Soil Conservation Notes

This week the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District received a new shipment of weapons for use in the battle against erosion and soil waste. The weapons are five new combination grain-fertilizer drills for use in the Muenster area. These drills are for the use of farmers cooperating with the district to protect and improve their soils. They are to be used for the seeding of soil improving cover crops such as vetch, clover, alfalfa and peas. The combination drills also put needed fertilizer on the land at the time of seeding.

Counter attacks against erosion and improper land use along the waterway front have already begun. Waterways to serve as terrace outlets and to protect land against soil erosion are being marked on farms around Muenster. The areas earmarked for sodding or seeding to grasses are marked off so that proper seed bed preparations can be made before sodding time and so that grain will not be sown in the waterway area

Waterway areas have been marked off and the land prepared for sodding Bermuda grass no the F. J. Hacker farm south of Muenster, on the Dangelmayr farm operated by Norbert Koesler, on Tony Wimmer's farm near Hays and on the Tony and Martin Trubenbach farms at Hood. The waterway areas in most cases follow natural drains and will serve as both a pasture strip and as a safe terrace outlet area.

Past experience has shown that good seed bed preparation is one of the most important factors in getting a quick cover of grass in that waterway. Now is the time to get that waterway in shape or next year's planting. For help in locating and staking your waterway areas don't hesitate to call on the SCS personnel, technicians of the Muenster office said this week.
