Sarah Karp, serious, old-fashioned girl of 23, with unbobbed hair and unrouged lips and cheeks, be-

lieves this because she lives it. Sarah is little mother to a brood of five brothers and two sisters. The brothers are Abe, 18; Sammy, 16; Sidney, 14, and Harry, 12. The sisters

are Dorothy, 10, and Ruthie, 7.
"A year ago I promised my dying mother that I never would let the children get separated," Sarah said. Since then she has toiled day and night—cooking, sewing, cleaning, washing—mothering and managing her brood on an average income of \$25 weekly.

Without a murmur she gave up her own social life. She has no dates "because the children need somebody home."

Recently, her father, who re-married after Sarah's mother died sought in court to have the younger of the children sent to an institucontending he could not afford to continue paying \$15 a week toward the brood's support. But Sarah battled for her wards. She

won legal custody of them all.
"I dressed them all up and
marched them to court." she explained, eyes flashing. "I just told
the judge how I had worked since I
was 12 to help support the family. I
just asked the judge if the shillson just asked the judge if the children didn't look as if I could take good care of them."

Take care of them she does in a manner to demand admiration. They own their mother's old home on Monroe street in Philadelphia's Ghetto—"the first red brick house beyond the push carts," I was di-

"The boys and I fixed it all up, Sarah said proudly, as she showed me a bright blue, freshly-painted room with big-figured wall pape and the family golden oak "set," and three rooms upstairs, spotless in new paint. Sammy, incipient plum ber, put in a bathroom; Sidney electric lights.

"You see, we boarded off the front room to rent to a dried-beans-and-peas jobber," Sarah explained. "And we rent the top floor. It pays for our coal and almost \$10 a month

"Max sends me \$5 from Canada, where he is working. Able gives me \$10 of his \$11 a week. Sammy earns \$5 a week working after school. It takes just about \$20 a week to feed us all. You know vegetables and fruit are cheap here, and I know the best cheap cuts of meat."

Sarah's day runs about fourteer hours, but she does no complaining. She knows all the tricks of turning collars and cuffs on the older boys shirts, and eventually making them over for the little fellows. Patches are a big part of her life. She ever can cut the boys' hair. She darns all the socks, and makes pretty jersey dresses, with a bit of gay embroidery, for the girls.

SAN ANGELO, Dec. 9 .- (Sp.) -The sale in San Angelo this week of the J. E. Young Grocery Company, wholesale stores with plants at San Angelo and McCamey, to the J. M. Radford Grocery Company of Abilene, for a consideration in excess of \$200,000, marks the passing frem local hands of one of the fastest growing institutions in San An-

Radford recently bought a plant at Coleman, and it is understood here that plans of the company call for the purchasing of at least half a dozen other establishments at strategic points in West Texas. The company is the largest wholesale grocery establishment in the United states, with branch houses in twen ty-three West Texas and New Mex-

The Radford concern will take charge immediately. Neither Leonard Mertz, president of the old con-cern, nor J. E. Young, general man-ager, will be associated with the new owners, it is understood. The sale included the business and buildings at San Angelo and McCamey.

The business was started in 1922 by Mr. Young, with a capital stock of \$10,000. In 1924 half interest in the concern was purchased by Leon-ard Mertz and the capital raised to \$40,000. A new building was erected last year by M. L. Mertz, president of the San Angelo National Bank and the capital increased to \$75,000. The branch at McCamey, in the West Texas oil fields, was estab-

Leonard Mertz was president of the old company and J. E. Young was vice president and general man-ager. W. H. Schleyer was secretarytreasurer. The directors included the three officers and Abe Mayer.
