# Favorable Weather Prevails as Bumper

Grain farmers of Muenster got the breaks this year. They have had exceptionally favorable day Ralph Maglaughlin urged all weather for harvesting an exceptionally good crop, and up to Thursday they have about 90 per cent of their grain in the bin.

> The season is in sharp contrast with that of 1950 when the wettest summer on record delayed local harvesting into late August. The only interruptions this year came early in the season. They amounted to only a few days and caused no damage.

> With their grain well under control farmers now are eagerly awaiting the next rain. Corn is beginning to suffer, and the same applies to hay fields and pastures.

> Reports gathered by local grain dealers indicate that combining is practically finished. Wheat should be finished by the end of this week and only a Threshing, too, is well under way. Grain now in shocks will probably be cleared away before the end of next week.

The total wheat crop taken in by local dealers is expected to reach about 50,000 bushels. Up to Wednesday the total was 45,-000 bushels. Oats is estimated to run as high as 150,000 bushels, the figure being based on the fact that more land is planted in oats and yields average more than twice as high.

For the first time in many years practically all farmers are filling their oats bins . . . and the bins were empty at the beginning of the harvest. Arthur Felderhoff said that almost all men who had no more storage space for it.





Lawrence Sicking, whose farm is one mile south of Spring Creek, has had the lines run on one field of about 30 acres. He plans to use his tractor and disc plow in building the channel type terraces and will follow the island method as outlined by Hillard Hoffman, SCS technician, who assisted in laying out the terraces.

These terraces will protect cultivated land from runoff water and will empty on two waterways that have sodded to bermuda grass. Both grassed areas have been fenced in with existing pastures and now serve a dual purpose . . as terrace outlets and permanent

Terraces and waterways being established on the Sicking farm are only a part of the complete conservation plan drawn up on the farm two years ago. Other practices already installed include pasture soddings, cover crops, contour farming and stubble mulching. This year Sicking has several acres of Madrid clover which he plans to harvest

When the central Centennial celebration was awarded to Dallas the fairgrounds was valued at \$4 million. Additional funds from municipal bonds, private subscription exhibitors and state and federal governments made the Texas Centennial a \$25-million exposition.

State Fair Park was enlarged to 187 acres and transformed into a beautifully landscaped park, studded with magnificent modern buildings. All the old exhibit buildings were modernized and new ones were built. The million-dollar Hall of State was built at one end of a wide Esplanade. Around a lagoon museum buildings were constructed.

The Texas Centennial was one of the four great world fairs of the 1930's, along with those at Chicago, San Francisco and New York. The other expositions came and went; on the site of the Dallas exposition a bigger fair grows each year. And the Centennial buildings are used

every day in the year.
After World War II the fairgrounds continued to show impressive development. A huge Automo-bile Building was built to replace A wooden football stadium seating 15,000 was built in 1921.
