gains. The Hornets on the other hand made several of their scores on long plays promptly after taking over the ball. They gained 264 on ground plays and 134 on pass plays.

Aytes received the opening kickoff for Muenster and returned about 10 to the 38. Two plays advanced to the 49 and Noggler kicked on the next series.

Short gains along with two 5 yard penalties against the Hornets enabled the Wildcats to mark up 3 first downs, advancing from their 20 to the Hornet 43. They kicked on the next series and Jones returning from behind his goal was nailed on the 6.

A short gain and a penalty advanced Callisburg to the Hornet 36, and Crowsey's dash reached the 25, but four more tries netted only 5 and the Hornets took the ball on their 20. On the first play Hamric's pass

to Richey added 11. On the next play Aytes took Hamric's pass in midfield, shook off a tackler and raced to the goal line. Noggler kicked the extra point.

Callisburg brought the next kick off back to the 37 and lost the ball two plays later on Jones' interception and return to the 33.

A short gain and a pass to Fleitman reached the 19 and another pass, Hamric to Aytes raked up the final score. Jones missed his kick for extra point.

Time ran out as Callisburg completed another first down.

## The American Way

CONTRAST IN RESULTS  
 By DeWitt Emery

A lot of steelworkers, I'm told, are now firmly convinced (privately, of course, they don't dare speak up in meeting) that they belong to the wrong union.

From June 2nd, when the steel strike started, until July 27th, when it ended, the average CIO member who had to strike whether he wanted to or not lost something over \$600.00 in wages. During the same 55 days the 12,000 employees of the Weirton Steel Company, members of an independent union, earned \$7,485,770.64. They didn't go on strike. It has been almost twenty years since the last strike at Weirton.

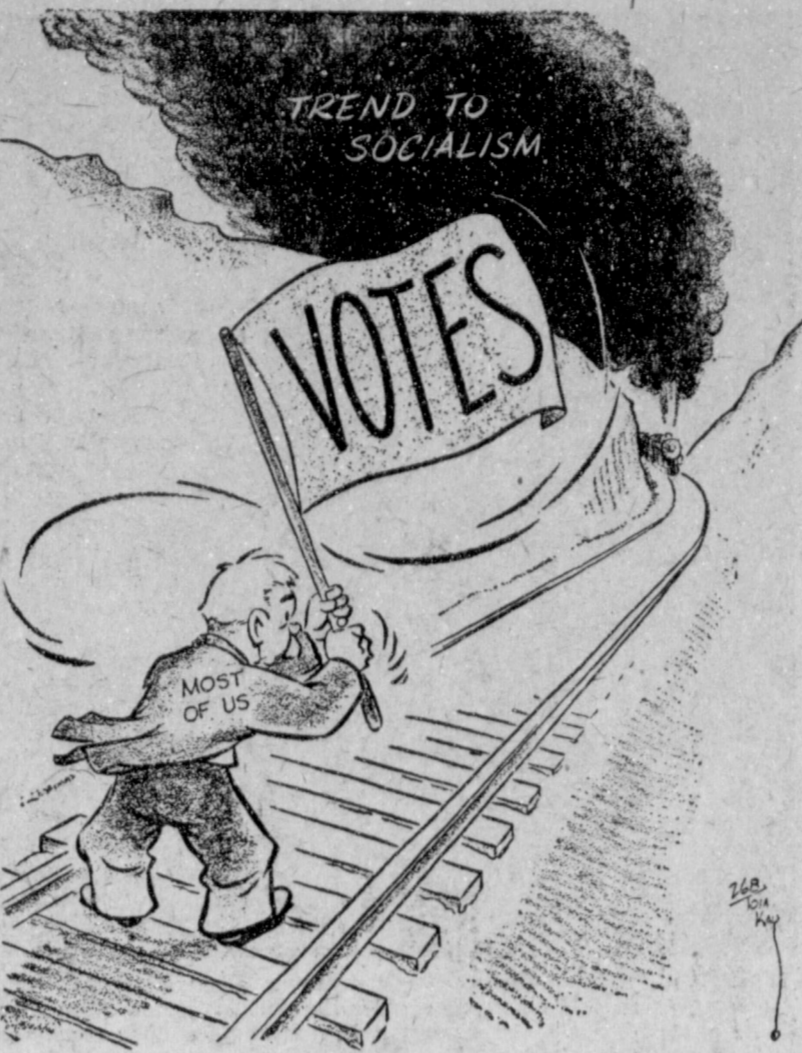
Quite a contrast, what, when the record of the independent union at Weirton is compared with the record of the CIO Steelworkers Union. The contrast is even more marked when you consider that the basic labor rate at Weirton is \$154 per hour; \$12.32 for an eight hour day. This, according to R. B. Buchanan, President of the Independent Steelworkers Union, is the high-

est basic rate in the steel industry.

In 1946 when the CIO steelworkers were on strike for 26 days, Weirton workers stayed on the job and earned \$2,093,000. In 1949 during the CIO's "pension strike" Weirton workers again stayed on the job and earned \$5,417,000, while the CIOers were idle.

Over the years the CIO has done everything it can think of to get a union in the Weirton plant but has never been able to get to first base. The Weirton employees know when they are well off. They like the idea of running their own union, of, by and for themselves; of doing their own bargaining directly with the management of the plant. They don't want any part of the CIO or any other national union telling them what to do, how and when to do it. In the 1950 bargaining election Weirton employees voted overwhelmingly in favor of their independent union.

When the Taft-Hartley Act is amended to put a ban on industry-wide bargaining, then all union labor bargaining will be at the plant level directly with the management of that plant by officials of the union who repre-

sent the employees in that plant. That's the way it should be and this kind of bargaining will pay dividends for other unions just as it has paid big dividends for the Weirton steelworkers.

Some of us have been advocating a ban on industry-wide bargaining since before the Taft-Hartley Act was put on the books. In fact, when the Hartley Act passed the House of Representatives—it became the Taft-Hartly Act in the Senate—it contained a provision which prohibited industry-wide bargaining. This provision unfortunately was knocked out in the Senate. The reason given at the time being that if it stayed in, the Senate would not pass the bill and industry would have to continue to operate under the Wagner Act.

This may or may not have been true. But whether it was or not, it is certainly now evident to everyone that if we don't want the country taken over by union labor bosses, Congress will have to break up the labor monopoly which has grown up under industry-wide bargaining. This is the most far-reaching and most dangerous monopoly this country has ever known.

Will action be taken on this very serious matter shortly after the 83rd Congress convenes next January? It will not, that is it

won't, unless the people make it unmistakably clear to members of Congress that they want a ban put on industry-wide bargaining.
