Amendments Lose In Light Vote Here

Muenster joined the rest of Cooke County in staying away from the polls Tuesday, and turned in one of the lightest votes in the community's history. The North Muenster box polled a total of 123 and the south box polled 41, considerably less than one fourth of the area's possible voting strength. By comparison, the north box had 530 votes in the August run-off.

Of those voting many did not finish the ballot, some indicating their votes for a few individual candidates and leaving the rest of the list unmarked. Some ballots were marked for candidates only, some for amendments only. In general, those who voted for candidates voted a straight Democratic ticket. Republicans got a few votes for top offices where candidates names were averaged 98 votes in the north

Most of the amendments got favored by majorities and six
