**State Comptroller Bob Bullock** has announced that persons convicted in Texas courts hereafter can expect to pay more than stiff fines and jail terms. He explained that his office will collect a \$10 or \$15 fee from persons convicted of criminal charges, that "the cost of crime, just like everything else in today's economy, is going up."

A new law passed by the Texas legislature legalizes this mini-crackdown on crime. Bullock says that a \$15 fee will be assessed against a person convicted of a felony and \$10 against a person convicted of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of more than \$200. Those are additional to other fines and costs ordered by the court.

Its purpose will be to create a fund to compensate victims of crime, and the program is to be run by the state's Industrial Accident Board. It is expected to raise \$37 million in the first year of operation and \$205 million in the next five years.

The idea sounds like a dandy, a step toward correcting a long time injustice to victims. Many times our courts have made criminals pay their debt to society by fine or imprisonment, but they did nothing to help the victim of crime. Perhaps he was burglarized or swindled for a stiff loss, or he received injuries that caused hospital and medical expense or severe pain, plus the loss of income. Definitely such victims are entitled to compensation.

In fact, it seems that they are entitled to more than the small amounts that the state comptroller is trying to provide. Assessments of \$10 and \$15 against the small number of people who are caught and convicted is a drop in the bucket compared to the needs of all victims.

To really get on the right track, the state, or whoever originated the idea, needs to get down to the basics of ethics and the ten commandments. As every child has learned, or should have learned, stealing or destruction of property or physical injury are sins, and they require restitution before they can be rectified in the eyes of God. It means that the offender or criminal owes the victim for the amount of the loss.

By our standard of justice the victim is left empty handed, we taxpayers are stuck with the expense of supporting a convict while he is in a penitentiary, and the convict is the only one who gains. He receives a wage for the work he does in prison.

As it looks from here, our lawmakers should see what they can do about this situation. The court ought to take note of the injury or loss a victim sustained in a crime as well as of the convicted person's ability to pay. If he can make restitution the court should make him pay as a matter of rightfully settling the case. And if he's sentenced to the pen the judge should order a deduction from every pay check to apply to the debt.

The comptroller's idea looks like a good deal especially for the victims who deserve compensation for the pain or loss they sustain, and it has added value as a possible deterrent to crime. Imagine, for instance a big time swindle. A crook would be more hesitant to try it if he had to make restitution as well as go to the pen.

A related improvement in court procedure has been proposed by Senator Lloyd Bentsen. He wants to replace the current system of "indeterminate" sentencing with a new approach known as "presumptive" sentencing. He points out that our system is not working... that mass murderers like Charles Manson and Richard Speck are eligible for parole, other dangerous offenders go unpunished, and disparities in sentences of those who are punished lead to great injustices. Criminals can feel that if convicted the odds are in their favor, that they take little risk in doing violence to innocent people. A reason behind this problem is that judges have the discretion to set virtually any sentence and continued on page 12...

## Third Installment Due on Income Tax

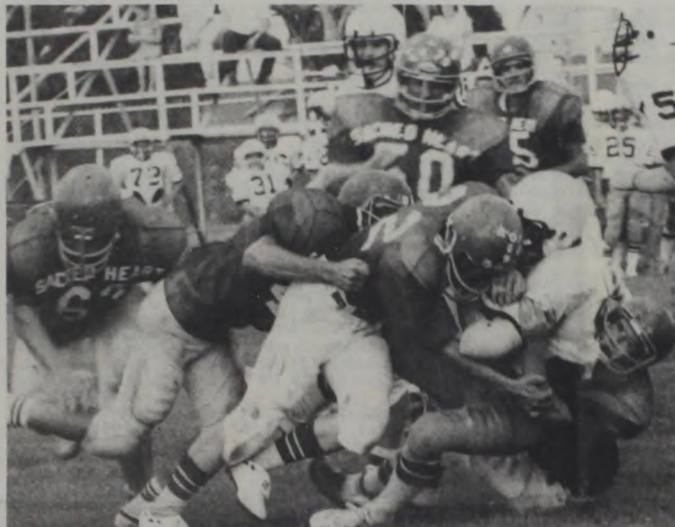
The third installment of estimated federal tax payments on 1979 income is due September 18, 1979, the Internal Revenue Service said.

This installment should be paid using declaration-voucher number 3 found in the Form 1040-ES package.

Taxpayers whose anticipated income changed during 1979 may have to file an amended declaration.

Space is provided in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate, the IRS said.

For more detailed information, IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," is available free from local IRS offices. Supplies of the Form 1040-ES package also can be obtained at these locations.

## Public Invited to Hear Proposals on Zoning Ordinance

Anyone interested in the new zoning and subdivision ordinance proposed for the city is invited to the public hearing to be held next Monday, Sept. 10, 7:30 p.m., at a special meeting of the city council.

The council will consider the ordinance along with a coded map prepared by the Texoma Regional Planning Commission as a comprehensive plan for future development of the city.

Areas designated on the ordinance and map are those intended for park, residential, industrial, commercial and other uses, with distinction for light or heavy industry and mobile or permanent homes. Personnel of TRPC will be there to explain reasons for the divisions and other related details.

They will also point out that none of the existing locations are to be changed by the ordinance, however any new or replacement structure will have to be located in its proper zone.

in singing "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name," as the recessional. Acolytes were Doug Fleitman and Steve Trubenbach, great-nephews.

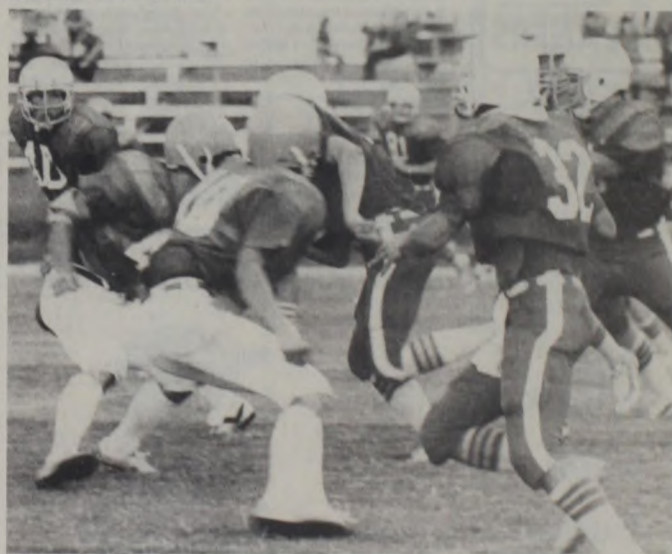

## Improvement Seen in Hornets' Test With Nocona High

On the scoreboard the Hornets were at the short end of the 2-1 touchdown count in their scrimmage with Nocona last Friday night, but Coach Jerry Stinson and the boys are not down hearted. What counts most is that they showed lots of improvement over their previous week's practice test.

The defense gave up skimpy yardage except two big passes that produced both of Nocona's TDs. However, the weakness was corrected during the action, as indicated by a pair of interceptions farther along. Defense against the rush showed definite improvement since the week before.

Method of action was taking turns at 20 offensive and 20 defensive plays. Starting from its 30 the offensive team advanced if it completed first downs and had to start over when it failed to gain. At their turn the Hornets completed their drive on the 19th play. The Indians got their two scores in their first offense.

After that the reserves of the two teams mingled while the regulars had a rest.

Thereafter, with a norther breezing through and rain threatening, the coaches changed it to 10 and 10 turns while expecting to be interrupted by the weather. As it turned out each got pos-

session three times and each ran out of plays before finishing the job. The Hornets got to the 12 on one effort.

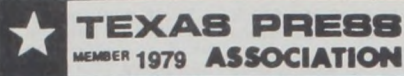
Junior varsity teams likewise had one turn each at the 20-20 procedure. Muenster JV's had the better of that tussle, by a TD count of 2-0.

**Congressional Comment**

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** — After World War II the confidence of Americans seemed almost unlimited. We had defeated the Axis powers and then, through the Marshall Plan, rebuilt most of Western Europe. We could do all this and at the same time provide prosperity for our own citizens. People all over the world were beginning to predict that the next 100 years would be an "American Century."

Looking back on this era, it is hard to imagine today that confidence in our leaders and ourselves is at such a low ebb. Few people are talking about extending America's power and influence and no one is using the phrase "American Century." The present situation is, in a large part, due to our Country's involvement in the Vietnam War. This conflict shattered the belief in our ability to find pragmatic solutions to difficult problems. It has shaken the concept of ourselves as a Nation.

Now there is a pervasive sense among Americans that we ought to put Vietnam behind us and get on with the business of the world. This attitude neither does justice to ourselves or to the people who fought and died in this conflict.

If we sweep the issue under the rug, the lump will show.

One of the legacies of Vietnam that we must continue to confront is the MIA question. Uncovering the fate of these American servicemen and civilians listed as missing must remain important to the United States. We cannot lose sight of the sacrifice these men and their families have made. This Country should be ever mindful of the pain and uncertainty which shrouds the lives of the families and friends of those still listed as missing. The Vietnam conflict is still very much alive in the hearts and minds of these people and we must not forget them.

It has been over six years since the signing of the Paris accords and we still have not received a full accounting of the over 2,500 MIAs. Very little has been done to convince the Vietnam government that we will not forget the issue. The President's MIA commission was told by the Defense Department that it is reasonable to assume the Hanoi regime can provide information on over 1,000 of the missing servicemen. But the Administration has applied little pressure to receive this data.

The communist governments of Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia have repeatedly sought economic assistance from the United States. They claim that we owe them "reparation" payments. Though they seek our aid, they have done little to provide information about MIAs. It is callous and cruel to use this knowledge as a pawn in an international chess game.

We must not allow the issues of the present to bury the problems of the past. If we are going to revitalize our confidence as a Nation, we should not suppress the difficulties of our recent history. The MIA question still remains unresolved — let us not forget.



**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS**

**AUSTIN**—Governor Bill Clements has reversed his position on history's largest oil spill which so far has washed over a million barrels of goo onto Texas beaches. The Governor last week toured the oil-blackened beaches of Corpus Christi and announced the spill was an "unprecedented problem."

He promised local officials he would do all in his power to provide them economic aid for lost tourist and business dollars on the Gulf Coast.

When the off-shore oil drilling rig in Campeche Bay in Mexican waters blew out five weeks ago, Clements called subsequent ecological warnings and related press coverage "much ado about nothing." Clements stuck to those comments until recently, and his change in position is thought by many to be a real step in cleaning up the giant oil spill and recovering the economic loss to the Gulf Coast.

Several state officials, including Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, House Speaker Bill Clayton and Attorney General Mark White, have called on the Governor to take all steps necessary to make the economic recovery, including a possible lawsuit for damages against Mexico.

White said he has not ruled out the possibility of suing the Mexican government. PEMEX, the nationally-owned Mexican petroleum industry, and SEDCO, Inc. of Dallas, which supplied the offshore drilling rig being used when the oil well blew out.

Clements was president and chief executive of SEDCO prior to becoming governor, but he has since placed his majority stock holdings in SEDCO into a blind trust.

**Calls for a Lawsuit**  
 Clements has discarded the idea of a lawsuit against Mexico as "not being a good neighbor," but last week other Texans joined the call to keep such an option open, including U.S. Reps. Henry B. Gonzalez and Jim Collins. Meanwhile, SEDCO officials reject any liability for the spill, saying "gross negligence" must be proven on their part, and State Republican Party Chairman Chester R. Upham Jr. blasted White for "playing politics with the issue."

The United States and Mexican governments have so far not discussed publicly what course they will take

once the spewing oil well is capped, probably at the end of September.

**Telephone Increase**  
 In Austin last week the Public Utilities Commission recommended that Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. receive a \$136.7-million-a-year rate increase, but commissioners asked for more time to consider how the increase should be divided among customers. The increase was about \$9 million less than the telephone company's request of \$145.2 million.

**Committees Returning**  
 Several legislative committees met last week to begin preliminary studying of problems and bills to be considered in the 1981 session. Among those holding hearings in Austin were the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee and the House Committee on Intergovernmental Affairs. The House Committee on Environmental Affairs has been holding hearings along the Coast to determine the extent of the bad effects of the oil spill.

**Mexican Coal Eyed**  
 Governor Clements said Monday he would look into the possibility of several Texas cities buying coal from Mexican mines being developed near Eagle Pass. The Coahuila coal is equal in quality to coal which San Antonio is buying now from Wyoming.

Clements met last week with Coahuila Governor Oscar Flores Tapia to discuss the problems of drug and automobile smuggling. Clements said they agreed to establish a joint commission to discuss mutual interests such as livestock and veterinary problems, exchange students

and cultural exchanges.

**New Laws in Effect**  
 Several new laws passed by the recent Legislature went into effect on Aug. 27 or Sept. 1, including the new usury rate hike which raised the ceiling on home mortgage loans from 10 to 12 percent. The lending increase was raised after savings and loans representatives complained of too little money available in Texas to loan to homebuilders.

The new law has a Sunset kicker which causes the new rate to expire in two years, at which time it will be renegotiated through the legislative process.

**Deputy Resigns**  
 Chief Deputy Comptroller and former Plainview state representative Ralph Wayne resigned his office last week because of health reasons. Comptroller Bob Bullock said he valued Wayne's assistance but he valued his good friend's health even more.

To qualify for the U.S. Senate, a person must be a citizen of the U.S. for nine years, at least 30 years old and a resident of the state where he was elected.

Charles Carroll, a Maryland representative to the Continental Congress, was the last surviving signer of the Declaration of Independence when he died in 1832 at the age of 95.

**BACKGROUND TO SALT II**  
 When there is general misunderstanding of the true nature of Communism and the threat it poses to national security, the public will oppose or be very reluctant to disarm. Therefore, proponents of disarmament and appeasement of the Soviets launched a calculated campaign to influence the thinking of the American people by attempting to destroy all anti-Communist programs. If the public should be induced to believe there was no Communist threat, they would be more amenable to accepting disarmament.

In 1958, President Eisenhower and the National Security Council had issued a directive which "directed the military not only to educate the troops in the nature, strategy and tactics of Communism, but also to help educate the public concerning the nature of the cold war in which we are engaged." It was on the basis of this directive that military

officers were speaking to Freedom Forums, civic clubs and church groups all across the country. As a result, millions of Americans were becoming concerned about the Communist threat.

In 1961, Senator Fulbright sent an infamous memorandum to the White House attacking the 1958 directive, smearing anti-Communist leaders, and urging "muzzling of the military." The Communists loved it and reprinted portions of it in their paper, *The Worker*. Although it isn't possible here to discuss the Fulbright Memorandum in further detail, there is no question but that the Senator and this document must bear a great deal of the responsibility for laying the groundwork for unilateral disarmament in the face of the Soviet threat.

Coupled with Fulbright's subversive act was another by Walter and Victor Reuther, who sent a memorandum to the Attorney General, Robert Kennedy. Because the Reuthers and their unions had a great deal to do with the election of John F. Kennedy, they had considerable political clout and they were seeking the payoff. In their memorandum the

Reuthers recommended: (1) muzzling the military and eliminating anti-Communist programs from the government; (2) listing conservative groups as subversive to intimidate potential members; (3) having the Internal Revenue Service revoke the tax-exempt status of anti-Communist groups; (4) using the Federal Communications Commission to harass television and radio stations which provide time for conservative commentators; and (5) putting an end to the "exaggeration of the domestic Communist menace."

The net effect of the Fulbright and Reuther memorandums, as a result of the acceptance of their major recommendations by the Kennedy administration, was to practically eliminate the anti-Communist programs in America. To be sure, a few kept going but their influence was considerably diminished. Within a short time the public was deemed ready for disarmament.

The broad disarmament plan was outlined in Department of State Publication 7277, Phase One would halt nuclear weapons tests and reduce strategic delivery systems and conventional arms and armed forces. Phase Two called for reduction of stocks of nuclear weapons and further cuts would be made in the armed forces. It should be obvious to anyone who follows the news that our leaders have taken us into Phase Two. It will be developed later that this disarmament has been unilateral, solely on the part of the United States, while the only adversaries we have in the world, the Soviet Union and Communist China, the nation-leaders of international Communism, have continued to arm unabated.

**TEXAS TOMATO PEPPER DISH**

- 2 med. green peppers, sliced into rounds
- 1 med. onion, sliced
- 1 C. fresh mushrooms, sliced
- 1/2 tsp. basil
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 T. water
- 2 T. butter
- 2 med. ripe tomatoes or 1 (1 lb.) can tomato wedges, drained

Microwave directions: In 1 quart casserole place green pepper. Cut onion into 1/4 inch slices, separate into rings and place on top of green pepper. Slice mushrooms and place on top. Sprinkle on seasonings. Add water and melted butter. Cover and microcook at high 6 minutes, stirring after 3 minutes. Cut tomatoes into 3/4 inch wedges and arrange over casserole. Cover. Microcook at high 2-3 minutes more, until tomatoes are just heated. Makes 4 servings.

Stir fry directions: This recipe can be made in a wok by starting the onions first, adding the peppers, then the mushrooms. Tomatoes should be added at the very last of the cooking and should be only lightly cooked. The basil and salt should be added at the end of cooking. The water is omitted.

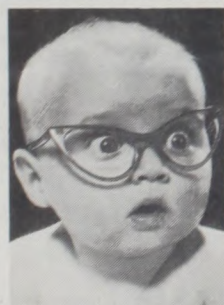

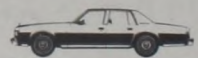

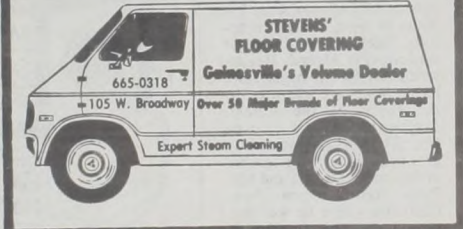

**Gasohol Producers Gearing Up To Utilize Texas Farm Products**

AUSTIN—Some 70 applications by Texans for alcohol distilling plants or installations for the production of gasohol fuel have been approved in the state by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown recently chaired a meeting of the Texas

Energy Advisory Council (TEAC) Subcommittee on Agriculturally-Derived Fuels where members studied various biomass energy resources available, including gasohol.

At the meeting, leading gasohol authority Holly Hodge contended that liquid fuel produced from farm products could supply at least five per cent of this country's gasoline needs by 1985.

"But we've got to get in high gear," Hodge cautioned members of the TEAC Subcommittee.

"The goal of producing 5 billion gallons of alcohol a year from farm products by 1985 is not unrealistic," said Hodge, president of the National Gasohol Council of Lincoln, Nebraska.

"Renewable agricultural

resources are the only short-term solution to our energy problem. We have the raw materials and the technology, but we must implement them in an effective manner. The benefits of developing a gasohol industry in Texas and other states could be tremendous," Hodge stated.

One area often overlooked is the wide range of useful by-products which result from the distillation of alcohol from organic substances, commented W. W. "Bill" Walton, president of W. W. Oil Company of Breckenridge.

Walton stated that one very valuable by-product of the distillation process at the present time is carbon dioxide. One bushel of grain

will produce, in addition to 18 pounds of ethyl alcohol, 18 pounds of high-protein livestock feed and 18 pounds of carbon dioxide.

Walton stressed that carbon dioxide is in great demand for injection into old oil wells and those with high viscosity oil to help recover hard-to-get petroleum. At an estimated net value of \$7 per ton, this by-product could bring in an additional \$550,000 per year to a distilling plant with 75,000-gallons-per-day capacity.



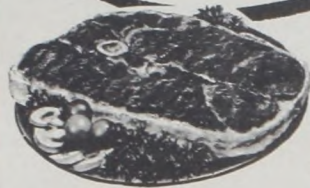

To really understand the fluctuations in interest rates it is necessary to view money more as a commodity than as a medium of exchange. When there is a high demand for wheat, prices go up accordingly. So it is with money.
