Population of 1093 Revealed in City's Census and Survey

The estimate of 1000 persons in Muenster has been substantiated with plenty to spare. An unofficial count as Faye Fette completed her rounds Wednesday evening added to 1093. This represents a gain of 193 since the official U.S. census was taken in

Though the combined census and survey is not finished, it is believed that the figure is very nearly correct. Some people who were not at home still have to be contacted, but they have been included in the count and the official figure will stand at 1093 unless mistakes are discovered on the estimate of people not seen.

It was also pointed out the number is somewhat higher than the number of people actually living here. The non-residents counted in are students and service men who still consider Muenster their home.

Other information on the survey is incomplete and totals have not been run up. Mrs. Fette was able to state, however, that local dental expenditures run into big figures and a dentist is most frequently mentioned in answer to the question about the town's needs. Recreation and industry also continue to appear frequently as recommendations for civic im-

One item on the survey which probably will not come up to expectations is the number of workers available here. Mrs. Fette said that not many are looking for something to do. Of those not in business or on a payroll most are either over-age or busy with house work.


