Writing in Redbook Magazine for April, he gives you the advice of auto safety experts on skidding, blow-outs and dan-

"Do you know what action to take in an emergency? Here are things you must bt ready for.

"If you have a blow-out, grip the steering wheel hard. Keep the car moving in a straight line. Do not apply brake until you have complete steering control.

"If your right wheels go off the pavement, slow down. Brake your car gently. Then, when you have complete control and the road behind you is clear, sharply cut back onto the pavement. Never try to return to the pavement while traveling at high

"If your car skids, steer in the direction the rear end is skidding. Don't over-steer. Don't suddenly lift your foot from the accelerator. If you brake, then snub, which means gently put-

ting the brakes on and off in seat when there is danger.



In Clear Creek group Jake Siebold is building a diversion terrace to keep hill water off his cultivated fields. The Harvill Brothers of Saint Jo have built a series of spreader dams to stop erosion on an old gully and provide a crossing for equipment. The dams will hold the soil and enable grasses to stablize the banks of the gullies. The Harvill boys are improving the grass coverage on their land by deferring from June until frost to allow extra growth and reseeding.

S. C. Roach of Saint Jo used the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District's grass seed drill to plant three acres to King Ranch Bluestem. The grass is to be used for seed production and will be pastured when the seed demand is satisfied.

Adolph Fuhrman in the North Lindsay Conservation Group now has a stand of Bermuda on two waterways that were prepared for corn.

#### Range Deferment Gives Needed Rest To Pasture Plants

Pasture plants need a rest period to regain their vigor and to allow them to produce a seed crop. Now is the time to make plans for carrying out deferred grazing practices for this year, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist of Texas A&M College.

The length of deferment may vary from two to six months or longer depending on the rainfall, condition of the range and the kinds of grasses in the pasture. In areas of high rainfall where grasses get coarse and lose their nutrients upon maturity, a spring rest for vigor and a fall rest for seed production is best, says Walker. In north and west Texas where grasses cure well, a six months rest from May to November may be advisable.

He points out that many ranchers were surprised at the amount of grass that came back on their deferred pastures. Excellent moisture and good growing condition last year were contributing factors and many ranchmen found tall growing grasses in their deferred pastures that they had never seen before. The explantion, says Walker, the grasses never had a chance to grow up before heavy grazing got them.

More operators, he adds, are finding that there is a dollars and cents angle tied in with the deferred grazing practice and cites as an example the case of Mason county ranchman Elwood Kothmann. Kothmann, he says, has rested one pasture for three years during the growing season from May to November and has grazed it during the winter months. Last year this
