

## Psychiatrist Hits Kinsey Report

Washington, D. C. - A psychiatrist here termed the Kin-sey report "questionable" and "misleading."

In an article written for the N. C. W. C. News Service, Dr. Robert P. Odenwald, practicing Washington psychiatrist and prominent author on sex education, stated, "the report will be entirely misleading and harmful in its emphasis upon the usualness of extra-marital relations." It implies that statistics make morality, that what many do is therefore morally right.

A LARGE PORTION of our population suffers from cancer, but we do not say that it is therefore natural or desirable. Because a portion of America's women fail in matters of purity, this failure does not make their impurity morally right. Right is right if no one is right. Wrong is wrong if everyone is wrong. Sexual infidelities debase the human person, pervert his noblest desires, wreak havoc with both soul and body. Said Dr. Odenwald, "The

God-given value of sex cannot be separated from the material aspects of sex behavior, as Dr. Kinsey has done." The sacredness of sex is lost in a maze of statistics. Sex, like everything natural, is good if used according to its purpose. DR. ODENWALD, like many scientists, also attacked the value of Dr. Kinsey's statistics, calling them "far from convincing or scientifically proved." Of America's 80 million women, Dr. Kinsey interviewed only 6,000. And these 6,000 were hardly representative of



America's women. Women with strong religious convictions were not proportionately represented. Dr. Kinsey admits these shortcomings, but the average reader does not consider them. We can hardly judge America's 80 million women on the basis of a non-representative sampling of 6,000.

#### Soil Conservation Notes

Phosphate, inoculate, plant inter legumes now.

Old Man Weather has started the winter cover crop ball rolling with a lusty kick-off that put three inches of rainfall on the land. Farmers and ranchers now have a chance to get into the game by taking advantage of the moisture to get vetch, alfalfa and peas planted.

The star players that land owners can use in the clash against the devastating attack of hard hitting water and wind erosion are triple-threat winter legumes, hairy vetch, Austrian winter peas, and alfalfa.

This legume team serves to put a carpet of green over the playing field. This forage tent lets the rain drops fall gently to the soil and so stops the attack of splash erosion before they can get started. When soil bombardment and soil splashing is stopped more rain goes into the soil to grow crops and less is lost in run-off water to cause soil losses. While protecting the land the legumes are also improving the soil by adding nitrogen and organic matter.

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
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## What's all this about a FORD DIESEL?

Ever since we put a little bit in the paper last week about the new Ford Major, the big diesel tractor, everyone wants to know "What's this about a Ford Diesel?"

Well, here's the story:

Two years ago the Ford Motor Co, of England produced a tractor designed to be sold in every country in the world, from the African deserts and the South American jungles to the sub-zero Northlands of Canada.

This tractor was designed primarily for diesel fuel, which is the lowest priced throughout all countries. However, this diesel engine was adapted to gasoline and kerosene also.

At that time and for the past two years it was the decision of the Ford Motor Co. to sell this tractor, named the Major, only to the foreign trade and not on the American market. However, due to the outstanding performance of the tractor under all conditions and also to some change in company policy the Major will soon be available here in the United States.

The first few tractors have been received and we have had the opportunity of plowing with them. We saw this tractor very easily handle four lister bottoms, a ten foot one-way, a ten foot tandem disc and a four-disc lift plow. (Not all at the

Then, just to show off, a Ford with a disc plow was chained behind the four disc plow and the Major was cranked up and plowed a round with all six discs about ten inches in the ground and the smaller Ford going along for the ride.
