

Air Force Told "Fly-Not Sit"

SUBMERSIBLE BARGE USED IN MARSHLAND OIL PRODUCTION the foot of South Africa. Cape

An ingenious method for prolucing oil from wells drilled in the marshlands of the Lower Mississippi Delta has been developed by an oil company. The problem of producing from wells d illed in open shallow water has been met by a submersible tank battery barge. Its bottom section is actually a pontoon, by means of which the unit can be floated to the desired location. When the sea cocks are opened, the barge sinks to rest on the bottom of the bay. The upper section, above water however comprises a platform for the production equipment and for the tanks for storing oil from the wells connected to it. By solving such problems as this, the nation's oil men continue to break production records.

A new, low-cost method of taking the salt out of sea water

has been developed by industrial research The new process may provide almost unlimited supplies of fresh water for agriculture, industry, and homes in arid regions within pipeline range of the seashore. Engineers point out that use of such treated seawater by industrial plants which had been obtaining water from wells would give the underground water a chance to rise to its old-

Electricity Used

The new process-said to cost as little as one-third of the best previous methods-is based on the use of electrical energy in conjuncton with synthetic membranes. When a stream of sea water is pased through a purifyout fresh, while the other third carries off the salt and minerals. Sponsors of the process said it

would provide relief in the near future for key areas in the United States. Later it may be used for opening up arid lands in this country as well as in Australia and the Middle East.

said His statement was based on inspection by his department during the past year of scales in grocery stores and gasoline pumps in service station. His department checked 7,742 scales, found 20 requiring adjust-

ment, and condemned 1,489 for repairs. Of 9,993 gasoline pumps, one was condemned and seized, 101 were adjusted and 2,011 were condemned for repairs.

"We find some instances of deliberate fraud," White said, "but most violations are the result of careless maintenance."

White said that faulty weighing and measuring devices were fewer in eight cities which had local inspectors.

He urged other cities and counties to set up local inspection arrangements in co-operation with the state to protect consumers. White said these are a few things a housewife can be on the watch for herself:

A scale may be "fixed" so that the pointer is set "fast," or ahead of zero.

A clerk in a busy store may throw an item on the scale and snatch it off before the pointer comes to rest, falsely charging for a higher weight than would be registered if the pointer were allowed to come to rest.


If a fan is placed overhead, a housewife pays for currents of air hitting the scale.

"If any housewife has a reason to believe a grocery store scale is not showing correct weight, she can drop a postcard to the State Department of Agriculture in Austin and we will make a check at once," White advised.
