

### District Loses 7 in Scholastic Census; 1952 Total is 576

The 1952 scholastic count of the Muenster Independent School District si 576. The figure, representing a decrease of 7 from last year's recorded total, was announced Tuesday by Superintendent Weldon Cowan.

The drop, Cowan explained, is due to a net loss of 14 school age children through death and transfers. A comparison with last year's report indicates that 30 children moved out of the district and two died while only 18 moved into the district.

On the other hand gains and losses because of age account for a net gain of 7. Six year olds listed for the first time number 45 whereas 18 year olds not carried over from the previous census roll number 38.

By comparison with previous years the 1952 census also shows a sharp decrease in the number of six year olds. A breakdown of numbers according to children's ages indicates that number enrolled for the first time is the smallest since 1946.

Listing according to ages is as follows. 7 years, 67; 8 years, 55; 9 years, 73; 10 years, 45; 11 years, 49; 12 years, 54; 13 years, 35; 14 years, 46; 15 years, 32; 16 years, 37; 17 years, 39.





#### Soil Conservation Notes

Operations Waterway got an assist from the weatherman this week and shifted into high gear. A farm waterway is a natural or constructed water course that has been sodded to permanent grass for the purpose of disposing of run-off water without soil erosion. The sodding or sedding of waterway strips becomes a necessity when fields are to be protected by the construction of terraces that have no pasture outlets. Waterway pasture strips provide that safe outlet for terrace water.

Joe Wilde has just finished sodding a ten acre waterway along a natural drain on his farm near Hays. When established to grass the waterway will offer safe outlets for terracing about 80 acres of sloping farmland. In addition it will offer extra grass for pasture and stop erosion on the drain from damaging the field area. Wilde is also sowing sweet clovers on nearly 200 acres of the farm for grazing and soil protection and improvement. He used the district-owned sprig planter to plant the Bermuda grass roots on the waterway and a district combination grain-fertilizer drill to sow the clover.

Leo and Eddie Schmitt also used the district sprig planter to put Bermuda grass roots on three waterways on their farms northeast of Muenster.

Charles Cler and his sons, Alvin and Ray, have seeded a six acre waterway to King Ranch Bluestem on the farm a mile north of Muenster. This high producing, erosion resistant grass was seeded on a natural water drain and will serve as a safe outlet for terraces that will protect the field area. The grass will be used as a hay meadow when well established. This planting is a fine example of a district cooperator using his land for a crop that it is best suited for and treating the land in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement.

Alfons Luke has seeded a waterway on his farm to KR Bluestem and has also made a pasture planting of this grass. Herman Zimmerer has sown

10 acres of KR on the farm he operates for the Danglmayr Brothers.

J. W. Hess, Tony Felderhoff and Al Wiesman are some of the other cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation district who have planted this yel-Overall height of the Statue low bluestem grass for pasture and meadow.



Applying that to Muenster's case, it is possible, as the Register article mentions, that our district can be absorbed by Gainesville. Suppose Muenster fails to maintain a school that meets state requirements. The county board then has the power to annex the district to Gainesville. In the vote that follows both districts vote as one unit, for or against consolidation, Naturally Gainesville can outvote Muenster, so it can annex the district whether Muenster likes it or not.

It's something to thing about. From where it stands now the Muenster district can deteriorate itself out of existence or it can develop into an outstanding system competing with Gainesville for the annexation of those districts which fall by the wayside. What way it goes depends upon the people of Muenster.

In that connection it might be well to note that local interest is best served by having the best possible representation on the county school board . . . and Muenster now has a chance to improve its representation on the board.

In Saturday's school election Earl Robison is a candidate for trustee at large on the county school board. He is a resident of our district. He is known to all of us for his integrity and ability.
