Soil Conservation Notes

"He is the greatest patriot who stops the most gullies."-Patrick

Cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red soil conservation district near Muenster can certainly qualify as patriots under Pat's statement for they are busy sodding Bermuda grass roots to halt costly soil erosion and prevent gullies.

The never-ending battle between man and the forces of erosion rolled into high gear this week as Operations Waterway got under way. The district-owned sprigging machine that puts out two rows of Bermuda grass roots at a time was running full time putting erosion resistant grass on natural drains and pasture strips so that sloping fields may be protected by terraces. The grass strips will afford a safe place to outlet terrace water from cultivated fields. This waterway-terrace combination is one of the many tools used by man to stop destructive soil and water losses and keep precious top soil at home to grow food and fiber.



The previous years crop cut with another make machine had to be run through the combine again and still wasn't satisfactory. And this cleaning job remember was done on barley (that stuff was bound to be clean, all the beards were down my collar).

By the way that reminds me of a story of the maddest man I ever heard of-It seems that this old red-neck farmer had his small boy in the field helping with the combining (using Dearborn Wood Bros. Combine of course) when he had to stop and crawl under the combine hood to adjust the chafer. Well as you know this is a very hot, dusty and distasteful job at best, and just as the old man had worked up a good sweat the youngster slipped the combine in gear-cylinder, fan, strawrack, old man and all. 




