Social Security Swindle

The other evening I listened on the radio to Vice-President Alben W. Barkley. The Veep was in good form and when he's good, he's awfully good. The gentleman from Kentucky always has had "the gift of gab," and the passing of the years has not dimmed his oratorical powers nor his ability to turn a neat phrase.

Dear Alben was making out a great case for the New-Fair

Deal, and he was quite convincing considering the record of corruption and waste which has been laid at its door. Yes, the Veep, in the face of overwhelming odds, was painting a beautiful word picture of the glorious achievements of the Administration of which he is a part.

At long last he came to Social Security. That, he maintained, was one of the great, if not the greatest accomplishment of the New-Fair Deal. Then he went on to say that no Republican candidate would dare to suggest to his electorate that this great boon (?) to the American people be abolished; that any candidate foolish enough to do so would be snowed under.

Right there, if the Veep will pardon me, I wish to take sharp issue with him. On the contrary, I believe that any candidate, be he or she Republican or Demo-

crat, who tells the electorate the truth about Social Security and recommends that it be done away with, will be elected by a landslide. Never has such a hoax been perpetrated on a supposedly enlightened citizenry.

Social Security was conceived in iniquity, was born in shame and lives on in infamy.

It was conceived as a means of taxing the lower income groups, without their being aware that they were being taxed.

It was born to provide additional throw-away money for a profligate bureaucracy.

It lives on to rob the American workingman.

What are the facts about Social Security, that Vice-President Barkley so carefully neglected to tell his radio audience? Read them and weep!

1. To date, more than 20 billion dollars have been paid into the Old-Age And Survivors Insurance Trust Fund (the highfalutin name for Social Security).

2. To date, only slightly more than 6 billion dollars have been paid out in benefits.

3. Present assets of the Fund are listed as \$15,216,025,087.55. Actually, however, there is only 300 million dollars in cash on hand. The remainder consists of IOUs.

4. The difference between the alleged and the actual assets of the Fund have been used by the Federal Government to meet ordinary expenses, such as foreign aid, price supports, salaries, in fact, for everything but Social Security.

5. In 1940, total expenditures from the Fund were only 500 million dollars. This rose to more than three times that amount in 1950.

6. By 1971, it is estimated that those receiving Social Security pensions will number 10 1/2 million and will be taking a minimum of \$5,800,000,000 each year. That would mean drawing out of the Fund about \$2,400,000,000 more each year than is being paid in at present.

7. To meet this deficit, the present rate of contribution by employers and employees (1 1/2% each) will have to be greatly increased, or made up out of the general tax fund.

There is the lowdown on Social Security, which will let you see that it is neither social nor secure. The Vice-President points to it with pride, but every American should view it with alarm.

If any private insurance company had misappropriated funds (I could use the word embezzled) as the Federal Government has done with the Social Security funds, its officials would all be behind bars and the company out of business. As an employer, I feel a sense of guilt every time I make a Social Security deduction from the pay of my employees, and I feel like a

sucker when I make my own contribution to the swindle.

Yes, Mr. Vice-President, contrary to your stated belief, the sure way for a candidate to get himself elected next November is to exercise the wisdom, honesty and decency in displaying the courage to campaign against this evil thing — the Social Security Swindle.

Gas Company Asks For Rate Increase

The Lone Star Gas Company will seek increases in residential and commercial gas rates in the 375 cities and towns which it serves in Texas and Oklahoma, President D. A. Hulcy told stockholders at their annual meeting in Dallas Tuesday. He stated that the proposed rate changes affecting approximately 600,000 customers "will be gone into this summer."

The additional revenue, he said, is required to meet losses in income "due to increased Federal taxes, increased costs of gas in the field, rising costs for exploration and development, and the overall rising prices."

Mr. Hulcy declared that this will be the first general revision in Lone Star's rate structure since May 1942, when "We reduced our rates 13 per cent." He announced that the company's budget for extensions and additions to physical properties in 1952 exceeds \$31 million.

"I believe our customers as well as the regulatory bodies will understand our situation," he continued, "because all businesses and individuals, too, have had to wrestle with the problem of increased costs."

Lone Star's net income in 1951 was 19.4 per cent less than for the year 1950, he reported to the stockholders, and the direct tax bill of \$10,718,264 in 1951 was in excess of dividends paid to stockholders and also exceeded net earnings.

"This tax bill," he stated, "took over 18 cents out of every dollar Lone Star received for gas service."

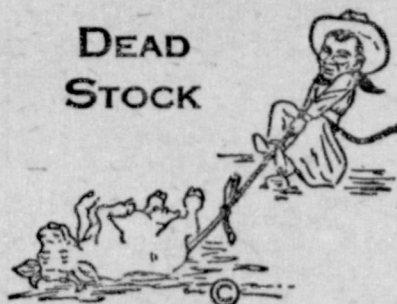

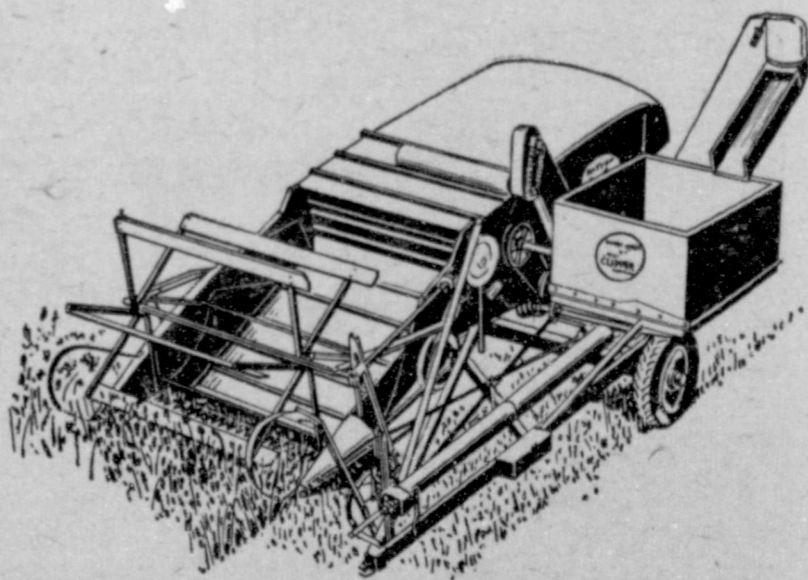

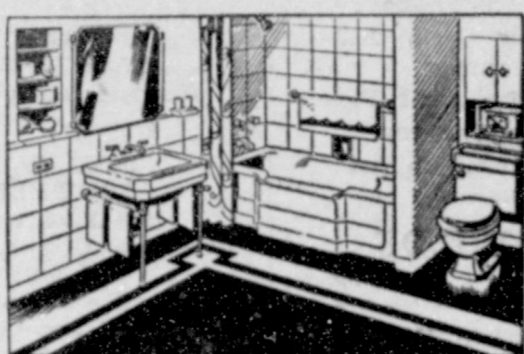
