

Muenster Schools Gain 42; Combined Enrollment is 654

Scholastic enrollment at the two Muenster schools made another substantial increase this year with a combined total of 654 as compared with 612 at last year's opening.

Of that total 488 are in the parochial school and 166 are in the public school, an increase of 23 in the parochial school and 19 in the public school.

A further breakdown of figures reveals an increase in each department of the two schools. Parochial enrollment rose from 57 to 66 in the high school and from 408 to 422 in the grades. Public school enrollment rose from 77 to 90 in high school and from 70 to 76 in the grades.

As before, students of both schools are using facilities of the lunch room.



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

For years I've said that Communism and Socialism is defined as government ownership or control of the means of production and distribution. In economics, Communism requires exactly the same thing. The social philosophies, or credos, differ at least on the surface. Some self-styled Socialists accept the idea of God. Communists don't. But every Communist intellectual I've ever come across speaks of Socialism as the basic philosophy of Communists.

What are the signs of the growth of the Socialist idea in our own nation? There are many. Earl Browder, Communist leader who was booted out of the party for harboring questioning thoughts about Stalin, says the following measures are necessary in this nation in order for full State Socialism, or Communism, to eventually take over:

It Pays to Test and Know Soil Content

There is no point in swapping even dollars. But, when you can swap one for eight, that is good business. Mr. Ed Detrixhe, a Hemphill county wheat farmer made that kind of a swap this year on his wheat crop.

Hemphill county agent Walter Grist says it all started as a result of a soil test. Mr. Detrixhe Mrs. Sam Sparkman will be submitted a soil sample to the hostess for the next meeting of Texas A. & M. College System's Extension Service Soils Laboratory and then carried out the man's farm, Muenster. "Does this package belong to recommendations on his farm. M. K. Thornton, agricultral "Can't be mine - my name is chemist in charge of the lab, makes recommendations on fertilizer usage and cropping practices as a part of the soil testing service.

Here is the story as reported by Grist. Mr. Detrixhe applied 30 pounds of nitrogen per acre to 80 acres of wheat and when he had finished combining, he found that this field had produced an average of 35 bushels per acre against a 11 to 14 bushel average for the unfertilized acreage. That Lindsay. increase of better than 20 bushels per acre paid him \$8 in rebushels is somekind of a record for dryland wheat.
