

Muenster Favors Eisenhower 8 to 1 In Record Ballot

Like the nation, the state and the county, Muenster swarmed to the polls Tuesday and voted its overwhelming preference for Dwight D. Eisenhower and Richard M Nixon as the next president and vice president of the United States.

The only difference was that Muenster surpassed by far the percentages of preference by the nation, state and county. Final count in the two voting boxes was 645 out of 725, or 89 per cent for Eisenhower.

Broken down according to the two local voting boxes the count was as follows: North box; 489 for Eisenhower and 60 for Stevenson, South box 156 for Eisenhower and 20 for Stevenson.

Besides being the largest Republican majority ever polled here, the election was Muenster's largest on record. The north box had 595 votes and the south box had 176 for a total 771. Eligible voters listed were 520 poll taxes and 25 under poll tax age exemptions in the north voting precinct and 153 poll taxes and 8 exemptions in the south precinct. Over poll tax age voters. of which no list is available, are estimated to number about 150 in North Muenster and about 30 in South Muenster.

A few more eligible voters are persons who formerly voted at Freemound. That voting box was not open, and the people did their voting at South Muenster and Rosston.

Counting all eligibles Muenster had an estimated voting strength of 900 and the ballots cast represent about 86 per cent of the possible vote.



Built near Cologne, Germany, for test runs only, the model car is two-fifths normal size, travels 100 miles per hour. Backed by Swedish millionaire, Axel Wenner-Gren, the new train was kept secret by the Rail Transportation Research Society until this year. At right is the unique monorail track at a switching point which is set to curve right. Electric power is fed to the engine through metal bands on the rails. 

Farmers Urged to Improve Ponds Now

The Assistant Chief Aquatic Riol gist of the Game and Fish Commission suggested that Texans utilize the drought to improve tanks, ponds or lakes that have dried up.

He said that the tanks and oonds could be deepened and enlarged and silt removed from the bottom since, contrary to popular belief, silt is harmful rather than beneficial to water bodies.

The Assistant Chief also pointed out that the enlargement will increase the surfaces and thus benefit fish life since most fish foods are produced in the upper one foot of wa er.

Future food facilities also may be improved, he said, by planting legumes in the dried-up bottom area.

Farmers and ranchers also were advised to capitalize on the opportunity by planning to restock their tanks and ponds with desirable species and thus keep down the rough fish which prey on the game fish.

The Game and Fish Commission cooperates with persons with tank or small lakes since they provide increased facilities for the fishing public and since private waters oftentimes supply such as brood bass for state hatcheries.

The Assistant Chief reminded persons who have ordered fish from state hatcheries to notify the nearest hatchery if their tanks or ponds have dried up or are about to. Such persons, he said, will be given priority when wet weather returns and the deliveries are resumed.

Here's How Little Rain We're Having

Everybody knows that this is the year of the big drought, but in case anyone doesn't know how little moisture the community has had here are a few figures taken from Steve Moter's official record.

The month just past was bone dry, the second completely dry month since January 1946, when the record started. The other norain month was November 1949.

Records also show that total moisture for the past five months, June through October was only 2.40 inches, about one fourth the average during those months during the preceding six years, and also the dryest five month period on record. Almost as dry was the five months of October '49 through February '50 for a total of 2.62 inches.

Another record is the scarcity of rainfall since the beginning of the year. Figures show a total of 17.05 inches up to November 1. The average for the first 10 months in the preceding six years is slightly over thirty

Unless this month and next bring far more rain than the average of closing months of past four years, the 1952 total will be less than 20 inches. The lowest total record here is 26.25 inches, in 1948. The highest total is 43,53, in 1950, and the average is 36.93.


an over all paving job and still serve the city's purpose very well.

Let property owners along those streets pay for half the paving. It's worth something extra to them to have the pavement pass their doors.

But at the same time let's bear in mind that the pavement is valuable also to the people still living on gravel streets. When they drive they will use the pavement . . . probably no one will be more than a block from it one way or the other. And since most people will drive on it there will be little traffic to raise dust on the gravel streets. Everybody benefits and it's reasonable for everybody to help

The idea of buying pavement in shorter strips as we can pay for them has at least a few serious shortcomings. One is that several small projects cost considerably more than one large one. Another is that we continue paying the present maintenance costs for many years longer. And then there's the matter of what neighborhood to favor with the first short strip of pavement. Everybody wants to get away from the dust as soon as possi-

This column does not presume to offer the only solution of financing the project, and most likely somebody will work out a better one. But that isn't important. What counts is that we will eventually pay the price of a pavement job whether we have it or not. Well, then why not have
