budget, cuts must be made totaling $\$ 3$ billion. There is more downright waste than that in to day's federal spending. That's
actually less than 5 per cent of
the budgeted expenditures. Hundreds of documented incident could be cited of waste of tax
noney by loose spending and noney by loose spending
bad management.
Governor Cuts Waste Governor Cuts Waste
Governor Francis Cherry 18 months ago, he took office 18 months ago, made a thorough
study of wasteful spending prac study of wasteful spending prac-
tices in that state. He went back 18 years and studied the pat-
tern of government spending in Arkansas. He found that in the fourth quarter of each fiscal year
the various departments splurged -they spent on an average of 30 -they spent on an average of 30
per cent more in these fourth
quarters than in any other three month period during the fiscal year. Governor Cherry knew tradition in the political manageIf of the government. If a department had an unspent balance at the end of the
fiscal year, the department head could hardly go before the legis
lature's budget ask for a bigger appropriation for the fiscal year ahead. But-if al his money had been used up by the end of the year, he could ask
for the bigger appropriation for the bigger appropriation. So
in the last three months of each year he "unloaded." Governo Cherry estimated there had been about $\$ 500,000$ of wasteful, need-
less spending each year. This was
