extent that they are truly sick extent that they are truly sick
They are in a run-down condifion. They are suffering from an acute lack of organic matter; and fertility is low. The soils are lef without a protective cover dur
ing parts of the year, consequent ly they run a high fever in th summer and have severe chills in the winter. They are worked and grazed when wet which re-
sults in a compound compaction sults in a compound compaction
in the root zone, commonly re ferred to as plow pan and hoo ferred
pan.

After a careful diagnosis of the case of the sick soil, the group discussed ways to bring it back
to its youthful condition-a condition of high organic matter good structure and high fertility. so make it a highly productive
soil full of life and capable soil full of life and capable of oil as American forefathers knew
Mother Nature's methods o building soils was used as a pre
scription and the following prinscription and the following prin-
ciples of soil improvement were set up as treatments to get the sick soil back on the job.

OR G A N IC MATTER-Grow crops for organic matter supply and leave all residues on the soil surface.
