Decentralization Coming, County Men Told at Convention

County governments will have to operate more efficiently and economically if the trend toward decentralization of federal government continues. Texas judges and county commissioners were told Monday in an annual state convention of county officials.

Dist. Atty. Henry Wade of Dallas spoke to the annual meeting. Wade said that the "trend has been started" to give local governments more power in running their own affairs.

"To merit this renewed confidence in local governments we are going to have to become more stable and efficient," he said.

"Right now, economists tell us, we are in the process of a little recession. That will make funds more difficult to obtain.

"It only follows that we are going to have to operate more economically and efficiently.'


