At least the large crucifix and railings will be installed in the new Sacred Heart Church before dedication day. That was assured Tuesday when most of the missing woodwork arrived. The only wood items not received are station frames for the way of the

The shipment was moved to the old parochial high school building Tuesday and carpenters started uncrating it Wednesday. Installation began later in the day under the supervision of Floyd Mc-Adam, who superintended construction of the church.

All the woodwork is of hand carved white oak, custom made by E. Hackner Company of La Crosse, Wisconsin.

The crucifix which will dominate the front wall above the main altar is made up of a cross 19 feet high and a corpus 9 feet high.

The communion rail will reach from wall to wall, a span of 54 good training, to take its place directly in front of the center aisle. Its base will be marble, which will be supplied in Dallas. Soil Conservation Notes

Here is how it happened. Bess planted 15 acres of a bottomland field to vetch two years ago. He applied 300 pounds of superphosphate at time of seeding and inoculated his vetch seed. The first year the vetch was grazed until May and a seed crop of 400 families will have a joint social pounds of seed per acre was harmeeting at the club house next vested in July. Bess values the returns from the first year of vetch to be \$60 per acre of seed and \$24 per acre for grazing.

This spring the entire field was planted to corn. The 15 acres where the vetch was grown yielded 74 bushels per acre. The rest of the field produced an average of 12 bushels per acre. The vetch land produced 62 bushels more than the no-vetch land. At current prices of \$1.35 per bushel this increase in yield was worth \$83.70 per acre.

In other words, the vetch treated acres were equal in production to six of the untreated acres. A good example of how each acre can be made more productive through the application of conservation measures.

Muenster cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District are applying conservation practices to their farms step by step. At this time of year the practice being applied to the cultivated land is terracing to aid in preventing soil and water losses.

Ray and Alvin Cler have completed 4500 feet of terraces on the home place. The terraces outlet onto a King Ranch Bluestem waterway that was seeded to serve as a terrace disposal area.
