Site No. 3 is the Grant farm about 5 miles west of Muenster. With a watershed of 2500 acres, it will have a permanent pool of 24 acres and will require 26.5 nigs, Thursday morning from acres of clearing and 129,000 cubic

> Site No. 4 will have its dam miles southwest of Muenster and will back water to the Jap Coursey and Roy Huchton farms. It drains a 1200 acre watershed and its permanent pool will cover about 12 acres. It will require about 10.5 acres of clearing and 81,500 cubic yards of dirt fill.

As a service to its readers The National Photographer is pleased to conduct the following monthly column containing excerpts taken from the Federal Trade Commission's Official News Summary.

MISREPRESENTATION COMPLAINT (6211) ON "BUILD-A-BOOK" PHOTOGRAPHIC ALBUMS

The Federal Trade Commission has issued a complaint charging General Products, of Chicago, with misrepresentation in the sale of photographic albums and certificates for photographs.

According to the complaint, the partners have entered into agreements with a large number of photographic studios throughout the country whereby the studios agree to honor certificates for photographs issued to purchasers of photographic albums known as "Build-A-Book." These certificates provide that the holders are entitled to receive ten 8 x 10 portraits at the rate of two a year at intervals of not less than ninety days. The studio may make a charge of \$1.00 for each sitting if the certificate holder does not order additional photographs. The price of the album, designed to hold 100 photographs,

The complaint challenges claims made by the firm in advertising, on its certificates and through its sales representatives to the effect that the person solicited was especially selected, was to receive an album free and that the charge made was for the photographs. It also cites as false and misleading the representations that the \$39.95 price for the album-certificate combination was a promotional and reduced price; that the combination had a value of \$114.50; and that the photographs were of natural gold tone finish.

In issuing the complaint, the Commission noted that the challenged practices are in violation of trade practice rules issued last September for the Portrait Photographic Industry. The rules cover, among other things, misrepresentation as to finishing and coloring; misuse of the word "free"; misuse of the term "you have been selected," pricing.






