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

# Largest Capacity in the 6 ft. Class

Capacity is about the only way to compare combines of the 6 foot class since each one may be better for some particular conditions than others. Of course there are other things to be considered, such as cleaning, but most of these other features are really part of the combine's "capacity"

Guess you'd say "capacity" of a combine is its ability to cut, thresh, separate, and clean more grain from a given crop in less time. Now this "capacity" in a combine can be compared to an old time bucket brigade passing water buckets to put out a fire. Heres what we mean by that: the combine has four main operations cutting and feeding, threshing, separating, and cleaning; and all these depend on the power supply.

Now think of this as a four man bucket line with another man filling the buckets (he's the power supply); now if all these men but one are able to handle ten buckets a minute and that one is a little fellow, like me and could only pass six buckets a minute then the whole operation would be cut to six buckets.

Now this weak sister in the combine may be too small a straw rack or too narrow design all through, or a corner to move around instead of straight through, or any thing in the machine which will at sometime produce a bottleneck. But whatever it may be, it causes the whole machine, like the bucket line, to slow down to the speed of the slowest part.

Even though there may be plenty of power to handle twice the load, a big man filling the buckets, if there isn't a big enough man in the separating department then a lot of grain will be thrown over the back and this is lost "capacity" for the combine and lost money for you.

Now, then, it seems that this "capacity" of a combine depends on the design of all departments to be in balance with each other. And that is exactly what we mean when we claim that the Dearborn Wood-Brothers Combine has a balanced design for greater capacity. We are of course speaking only of the 6 foot class of combines of which there are primarily seven makes. All these have about the same width of cut 6' to 6'4".

So they all start out with the same amount of grain cut. For balanced capacity now, with this 6 foot cut to start our "bucket brigade", we will want a cylinder design to handle almost anything that this 6 foot header can deliver, but still not too big to do a good job on light crops. Cylinders in these seven makes of combines run from 28 inches to 64 inches long and from 15 inches to 22 inches in diameter. One is a spike tooth like the old time thresher, one is a rubber covered bar and all others are rasp bar type.

We use a 48 inch by 16 inch rasp bar cylinder. This is short enough to be rigid, doesn't buckle under heavy load and get out of balance, small enough to handle light crops without spreading them out too thin for good threshing, yet large enough to thresh without choking as much as you will ever want to pick up with the 6 foot header. By using a little larger diameter than most we can get the same cylinder to concave speed with slower bearing speeds.

And speaking of speeds, you can make speed adjustments on this cylinder while it is running by simply turning a knob. Makes it easy to set your cylinder speed just exactly as you want it, and in just a few seconds.



ing as high as 87 per cent on business and industrial incomes would, under the long-range Eisenhower plan, be gradually lowered. Hobbling government restrictions would be relaxed. A friendlier attitude toward business and industry would be established. The economic policy makers in the Administration feel that these measures would stimulate the healthy growth of the American enterprise system, bring vast expansion in many fields, make millions of new jobs, and otherwise create new purchasing power to be spent in all channels of American commerce.

#### Purchasing Power

There is another theory in economics which contends that the soundest way to improve the welfare of all citizens is simply to put more dollars into the hands of more people-anyway you can get them there. Thus, it is reasoned, more goods will be pro-duced to satisfy the added purchasing power. In a sense, this is the Keynesian theory, developed by Lord Maynard Keynes, the Englishman.

Keynes was the originator of the "pump priming" theory. Purchasing power is so important,
