Considering all the sincerely religious people serving on school faculties, it is hard to imagine that they would fail to present a nugget of religious teaching when the occasion arises. Regardless of legality, some denominational religion is being taught in public schools. Parents know it and are glad. State educational heads probably know it also, but they are not inclined to be fussy as long as communities are happy. Besides, they are also aware of the need of religion in school.

As a matter of fact the state school bosses practically invite the teaching of sectarian religion in public school. They recognize Bible as an accredited course. Theoretically it is a strictly ob-



Farmers Face Serious Grain Storage Problem

The government called upon farmers Saturday to store on farms another year about 500,-000,000 bushels of 1953-crop grains to help meet what it described as the most serious grain storage problem ever faced.

The problem will reach a peak when this year's crops are harvested next summer and must compete for storage with record surpluses accumulated from past years.

As an incentive, the Agriculture Department offered farmers storage payments to hold such grains as wheat, corn, oats, barley, grain sorghums,

rye and flaxseed stored under the government's 1953 price support loan program.

The loans fall due this spring and summer and the grains will, in effect, belong to the government unless farmers pay off their obligations and redeem the grain.

The department also announced that it will continue for another year the farm storage and equipment loan program designed to encourage expansion of farm storage. Under this program, farmers may borrow up to 80 per cent of the cost of building or buying additional storage space.
