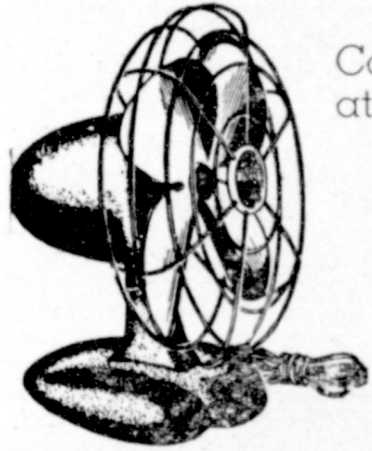

We're often judged by the way we use telephone service. Good telephone technique and good telephone manners are important to a winning personality . . . and help you get the most from your telephone service.

One of the most aggravating experiences a person can have is to run to a ringing telephone, only to find that no one is there. But just how long should one let a phone ring before giving up?

At least a minute, is the experts' answer. After all, the person you're calling may be in the yard or away from the telephone. And the figures show that an estimated 350,000 calls a day are lost by Southwestern Bell customers who hang up too soon. A call worth making is certainly worth waiting a minute for.

In today's busy life at home or in the office, it's only natural to leave the telephone as quickly as possible. Is there any special reason why you should replace the receiver carefully?

There certainly is! Your telephone is just one continuous "busy signal" if your receiver is not securely in place. You can't receive any calls, and if you are on a party line, neither can your party-line neighbors. ## The American Way

### MacArthur Sounds Warning

For the past two decades America has been moving toward totalitarianism and away from the basic principles upon which our nation was founded; which principles it followed for a century and a half with great benefit to so many of our citizens.

In a recent speech, General Douglas MacArthur warned of this dangerous drift in our national policies. This, he said, "coupled with the rapid centralization of power in the hands of a few, is leading us toward a

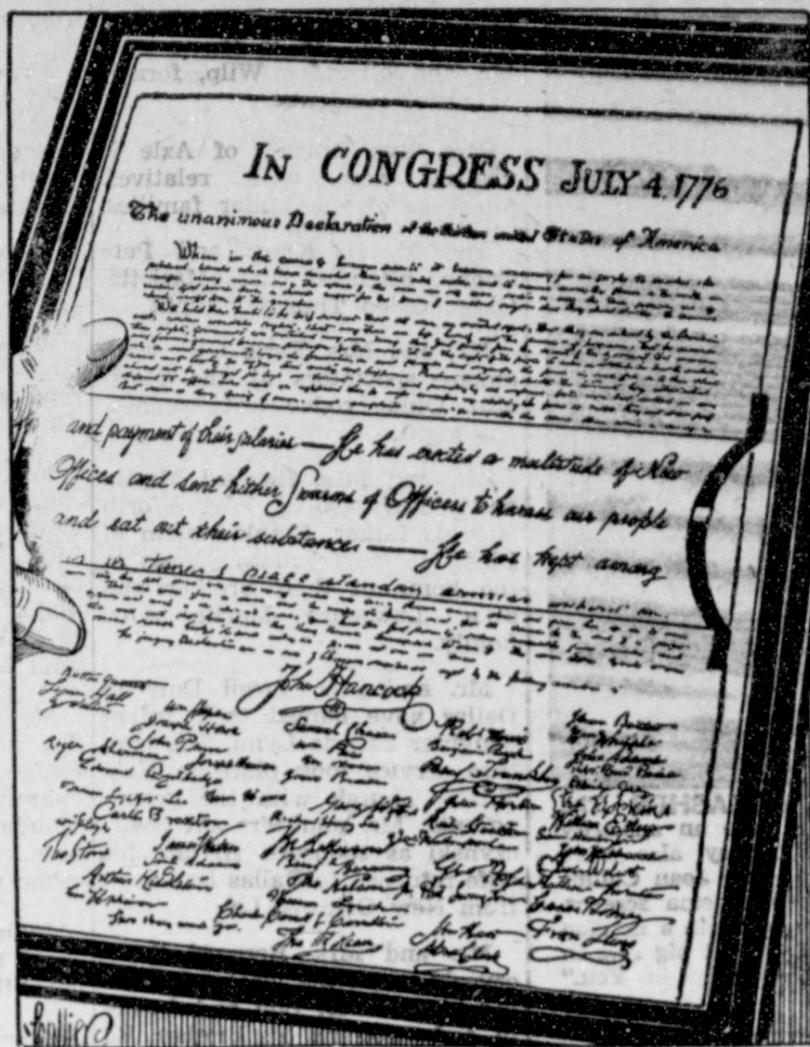
Communist state with as dreadful certainty as though the leaders of the Kremlin themselves were charting our course. . . Unless the American people stem the present threatening tide, human liberty will inevitably perish from our land."

General MacArthur knows where-of he speaks. He is not an alarmist. He returned home from the Far East after many years in service of his country, to find that during his absence a vast bureaucracy had fastened its tentacles on the U. S. A.

Here is what he found: Since 1930 government employment of all kinds has increased at four times, and Federal civilian employment at eleven times the rate of increase in the total population. Today there are about 6.8 million civilian workers on government payrolls which means there is now one government worker for every 6.6 families in the nation.

This vast bureaucracy is hitting the taxpayers "below the belt." For the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1952, taxes of all kinds will absorb more than 30 percent of our national income. In order to obtain the necessary revenue with which to carry on and expand its spending orgy, the Federal Govern-

## Independence Cannot Continue Without God

by Clare Boothe Luce

WHEN WE EXAMINE the bases of our American civilization, we find they rise in the Christian idea of man.

If we are honest, we must admit that the constant catalyzing agencies for good in our democracy have always been the doctrines which we evolved, in political and economic and social terms, from the dogmas of Christian faith.

Who am I? Who made me? Why was I born? Where am I going? These are the first questions of children, the last of philosophers.

The Christian was both child and philosopher. He catechized simply: Man was made by God to glorify Him, to serve Him, and to be with Him in Heaven. Here was his first cause, and his last end.

BUT FROM HIS simple thesis that but one thing was necessary: to hear God and do His word, he evolved a tremendous theology and an incalculable train of philosophies, infinitely subtle, infinitely complex, of law, art, science and government.

OUR FOREFATHERS were sharply aware of the relevance of Christianity to democracy. The writings of all our fifty-six signers of the Declaration of Independence are rich with direct references to the Gospel message as the prime source and justification of the great new political experiment begun in 1776 on this continent.

One passage from Washington's Farewell Address should be enough to convince any American of the paramount importance our Founding Fathers attached to the Christian religion in securing the good of the citizen.

Said our first President: "OF ALL DISPOSITIONS and habits which lead to political prosperity, religion and morality are indispensable supports."

"In vain would that man pay the tribute of patriotism who would labor to subvert these great pillars of human happiness, these firmest props of the duties of men and citizens."

And let us with caution, indulge the supposition that morality can be maintained without religion.



"Whatever may be conceded to the influence of refined education on minds of peculiar structure, reason and experience both forbid us to expect that national morality can prevail in the exclusion of religious principles."

"IT IS TRUE that virtue or morality is the necessary spring of popular government. Who that is a sincere friend to it, can look with indifference upon attempts to shake the foundations of the fabric?"

ment has invaded many tax fields which constitutionally belong to state and local governments. It now absorbs 75 percent of all taxes collected in the country as against only 36 percent in 1929.

As a consequence of this greatly increased take by Uncle Sam, state and local officials are compelled to go hand in hand, like so many mendicants, to Washington and beg the bureaucrats for a share of the money that the Federal Government has taken away from the citizens of their communities. Ridiculous, isn't it? The net result of all this is that self-government at the local level is being destroyed and will soon vanish entirely.

Adding insult to injury, the Federal Government is steadily sticking its messy hands into affairs that rightfully belong to private business enterprise. Insidious and powerful attacks have been made upon our American Capitalistic System of Free Enterprise. The successful have been penalized, profits have been scooped at and industry has been subjected to all forms of red tape and regulations. At the same time, Federal Government has coddled and pampered labor unions. It has fixed prices and granted wage increases that are squeezing the profits out of business. Such procedures give the Federal Government the power of life and death over industry.

The Founding Fathers, fully aware of how tyrannical government had destroyed the freedom of people in Europe in drafting the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, set up safeguards to freedom. One of these was a limitation upon Federal Government by granting it specific powers and dividing them into three distinct branches — legislative, executive and judicial. This made for a system of checks and balances to prevent any one branch of the Federal Government becoming supreme or totalitarian.

But now what do we find? This bulwark is being seriously threatened. Congress is becoming a rubber stamp; the system of checks and balance is being scrapped; and the Constitution is becoming a "horse and buggy" document. All of the safeguards built up over the first century and a half of our history are being scuttled.

That's the alarming situation that General MacArthur found on his return to America which led him to sound the warning, "Unless the American people

stem the present threatening tide, human liberty will inevitably perish from our land."

Will we be smart enough to heed the General's warning before it is too late, or will we continue blindly along the road that leads backward toward a system of "goose-stepping" regimentation such as that from which our ancestors fled to set up a new concept of government here in the United States of America?

**Judge Earl P. Hall  
Seeks Promotion to  
Civil Appeal Court**



Judge Earl P. Hall is a native of this Court of Civil Appeals District, which is composed of the following counties: Archer, Clay, Cooke, Denton, Hood, Jack, Montague, Parker, Tarrant, Wichita, Wise, and Young. Judge Hall was born and reared on a farm in Montague County, where he worked, except when he was away in school, until he received his law license at the age of twenty-two. He is now forty-eight years of age.

Judge Hall was educated in the public schools of Montague County, at Texas Christian University, and at Cumberland University of Law, from which he received his Bachelor of Law Degree. He passed the Texas Bar examinations and entered the practice of law in 1926.

The Court of Civil Appeals is composed of three members. Judge Hall is the only member on the Court who came from one of the smaller counties. We think it is democratic for the smaller counties to have at least one member on the Court.

The following is Judge Hall's statement to the voters:

In announcing my candidacy I realize that a person in politics is no stronger than his friends, and I would like to take this opportunity of thanking my many friends throughout this District for the splendid support they have given me in the past. The people of my home county have seen fit to elect me several times to important offices, and the people of this Court of Civil Appeals District have heretofore elected me to serve as Associate Justice of this Court.

I am deeply grateful for this, and I sincerely trust that they will see fit to vote for me to continue to serve them as Chief Justice of the Court.

As you remember, in June, 1951, Governor Shivers appointed me Chief Justice of your Court of Civil Appeals to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Judge Atwood McDonald. I now seek election to the full six year term. Prior to that time I had served five years as Associate Justice on the Court and ten years as District Judge of the 97th Judicial District, composed of Archer, Clay and Montague Counties.

During the time I have been a member of this Court, cases coming before it have been given the

most careful consideration, yet have been promptly decided, with result that we have kept up with our docket, even though there are many cases transferred from other districts to us by the Supreme Court. It has been the desire and purpose of both myself and other members of the Court to decide cases impartially and promptly.

It is my belief that law is the greatest thing devised by man, and that the proper administration of it is a demanding task of our courts. The law should at all times portray satisfaction of the average man's feeling for common justice visibly done. It should meet the demand of a sound and progressive society, and at the same time protect our individual freedom.

Believing in the old adage that a man should first earn his spurs before he wears them, I feel my

long experience in the trial of civil cases, both in private practice and as District Judge, together with the knowledge I have acquired during my time on this Court, will enable me to discharge my duties even more efficiently in the future.

I earnestly solicit your influence and your vote in the coming Democratic primary, to be held on Saturday, July 26th.

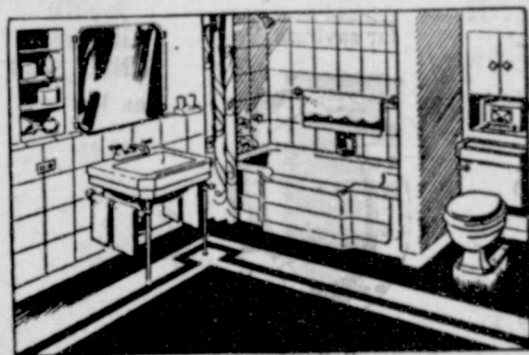

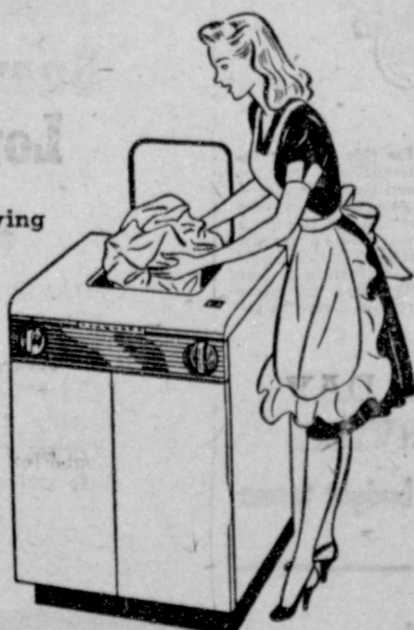

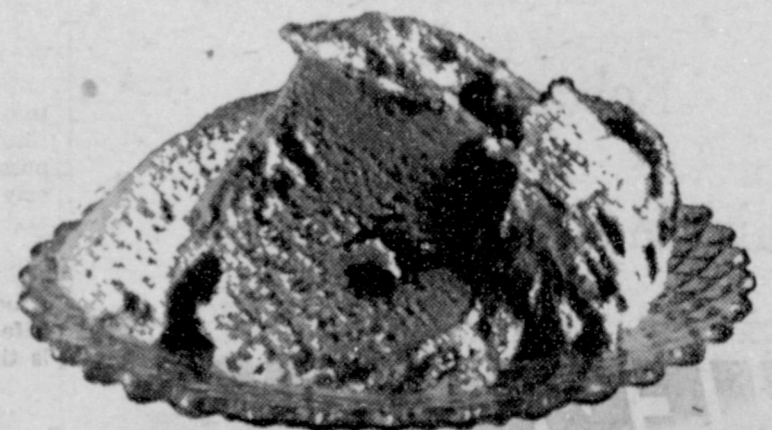

### Soil Conservation Notes

Muenster area farmers, already in the midst of one harvest, have had to begin another. High winds and hot weather combined to ripen sweet clovers almost before landowners realized what was happening. Losses of ripe clover seed, due to high winds, have been heavy. But many farmers were successful in getting the clover crop in windrows in preparation to combining. Maximum seed yields are usually obtained from sweet clovers if they are windrowed when two-thirds of the seed coats have turned brown and allowed to dry before combining.

Cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red soil conservation district in the Muenster area who have begun clover seed harvest operations include Oscar Walter, Wilfred Reiter, Ray Klement, Alois Trubenbach, Ike Fulton, Joe Knauf, Leo Hesse and Alfred Bayer.

Terracing operations got underway in the Muenster area this week. Wilfred Reiter started the terracing building ball rolling early Monday morning by beginning work on a mile and a half of terraces on the S. D. Meador farm which he operates. Lines were staked by soil conservation service technicians. Reiter is using his tractor and a three-disc plow to build the terraces. He is using the island method of construction to get a broad, easy-to-cross farm terrace.

Along about this time every year a lot of emphasis is placed upon the importance of good grass management. A dry hot period quickly shows the wisdom of the "take half, leave half" principle of grass management. Grasses properly managed are vigorous in growth and can withstand more adverse weather. On pastures properly managed there is a heavy leaf litter to form an insulating layer to keep the soil cooler and cut down water losses through evaporation. Under good management there is also less run off water from grassland. More water goes into the soil for future plant growth, thus soil erosion and water losses are prevented.

Many farmers and ranchers in the Muenster sector recognize the importance of good grassland management and are giving part of their grass complete protection from grazing from now until frost. This deferment will give the grass time to make a lot of growth, produce seed and build up root reserves for more vigorous growth.

The Dangelmayr Brothers have pulled the cattle off of 1380 acres of grass on their ranch south of town. The pasture will have complete rest until after frost. The grass will then be used as winter pasture.

Joe Wimmer is keeping livestock off 227 ac. of grass on the J. M. Weinzapfel ranch south of Muenster. Hubert Felderhoff is

letting 200 acres on the Biffle ranch rest for growth and improvement. The Luse ranch near Rosston is resting 743 acres. J. H. Fields of Saint Jo has cut cattle off of 700 acres of grassland. Howard Mays is practicing deferment on 300 acres of upland pasture near Hardy and Chas. Hildebrand of Tyler Bluff is letting 418 acres of grass improve by keeping cattle off from June until frost.

The usual grazing rotation on all of these ranches calls for planned rotations so that over a period of years all pastures will

be deferred in turn so that all grasses can be improved. These farmers and ranchers are making long strides in their grass improvement program and are also keeping their soil and water at home.

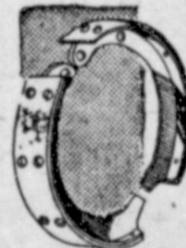

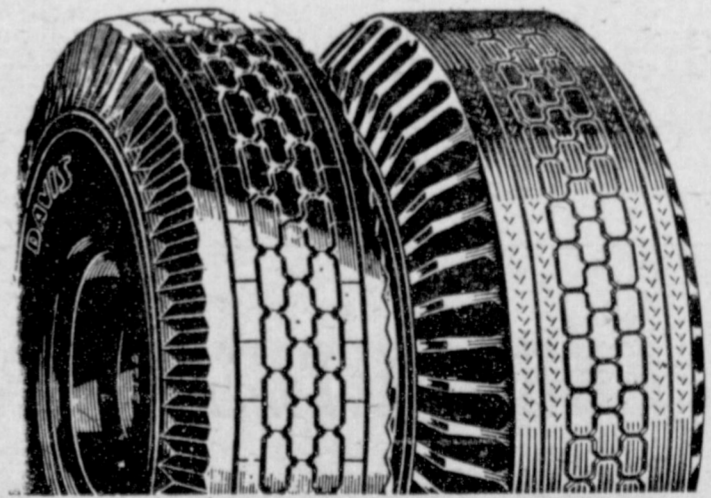

the heaviest rains on record in this area.

One detention dam is planned for the Big Elm near its source at Saint Jo. Other dams are to be on creeks which empty into the Big Elm.

Total cost of the 23 proposed reservoirs is about \$2,800,000, which, Wells estimates will be offset many times by preventing flood damage. A survey has revealed that the Elm watershed during the past 20 years has had 18 major floods and 64 minor floods, also that most floods occurred during the spring of the year and caused heavy crop damage. The area susceptible to floods on the Elm watershed has been estimated at 16,000 acres.

Along with their conservation value the detention dams have a definite recreational and economic value. They will be ideal for fishing, swimming and boating. They will also eliminate the flow of millions of tons of silt into the large reservoirs. Studies at Texoma and Lake Dallas indicate that usefulness of both places will be cut short by accumulation of mud.
