

Then, one night came a big wind. It awakened the farmer. Remembering the damage done by previous winds, he sprang out of bed ready to go into action. He called to the new hired hand to get up. Getting no response, he went to his room, shouted at him, shook him, but all he could elicit was a grunt. That hired hand hadn't been kidding when he said, " Well, I know how to sleep on windy nights."

Disgusted, the farmer went out alone to the barn expecting to find doors burst open and things blown hither and yon. To his delighted surprise, all was shipshape. Some of the odd jobs the hired hand had done on his own had consisted of fastening securely anything and everything that the wind might damage. At long last it dawned on the farmer that being able to sleep on windy nights was proof positive of farming ability, not to mention evidence of foresight and wisdom. 


