

### Scholastic Census Will Begin Monday

Parents of the Muenster Independent School District are reminded this week that the 1953 scholastic census will begin next week and continue through the month of March.

Superintendent Weldon Cowan this week announced the census and also called attention to the state's regulation concerning scholastic age. The law specifies that the official count shall include all children of the district who will be between 6 and 18 years of age on September 1. 1953 and who are residents of the district on April 1, 1953. Children born on or before Sept. 1 1935, or after Sept. 1, 1947, must

not be enumerated. To save time for the enumerator parents are asked to prepare a list showing the name, sex and date of birth of each scholastic age child and have it ready when the enumerator arrives.

Cowan also called attention to the section of the census form which refers to physical handicaps. Parents are expected to report cases of blindness, deficient vision, deafness, deficient hearing, speech disorder, mentally retarded, curvature of the spine, club feet, infantile paralysis, leg or arm amputation, nervous disorder or lowered vitality. .
