Mr. Krebs is a graduate of Gainesville High school and served in the army two years; with one year in Germany. Since returning to civilian life he is employed in Dallas.

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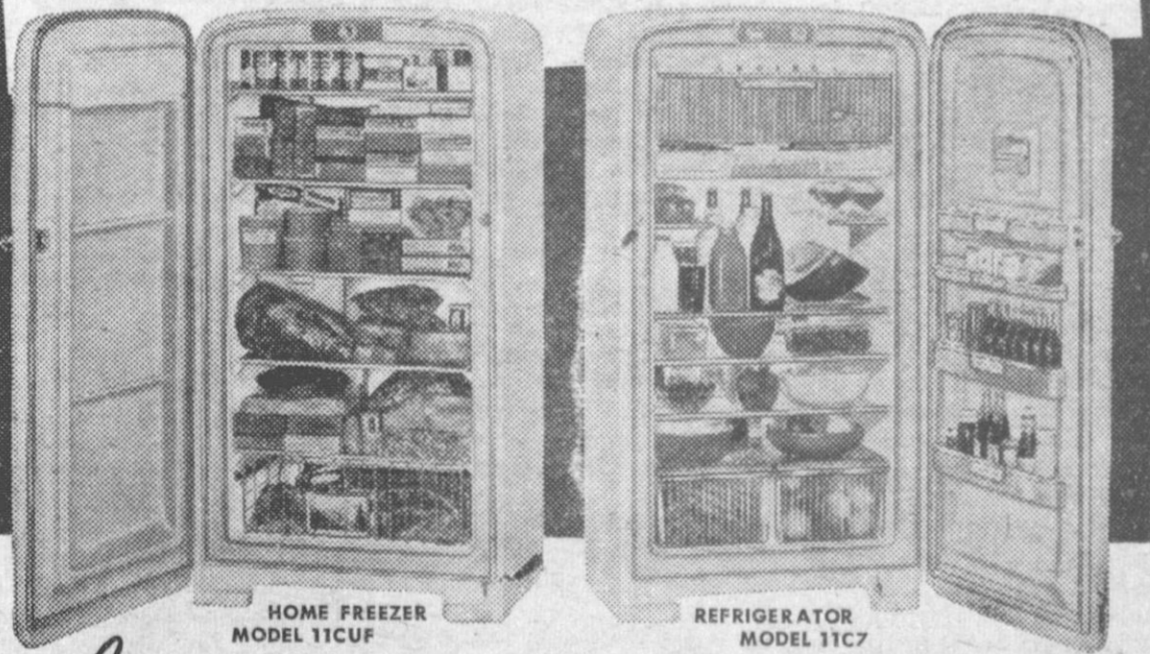
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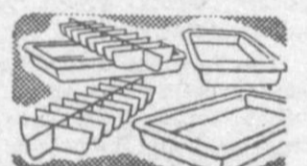
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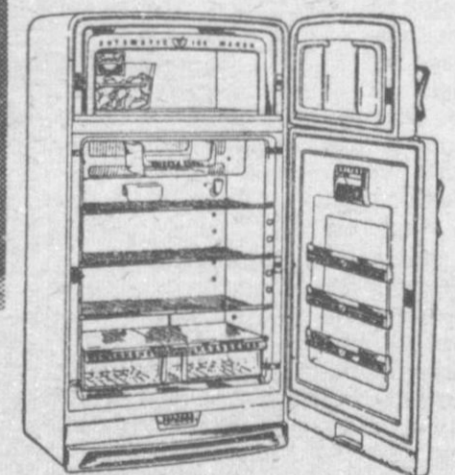

### HONORS FOR CONSPICUOUS CITIZENSHIP

About the same time that Whittaker Chambers, the Communist spy courier, was receiving top-secret documents from a high-placed U. S. government official named Alger Hiss, for transfer to Russian agents, Dr. J. E. Matthews, chief research investigator of the House Un-American Activities Committee, was delivering to the Department of Justice a confidential list of 1,124 alleged Communists, fellow-travelers; and sympathizers within the federal government.

As one of the best informed men in America on the Communist conspiracy, Dr. Matthews had been instructed by the House of Representatives to prepare the list. Most of our Congressmen wanted to root out the traitors and potential traitors. The House appropriated \$100,000 for the Justice Department's use in further investigations of the federal employees named in the Matthews report. Yet, no effective action was taken.

#### Astonishing Facts

On the Matthews secret list of suspected subversives then within our government were names of a number who, years later,

were to be publicly identified as important members of the conspiracy. High on the list was the name of Alger Hiss! Eight years before Whittaker Chambers exposed Hiss to a grand jury, Dr. Matthews had exposed him to Attorney General Francis Biddle. Yet Hiss remained, and was elevated to ever more influential positions in the government!

Dr. Matthews was blocked by powerful men inside our government; and for 15 years he has been smeared by the Communists, their fellow-travelers, and their shallow-minded but sometimes influential dupes. But he never has quit fighting the conspirators. Until he became an investigator for the House Un-American Activities Committee, he had been one of the most popular educators on the college lecture circuit, speaking on campuses from coast to coast. When he began to fight communism he lost his popularity. In 15 years, while serving the House committee and during eight years following his resignation, he was invited to only two college campuses. I'm proud that Harding College was one of them.

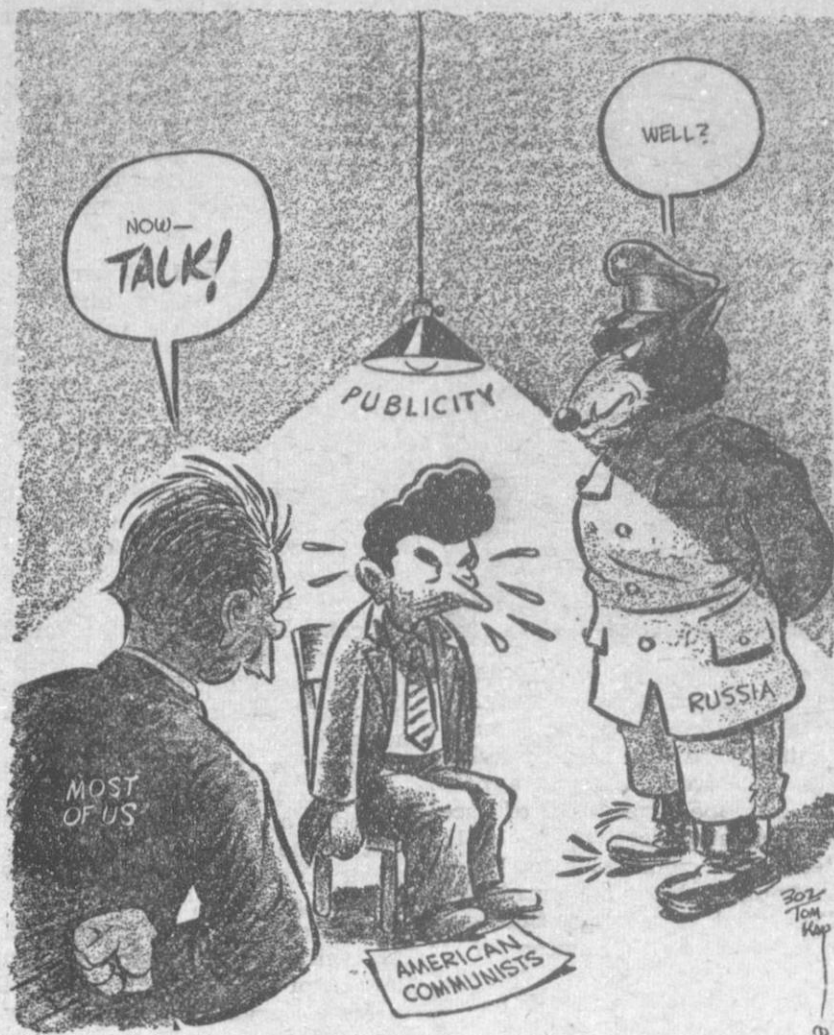
#### His Friends Gather

A few months ago a testimonial dinner was given for Dr. Matthews at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York. His friends came from all over the nation. George E. Sokolsky, the columnist and commentator, was toastmaster. The guest list included such names as General Albert C. Wedemeyer (the Wedemeyer Report on China); General Charles A. Willoughby (General MacArthur's G-2 chief in the Pacific); Senators Pat McCarran, W. Stuart Symington, Wallace Bennett and Joseph McCarthy; Walter Winchell, Lawrence Spivak ("Meet the Press"); Eugene Lyons, the columnist-author; Wm. Randolph Hearst, Jr., the publisher; Rep. Martin Dies, of Texas; Stanley High, associate editor of Reader's Digest; Matt Cvetic, who served nine years as a Communist for the F.B.I., and many others.

At my table were Jonn T. Flynn, the author-commentator; Alexander Barmine, former Soviet General in the Red Army Intelligence; Frank E. Mason, former U. S. Minister to France, and a number of other distinguished Americans.

#### A Nation's Gratitude

James O'Neil, representing the American Legion's Americanism Commission, presented to Dr. Matthews a scroll of gratitude on behalf of this great nationwide veteran's organization for his service to the nation in fighting communism; National Commander John C. Coughlin, of the Catholic War Veterans, presented a similar testimonial from his organization; and Alfred Kohlberg presented one on behalf of the American Jewish League against Communism. privilege to present a scroll of gratitude to Dr. Matthews from Harding College, signed by nearly 600 students and faculty members. The diners presented Dr. and Mrs. Matthews with a beautiful silver service.

Next day I looked through the New York TIMES which, I was told, had a reporter at the dinner. But I found no TIMES report on this nationally significant meeting honoring one of the nation's leading fighters of internal communism. I was dumbfounded.

How could an American newspaper with the coverage and the standing of the TIMES consider a courageous fighter of Communism, honored by nationwide organizations, to be unworthy of notice? This is a strange incident in American journalism!

## Suffering Can Make You A Perfect Man

 Some men misunderstand God. They interpret His goodness as indifference to justice, and regard Him less as a loving father than as a dotting grandfather who likes to see His children amuse themselves, even when they break things, including His Commandments.

that God gives us what we need for our perfection, not what we want for our pleasure and sometimes for our destruction. As a sculptor, He sometimes applies the chisel to the marble of our imperfect selves and knocks off huge chunks of selfishness that His image may better stand revealed.

Too many assume that God is good only when He gives us what we want. We are like children who think our parents do not love us because they do not give us revolvers, or because they make us go to school. To understand goodness, we must distinguish between getting what we want and getting what we need.

Is God good when He fulfills our wishes, or when we fulfill His? Is God good only when He gives us what we want, or is He good when He gives us what we need even though we do not want it?

As the Supreme Lover of our soul, He does care how we act. What father does not want to be proud of his son? If he speaks with authority to his son, it is not because he is a dictator, but because he wants a worthy son. Not even "pro-gressive" parents, who deny discipline and restraint, are indifferent to their children's progress. If there is love, there is necessarily a desire for the perfecting of the beloved. Because God loves us, He is not disinterested.

The thief on the left judged Our Lord's goodness by His power to take him down from his cross; that was what he wanted. The thief on the right judged Our Lord's goodness by His power to take him into Paradise; that was what he needed.

God could never let you suffer pain if it could not help you. If He did not spare His own Son on the Cross for the redemption of the world, then certainly He will sometimes not spare your wants, that you might be all you need to be: happy and perfect children of a loving Father.

**Soil Conservation Notes**

Hairy vetch and sweet clover began playing their role as cash crops last week as cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red soil conservation district began harvesting the seed crops of these soil building legumes. The dry weather of the past two years makes the prospects of a sweet clover and vetch seed shortage loom large on the horizon and farmers are making a special effort to save all seed possible.

J. W. Fleitman has finished combining Madrid sweet clover on his farm four miles east of Muenster. He allowed the clover to remain in windrows until dry before running it through the combine. This is the method widely used to save the greatest amount of seed.

The clover should be windrowed when two-thirds of the seeds are brown, allowed to remain in windrows three to four days then picked up with a combine.

Leo Mosman of Myra is in the midst of harvesting his clover seed.

Cooperators of the district are again reminded by technicians of the SCS that the heavy stubble and crop residue on their fields after this bumper harvest represents organic matter and added soil protection and should not be destroyed. The straw and stubble can be a good deposit in the soil bank if left on or near the soil surface. It will add organic matter to the soil and offer protection to the soil surface as a protective mulch. Nitrogen fertilizer turned under with the heavy stubble will greatly improve next season's crops.

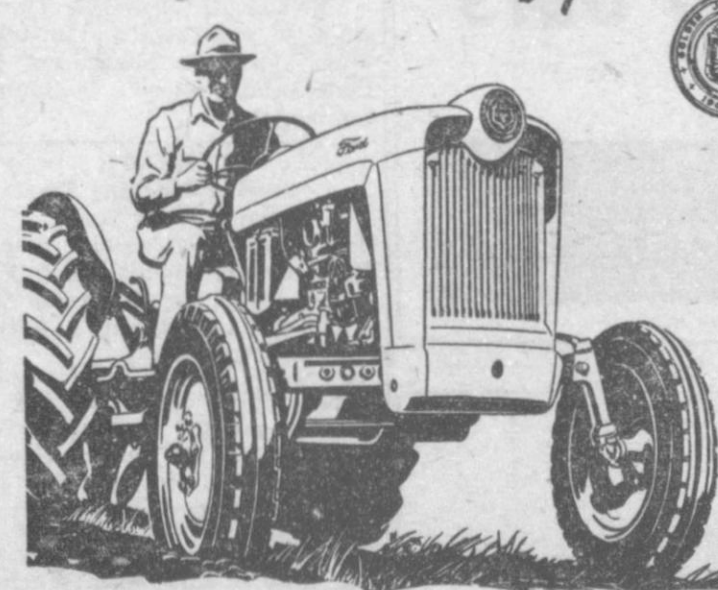
