Cooperators of the Upper Elm-
Red soil conservation district neat Muenster can certainly qualify as patriots under Pat's statement for
they are busy sodding Bermuda they are busy sodding Bermuda
grass roots to halt costly soil erosion and prevent gullies.
The never-ending battle be tween man and the forces of
erosion rolled into high gear this week as Operations Waterway got under way. The district-owned sprigging machine that puts out
two rows of Bermuda grass roots two rows of Bermuda grass root
at a time was running full time putting erosiôn resistant grass on natural drains and pasture strips so that sloping fields may be protected by terraces. The grass strips will afford a safe place t
