



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"But Can YOU Prove The Bible Is True?"

Suppose an unbeliever challenged you to do so.

Being a sincere Christian, you might reply: "I just know it is." But that wouldn't be proof. It would not be very convincing to the unbeliever. And what would a skeptic say if you told him you have the assurance of the Holy Spirit? He might well ask why so many Christians who claim this do not agree on the meaning of the Scriptures.

What real evidence could you produce? What facts could you present? Where could you find a ogical convincing answer?

Christ, of course, wrote nothing, excepting on one occasion-and then only in dust. All the original . manuscripts of the Bible have vanished. The Bible itself does not claim to be the Inspired and complete word of God. Our Lord did not say that His teachings would be found in a book. On what authority, then, can we be sure about the Bible?

The answer is, of course, that the only living authority is the Catholic Church...the Apostolic Church ... the Church whose traditions, beginning with Peter, bear reliable witness down the pathway of time from Christ to this very moment. 
