Over 145 acres of his farm operated by Bill Jones has been sown to this soil building crop. Oats was sown as a companion crop to the vetch to give additional grazing and to hold the vetch for combining. Phosphate fertilizer was applied to enable vetch to do a better job of soil improving.

Others near Muenster who have helped in the vetch campaign and stand to share in the soil protection and benefit handouts include Al Wiesman, 20 acres; Norbert Klement, seven acres; Bill Lutkenhaus, 11 acres; Hugo Lutkenhaus, seven and a half acres; Charles Clayton, three acres; T. Miller 10 acres of winter peas. Winter peas are used as a green manure crop ahead of corn and

At Saint Jo the cover crop vote was running strong for hairy vetch. W. E. Scott seeded 50 acres to vetch and rye; Curtis Young planted 43 acres to vetch; Jake Siebold planted 40 acres to this soil conservation crop.
