Some of us have been advocating a ban on industry-wide bargaining since before the Taftbooks. In fact, when the Hartley Act passed the House of Representatives-it became the Taft-Hartly Act in the Senateit contained a provision which prohibited industry-wide bargaining. This provision unfortunately was knocked out in the Senate. The reason given at the time being that if it stayed in, the Senate would not pass the bill and industry would have to continue to operate under the Wagner Act.

This may or may not have been true. But whether it was or not, it is certainly now evident to everyone that if we don't want the country taken over by union labor bosses, Congress will have to break up the labor monopoly which has grown up under industry-wide bargaining This is the most far-reaching and most dangerous monopoly this country has ever known.
