Reports Wednesday afternoon were Weldon Holland, a native of that a few early starters have Forestburg is the elementary almost finished the job whereas a few late starters still have more than a week to go.

Both local grain dealers, a little less than half of their season's volume. At the end of Tuesday's receipts their combined volume was slightly more than 13,000 bushels of wheat, On that basis they estimate the community's total wheat crop at about 30,000 bushels.

Reports on yields continue to be good. The average as menthe grain is well over 20 bushels per acre for wheat, probably nearer to 25. There have been several reports on wheat yielding in the high twenties.

Oats likewise is doing well. Reports indicate that the community should average more than 60 bushels per acre.
