About a year and a half ago, when the Korean "Police Action" was just getting started, a group of left-over do-gooders from the old OPA days somehow got the notion that destiny again summoned them to save us childish and irresponsible citizens from the inevitable plundering of heartless profiteers.

For weeks we were subjected to an incessant barrage of official yackety yack. Control addicts in Washington kept telling us that ceilings would have to be clamped on prices and wages to keep inflation from going into a runaway spiral. Conditions did not justify the alarm, of course, but after a period of the officially inspired loose talk, which actually amounted to a notice that controls were coming and price raisers had better get their changes in ahead of the deadline, the public did respond with some arbitrary raises in prices and wages. Remember?

Once the public took the bait the bureaucrats lost no time in proclaiming that their services were needed to prevent economic pandemonium. So we got the OPS. And now that we've had it for the greater part of a year, what good do you think it's doing you? Do you think it is saving you money? In other words, are you paying prices allowed by OPS or prices determined by the old economic law of supply and demand?

Compare some time. You'll be pleased to know how often your merchant charges less than the OPS ceiling.

Another good indication is the absence of scarcity or black market. As long as you don't run into those factors you know that the price situation is okay. Merchants aren't going to lose money to meet the regulation, you can bet on that. Reputable men just won't handle the losers and others will manage to get a higher price regardless of the law.

If your own experience isn't enough, you can take a look at the bureau's own statistics. During October OPS enforcement agents checked 36,247 establishments of various kinds. The fruit of their effort was 2 indictments, 2 guilty pleas, and 2 convictions. Fines assessed totalled \$1000. This column doesn't know how many persons are employed to do all that futile checking, nor how many are used in various offices to draw up the directives and endless lists of prices, nor how many are employed in other kinds of paper fumbling. It suggests that you make your own guess, basing it on your own estimate of bureaucratic efficiency. No matter how conservative your guess, you'll have to admit that the \$1000 in fines is a puny return for the taxpayers' outlay.

One of the best indictments of the OPS to date was an ad published lately by a used car dealer in Tacoma, Washington. After complaining about all the tax money fizzled away on the OPS regulation of used car prices he listed a group of cars showing the allowed OPS price and his price on each. His prices were 15 to 25 per cent below OPS all the way through. Doesn't this make us wonder why your money and mine is being goofed off to maintain the OPS?

Another fine illustration is the bureau's control of whiskey prices. Tons of paper and thousands of man hours are going into preparations of price lists to control the price at a time when the nation's supply of whiskey is the highest ever. Obviously, supply and demand can control those prices well enough, so why does OPS have to stick its nose in? And even if whiskey were scarce, why use the taxpayers money to control its price? The stuff is strictly a luxury. Nobody needs it. Nobody has to buy it if he doesn't like the price.

President Truman seems quite successful in keeping people guessing about his candidacy for 1952, but on another item he has nobody guessing. He has

Charles Martin, 20, Loses Life In Car Wreck Wednesday

Charles William Martin, Jr., 20, of route 2, Muenster, became Cooke county's fifth traffic fatality of 1950 early Wednesday morning from injuries sustained when his automobile rolled over several times about four miles west of Gainesville on highway 82.

The accident occurred about 1:15 o'clock Wednesday morning as Martin, an oil field worker, was driving west, returning home.

Highway Patrolman Lester Robertson, who investigated the accident, said that Martin was unconscious but did not appear to be seriously injured when he was removed from the vehicle. He was taken to Gainesville hospital in a Vernie Keel ambulance and succumbed about 2:20 a.m. from internal injuries.

The 1946 Ford driven by Martin was heavily damaged after apparently turning over several times. The cause of the accident is unknown as Martin was alone in the vehicle.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles William Martin, route 2, Muenster; one sister, Mary Lou Martin and a half-brother, Deward Martin, both of Muenster; and a half-sister, Mrs. Oma Hart, Wichita Falls.

Martin was born Dec. 18, 1930 at Muenster and had served in the U. S. army.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p.m. Thursday at the Vernie Keel Funeral home chapel with Rev. C. M. Thomas, pastor of the First Baptist chapel officiating. Interment was in the Dye Mound cemetery in Montague county.

Adam Wolf, 18-year-old Cooke county 4-H club member, was a national winner at the 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. He was judged the champion in the 4-H Tractor Maintenance program, and is the second Cooke county boy to receive national honors.

As a winner in the national contest, young Wolf received a \$1300 college scholarship. As Texas state winner he received the trip to Chicago through courtesy of the Stanolind Oil and Gas Company, Tulsa, Okla. Adam is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Adam Wolf, route 1, Gainesville, and a member of St. Mary's club.

His ability to maintain and operate a tractor skillfully has netted his family a sizeable saving in time, labor and money. A club member for eight years, Adam became interested in tractor maintenance when one of the family's four tractors broke down in the middle of threshing. Since then he has attended yearly county tractor clinics and has helped plan and run them. He has given demonstrations before 4-H clubs and has been county winner in this program for the past four years. His other club work includes demonstrations in soil conservation, dairy and beef cattle, poultry, swine, field crops, and sheep.

11 Schools to Play In Cage Tourney at MHS Dec. 12 to 16

There's going to be basketball and lots of it at the Muenster High gymnasium next week, Wednesday to Saturday when boys' and girls' teams from eleven North Texas high schools compete for honors at Muenster's second annual invitation basketball tournament.

Preliminary games will be played on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights, the contests beginning at 6:30 and ending about 10:30. Semi-finals and finals will be fought out in games scheduled for Saturday morning, afternoon and night.

Eleven schools have accepted Coach Doyle Hood's invitation to participate in the tourney and each will enter both the boys' and the girls' division. The schools are Henrietta, Prairie Valley, Era, Valley View, Saint Jo, Alvord, Callisburg, Sanger, Chico, Forestburg and Muenster.

In each division the tourney will consist of a championship bracket and a consolation bracket. Losers in the opening round of games will make up the consolation bracket and winners will make up the championship bracket. Once established in its bracket a team is eliminated the first time it loses, and winners continue to play winners until the final winner is decided.

Nineteen trophies will be presented at the end of the tourney. Six will go to teams... the tournament champ, the runner-up and the consolation champ in each division. The remaining 13 will go to individuals... the outstanding boy, the outstanding girl and each member of the two all-tournament teams. The individuals will be selected by coaches participating in the tournament.

Clothing Shipped For Korean Relief

Officers of the Muenster State Bank have been advised that the state depository board of the Texas Treasury Department has designated the local bank as a state depository for a demand account up to \$50,000. The bank was selected in a meeting of the depository board on November 14.

The designation, according to J. M. Weinzapfel, president of the bank, is a distinct honor in that it indicates the state's confidence in the stability of the bank. The depository board, he said, is familiar with the condition of all banks in the state and its decision was equivalent to an official approval of the local bank as a financially sound institution.

The order from the Texas Education Agency of Austin was sent to the office of the county superintendent and conveyed by him to the local school officials. A YALE MAN REBELS

The question of what is being taught in our schools and colleges has begun to attract nationwide attention. This is a healthy development, for it undoubtedly will lead to a more

active interest in education on the part of school patrons. In the long run the students, the schools and their faculties, and our nation itself will benefit.

Many factors have combined to arouse this mounting public interest in what's going on inside our schools and colleges. Influential factors include (1) the American Association of University Professors' approval of Communist professors as fit to teach in American colleges; (2) the return to influence in the academic world of the exponents of so-called "progressive education;" and (3) various polls showing recent graduating classes to be lukewarm or cool toward basic American principles.

Sensational Accusations

A book has just been published that promises to stir up still wider public interest. The title is "God and Man at Yale." The author, William F. Buckley, Jr., is a 1950 graduate of Yale University. The book contains sensational accusations. The author's conclusion is that Yale today is turning out graduating classes whose members, in overwhelming numbers, have little respect for the tenets of Christianity and for the principles which form the foundation of the American private enterprise system.

One by one he examines the ideological and ethical convictions of a number of Yale's most influential professors, and his well-documented findings are stunning. He reports, for instance that the history professor whose class attracts twice as many students as any other history class "is emphatically and vigorously atheistic;" that a

popular professor in the Department of Religion describes himself to his students as "80 per cent atheist and 20 per cent agnostic;" that in the Department of Sociology, the class which attracts more students than any other class at Yale was taught by a professor who "never left room for doubt as to the contempt in which he held religion, Christianity in particular."

Collectivists in Power

Buckley declares that a handful of professors in the Department of Economics believe in the principles of private enterprise but that a majority of the staff are Socialists of varying degrees, and they wield an overpowering influence on the teachers and in the selection of textbooks which seem to be strongly biased against the American system of free enterprise and in favor of collectivism.

"God and Man at Yale" cannot be lightly dismissed by anyone. Its charges are serious, and Buckley himself is a man of considerable stature in Yale's undergraduate history. He is described in the Yale 1951 Class History as one of the most brilliant undergraduates ever to attend Yale. He was managing editor and chairman of the famed Yale DAILY NEWS, a leading member of the Debating Society, Senior class orator, and a member of the Fence Club, Elizabethan Club, Torch Honor Society, and Skull and Bones. His book, in a sense, is a continuation of the fight he waged against "Leftist" teachings during his entire five years at Yale.

Some reviewers of "God and Man at Yale" suggest that the situation which Buckley de-

scribes at Yale exists in many universities and colleges. The testimony of ex-Communist Elizabeth Bentley before a Senate committee echoes this. "In becoming a Communist, she testified, "there are two stages. You go through a system of upbringing in education which in my day—and it is still going on today—tends to take whatever religion you have out of you and to undermine your faith in democracy at a very young age, at an age when a youngster needs something to hang onto, something to believe in, something to fight for; instead you are left in a terrible state of confusion; you no longer perhaps have any belief in God."

"When I became a Communist," Miss Bentley testified, "I was finishing the last part of my master's thesis at Columbia (she joined a cell which included students and professors at Columbia). I would say that my studies in Vassar had gotten me to the point where I was a complete pushover for Communism. I would say that is the general tendency, not only at Vassar, but in a goodly number of colleges."

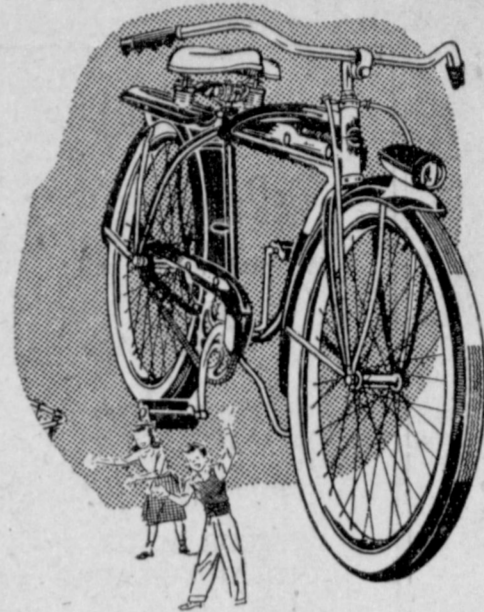
If such a situation is indeed widespread then the immediate active interest of every American should be aroused. Both the Socialists and the Communists boast that they can come to power, gradually, through the infiltration of our schools and colleges, by capturing the minds of our youth.

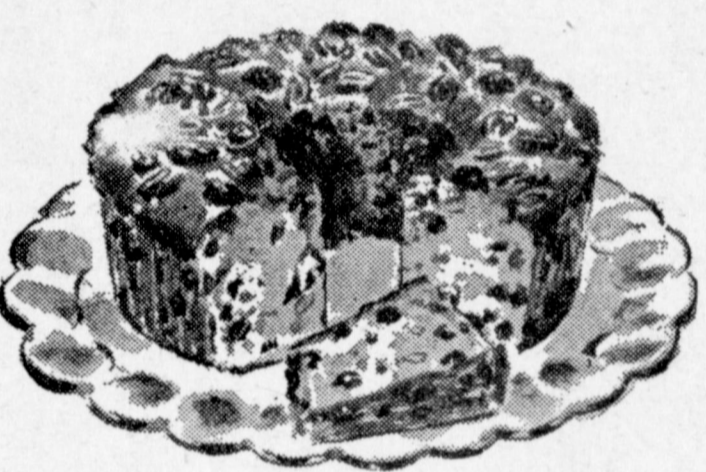

Responsibility Law Not Concerned With Question of Guilt

AUSTIN — Public Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr., emphasized in a statement today that the state's new Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law does not give his Department the slightest judicial authority to determine questions of fault before applying the law's full requirements to motorists who are involved in severe traffic accidents.

"The saddest mistake a motorist can make," Director Garrison said, "is to think the state cannot compel him to furnish proof of his ability to meet damage claims and suspend all of his motoring privileges if he fails to do so, because he is quite sure he was not to blame. Those who imagine they can postpone meeting the new law's security requirements until a court decides the issue of fault will find that they are wrong."

"This does not mean that any motorist will be required to pay for damages he did not cause, or that he does not have full recourse to the courts if he feels that any order issued under the new law violates his rights. It does mean, however, that pending a final court decree on a question of liability, the involved owner or operator must satisfy the Texas Department of Public Safety that he is prepared to meet damage claims for which he is apparently responsible."

"Here are the circumstances that will prevail when the new law becomes effective on January 1:

"If you are involved in an accident resulting in death or injury to a person, property damage exceeding \$100 to any one person, including yourself, you must file a complete report with the Department not later than 10 days after the accident. If the report shows that you were properly insured at the time of the accident, you are not subject to the safety responsibility law because it recognizes insurance as proof of ability to meet damage claims up to \$15,000.

"If you were not insured, the Department will determine the

extent of damages for which you may be held liable, ranging from a minimum of \$101 to a maximum of \$15,000. You must then furnish the department with satisfactory proof that you will be able to respond in the fixed amount, either by depositing collateral or posting a bond. You will not be required to furnish any security, however, if you have all other persons involved in the accident release you from liability, obtain a final court decree of non-liability, or execute a legal agreement providing for installment payment of claims. Neither will security be required if you show that your car was legally parked or being operated without your permission, or that all injuries and damages were confined solely to yourself.

"The law allows you a maximum of 70 days, however, in which to satisfy it in any one of these manners — 10 days to file your safety responsibility report and 60 days thereafter to satisfy the security requirements. If within the stated period you have not satisfied the law, regardless of how innocent you think you may be, the Texas Department of Public Safety has no alternative but to suspend your operator's license and the registration plates for all cars owned by you.

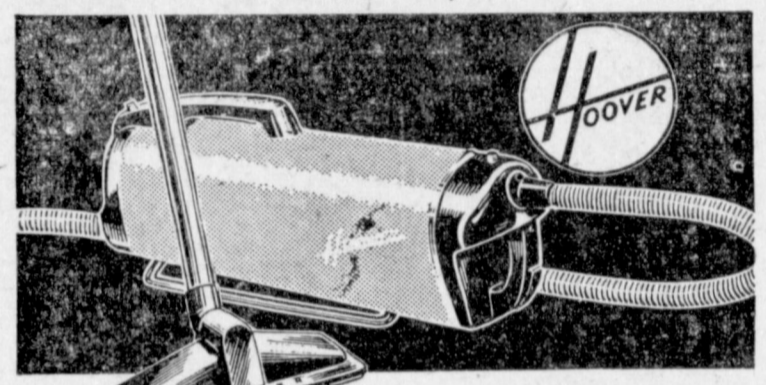

Rheumatic Heart is Leading Cause of Children's Deaths

Austin, Texas.—Rheumatic heart disease is now the first cause of death among children aged 10 to 14, and is second only to tuberculosis at ages 15 to 25. Despite the importance of this disease its cause and spread is not completely established. No vaccines such as those that prevent typhoid fever, diphtheria, smallpox and whooping cough has yet been developed, for its prevention and control. We do know, however, some of the danger signals and with the physician's accurate diagnosis some of the damaging results of the disease may be prevented. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, points out that in general the danger signals of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows or wrists. The pain is usually felt in one of these centers and spreads to the others. Often times a child will get irritable and cross without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude; he may cry easily or develop habits of nervousness. A physician should be consulted at once in such a situation, for these symptoms may be the beginning of rheumatic fever.

Exposure to frequent chilling, damp, or overcrowded living quarters, a poor diet, an attack of scarlet fever, a bad cold or other infection caused by certain streptococcus germs are likely to be predisposing factors in the appearance of rheumatic fever. According to Dr. Cox the best

safeguards against this disease are to have each child and adult examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kind of foods for an adequate diet and to have plenty of rest, when the disease is suspected of being present, a doctor should be consulted at once.

Leaflet Explains Use of Warfarin

COLLEGE STATION — Warfarin, the new rat and mouse poison, has enabled a northeast Texas poultryman to make a considerable saving in chicken feed, according to the 1951 annual report of the Rodent Control Service.

Rats were eating an average of 32 pounds of feed per day, worth \$1.60 if valued at five cents a pound. Fifty-eight pounds of warfarin bait, which cost \$14.50, killed 306 rats in a

two-week period.

This is a typical example of the results obtained with this new poison, which prevents blood from clotting and causes rats and mice to die from internal hemorrhages.

Information on controlling rats with warfarin is given in a new publication prepared by the Fish and Wildlife Service of the U. S. Department of Interior and the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

Leaflet 148, "Use of Warfarin for Rat and Mouse Control," contains safety precautions for using warfarin, four warfarin

for mixing them, and instructions for putting the bait out. This leaflet is available from bait formulas and instructions county Extension offices.

Warfarin can be obtained in the concentrate or the ready-to-use form from local drug, feed and insecticide stores. Bait prepared by the Rodent Control Service, San Antonio, is distributed through county agricultural agents and their cooperators who are conducting county-wide rat control programs.

Ike Swamps Harry In Farm Straw Vote

Only 21.3 per cent of farmers and farm women said they would vote for President Truman if he were running for re-election today, according to a spot check made by Country Gentleman magazine. The national farm magazine reports that 71.4 per cent said they would not vote for President Truman and 7.3 per cent were undecided.

The magazine's check was made by field correspondents in 23 states. The question asked was, "Would you vote for President Truman if he were up for re-election today?"

In the 1948 presidential election the farm vote was generally regarded as playing a decisive role in President Truman's victory.

"General Eisenhower was most frequently mentioned as the man farmers would like to see on the Republican ticket, followed closely by Taft, both being suggested several times as often as MacArthur, Dewey, Warren, and Stassen," the magazine says.

None of those questioned, it added, expressed doubt that Truman would run in 1952, and there was a widespread feeling that "he'll be hard to beat."

Farms Are Bigger And Have Less Help

The American Farm is 35 1/2 acres larger than it was in 1940, has a half a horse less, a quarter of a tractor more, about the same number of residents in the cowbarn and half a chicken more, according to the Bureau of the Census.

Compared with 1940, there are 713,000 less farms, but the total acreage remains about the same. Nearly a million and a half more farms were electrified and 221,000 more installed telephones from 1945 to 1950.

We don't know whether the hired man lit out for the city or whether he got fired, but during the decade 870,000 workers quit the soil. This is probably the most significant statistic in the farm census. Whether we like it or not, the day of mechanical help and power farming is here. Fortunately, most Americans like it.
