ALWAYS A HARD WORKER

Hard work has characterized his whole life. At the age of 9, he worked as a ranch helper and newsboy in Liberty. Later, while attending high school in Fort Worth, he helped pay his way by working as a cub reporter on the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. He worked on the Waco News-Tribune while attending Baylor University, where he earned degrees in journalism and law.

LAWYER AND LAW-MAKER

Back home in Liberty, Price Daniel opened his law office at the height of the depression. His office was on the same spot where General Sam Houston, hero of San Jacinto and Texas' first U.S. Senator, had his law office 100 years earlier. Daniel struggled to make ends meet, earning \$75 a month his first year. He soon won a brilliant reputation as a lawyer, and was elected to represent the people of Liberty and Hardin Counties in the Texas Legislature.

SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE

During his six years in the House, Daniel sponsored much constructive legislation for better schools, conservation of natural resources and full payment of old-age pensions. He opposed a State income tax and a general sales tax, being one of the "Fighting 56" who defeated the sales tax amendment.

In his third term as a legislator, Price Daniel, at the age of 32, was elected Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives. Here he vigorously fought waste and extravagance in State govern-

WORLD WAR II VETERAN

While still Speaker of the House, Price Daniel waived his legislative exemption and enlisted in the Army as a private. He served three years, having overseas duty in the Pacific with both the Army and Marines. He was discharged as a Captain. He is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion. He is the only veteran in the Senate race.







Farm safety surveys made by 4-H'ers show that matches within reach of small children and stairways littered with toys, jars and other articles were much in evidence as fire and accident hazards in rural homes.

Chicago-(Special)-More than 575,000 4-H Club boys and girls throughout the nation are receiving training in farm accident and fire prevention this year. The out-standing feature of this training in the National 4-H Farm and Home Safety program is to check and remove from farms and homes any conditions likely to cause fire, accidents or injuries. These 4-H surveys are acclaimed a valuable contribution to the nation-wide campaign to reduce the annual toll of 15,000 farm
