President Carter's recent verbal blast at the oil industry in relation to profits prompted a stockholder of one company to offer explanations on what the industry actually does with the money it takes in.

He said that his company in a ten year period paid out nearly twice as much in income taxes to the federal government as it received in net income. In total taxes the firm shelled out nearly 20 times what the owners got from the business.

In the same period, he went on, the company plowed back earnings for expansion, which "mostly went into jobs for people — you can't drill a hole in the ground or buy transportation or equipment without putting people to work."

The trouble is that our spendthrift administration is trying to name a scapegoat for the snafu it has created in energy. It points a finger at imagined excess profits in an effort to justify its own wild idea of adding a tax to already high prices of petroleum products. It's easy to understand why the oil industry is fired of the inaction and loose talk that originates in Washington.

Western Company, which serves the oil industry, is currently conducting an advertising campaign in behalf of the oil companies. Contrary to the administration attitude, it claims that the worst disservice to a community or the nation is failure to make a profit. Without profit it pays no income tax, hires no more workers, and fails to increase its production. Perhaps it even goes broke forcing it to quit business, and leave employees without jobs as well as the area concerned with loss of business.

No one should need to be told that begrudging a profit to the oil industry is bad for the economy. Also it's bad for Uncle Sam's tax revenue. The exact opposite is the smart policy for government. With graduated income tax being what it is, the tax collector can get his best revenue by encouraging more production instead of less. And if IRS is not satisfied with that increase it can still promote an excess profits tax.

This kind of tax has lots of merit. If there are oil companies with big incomes, they are well able to remit, but the small struggling producer needs not get stuck.

A member of the House Budget Committee has done a bit of figuring and came up with some eye openers on the national debt. As he sees it, an average of \$263 of every individual income tax return eight years ago was applied to paying the interest on the national debt. Today an average of \$707 from every return goes to service that debt. It means that the debt increased 169 per cent in just eight years.

Also commenting on the Federal Government's wild spending, Senator Tower says in a recent newsletter that in the fiscal year 1978 the government will spend \$3.9 billion a day, which amounts to \$163 million per hour, \$2.719 million per minute, or \$45,300 per second.

What's more, there's no end in sight. Assuming an inflation rate of 5 per cent, that is admitted to be a very

SH Season Score: 303-100

Record keepers for the Sacred Heart Tigers closed out the team's very successful season with a set of impressive statistics headed by a lead of 303 to 100 in the total score.

On 472 carries in 11 games the team gained 2896 yards for an average of 260.5 per game whereas their opponents rushed 923 for an average of 83.9. In passing the Tigers barely nosed out their opponents with 761 yards while the others had 759, an average of 69 for each. In total yardage SH led 3627 to 1682, an average of 329 to 153. In first downs it led 185-88.

Individually Danny Walterscheid led the rushing with 1016 yards on 141 carries in 11 games for an average gain of 7.2. Joe Bartush carried 90 times in 9 games for 525 yards, an average of 5.8. Joe Sicking carried 62 times in 11 games for 445, an average of 7.1. Ken Felderhoff carried 53 times in 6 games for 434, an average of 8.1. Roger Haverkamp carried 17 times in 2 games for 116, and average of 6.8. Bob Hartman carried 109 times in 11 games for 330, an average of 3. Hartman also completed 55 passes out of 118 attempts for a completion percentage of 46.6.
